FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

SENIOR LEADERSHIP TEAM: PART THREE

I've written twice before in this column about the Senior Leadership Team. The team is distinct from staff and is another component of the lay leadership of the parish along with the Stewardship (Parish) Council, the Finance Council, the school board, and the now joint religious education board(s).

Yes, you read that last point correctly: the former Sacred Heart religious education board and the St Philip catechetical advisory board have been merged together to create a joint board which has met with me and our two parish DREs (Directors of Religious Education) several times now, as we begin to craft a direction for the future of children's ministry. Those discussions have been very fruitful and, I think, exciting.

At our most recent meeting, we heard reports describing four other parishes in the Archdiocese that are pursuing innovative practices with regard to their children's ministry. There is no need for us to completely re-invent the wheel and I certainly have no problem experimenting with innovative practices that we learn from other places.

Back to my starting point for this column, the subject of which is the Senior Leadership Team. This group shares responsibility with the pastor for making our new parish as effective and vital as possible. They act as a brainstorming group, a resource for me to bounce ideas off of, as well as surfacing new ideas that haven't occurred to me but that are worthwhile in considering the future

which we are pursuing as a parish.

That future is one where as a faith community we are totally alive, viable, making a difference in each other's lives and in the life of the world around us. That future is one where we are fully engaged as disciples of Jesus, continuing to build up church, seeking to serve others. You read that last sentence correctly if you discerned in it the tag line describing Divine Mercy parish: making disciples, building church, serving others.

How does the SLT differ from the other lay advisory councils and boards? I meet with the members of the SLT weekly for several hours. That would be the main difference since the other lay groups meet, at most, once a month. Staff itself only meets every other week.

This weekly brainstorming, discussing, reviewing, studying group helps to keep my feet to the fire, that is, to keep to the forefront the emerging vision that will guide us into the future. That vision is still being worked on and will continue to be worked on for quite a while yet. When it's ready, it's a vision that will be communicated to the entire parish.

I reported to you before who it is that comprises the Senior Leadership Team. Since then, we've added one more member. Altogether, they are: Jim Dietz, Kristen Fink, Claudia Goodrich, Sue Lehocky, Judy Pyke and Michelle Wasielewski.

HERE'S AN IMAGE FOR YOU

I'm borrowing this image from Father James Mallon, the author of *Divine Renovation*. A lot of parishes get stuck in the rut of simply maintaining things as



they are, but not adjusting or recalibrating what they do or how they operate given the circumstances in which they find themselves, circumstances like the intense secularization of the surrounding culture.

In this situation where parishes have been in maintenance mode for many years and yet are now seeking to become more vital, they are like a car stuck in the mud or the snow. They rock back and forth, back and forth, building up enough momentum to finally get out of the rut. As we keep talking about our future and what we want to do to get there, we are much like that car rocking back and forth. We didn't get in this maintenance mode rut overnight and we're not going to get out of it quickly or magically. It will take a lot of back and forth, a lot of talk, a lot of consideration, a lot of visioning until we build up enough momentum to move forward. The point of the Senior Leadership Team is to help the pastor drive that process of momentum-building. I know that many of you have guestions and that it might not appear as though we are moving forward. Lassure you we are gaining some traction and are starting to see a vision for our journey. PRAYER AND WORSHIP

XXVII WORLD DAY OF THE SICK: FEBRUARY 11, 2019

The following are excerpts from a message from Pope Francis for the XXVII World Day of the Sick (the feast day of Our Lady of Lourdes).

"On the XXVII World Day of the Sick, to be solemnly celebrated on 11
February 2019 in Calcutta, India, the Church – as a Mother to all her children, especially the infirm – reminds us that generous gestures like that of the Good Samaritan are the most credible means of evangelization. Caring for the sick requires professionalism, tenderness, straightforward and simple gestures freely given, like a caress that makes others feel loved.

Life is a gift from God. Saint Paul asks: "What do you have that you did not receive?" (1 Cor 4:7). Precisely because it is a gift, human life cannot be reduced to a personal possession or private property, especially in the light of medical and biotechnological advances that could tempt us to manipulate the "tree of



life" (cf. Gen 3:24).

Amid today's culture of waste and indifference, I would point out that "gift" is the category best suited to challenging today's individualism and social fragmentation, while at the same time promoting new relationships and means of cooperation between peoples and cultures. Dialogue – the premise of gift – creates possibilities for human

growth and development capable of breaking through established ways of exercising power in society. "Gift" means more than simply giving presents: it involves the giving of oneself, and not simply a transfer of property or objects. "Gift" differs from gift-giving because it entails the free gift of self and the desire to build a relationship. It is the acknowledgement of others, which is the basis of society. "Gift" is a reflection of God's love, which culminates in the incarnation of the Son and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit....

. . . Generosity inspires and sustains the work of the many volunteers who are so important in health care and who eloquently embody the spirituality of the Good Samaritan. I express my gratitude and offer my encouragement to all those associations of volunteers committed to the transport and assistance of patients, and all those that organize the donation of blood, tissues and organs. One particular area in which your presence expresses the Church's care and concern is that of advocacy for the rights of the sick, especially those affected by pathologies requiring special assistance. I would also mention the many efforts made to raise awareness and encourage prevention. Your volunteer work in medical facilities and in homes, which ranges from providing health care to offering spiritual support, is of primary importance. Countless persons who are ill, alone, elderly or frail in mind or body benefit from these services. I urge you to continue to be a sign of the Church's presence in a secularized world. A volunteer is a good friend with whom one can share personal thoughts and emotions; by their patient listening, volunteers make it possible for the sick to pass from being passive recipients of care to being active participants in a relationship that can restore hope and inspire openness to further treatment.

Volunteer work passes on values, behaviors and ways of living born of a deep desire to be generous. It is also a means of making health care more humane.

A spirit of generosity ought especially to inspire Catholic healthcare institutions, whether in the more developed or the poorer areas of our world, since they carry out their activity in the light of the Gospel. Catholic facilities are called to give an example of self-giving, generosity and solidarity in response to the mentality of profit at any price, of giving for the sake of getting, and of exploitation over concern for people.



I urge everyone, at every level, to promote the culture of generosity and of gift, which is indispensable for overcoming the culture of profit and waste. Catholic healthcare institutions must not fall into the trap of simply running a business; they must be concerned with personal care more than profit. We know that health is relational, dependent on interaction with others, and requiring trust, friendship and solidarity. It is a treasure that can be enjoyed fully only when it is shared. The joy of generous giving is a barometer of the health of a Christian. . . .

CATHOLICS URGED TO FIGHT WITH RENEWED VIGOR FOR UNBORN

The Chairman of the US Bishops' Pro-Life Activities Committee,
Archbishop Naumann, issued a statement in response to several states moving forward with legislation that would permit a baby to be aborted at nine months.

Excerpts from that statement follow: "Now is the time for all Catholics—bishops, priests, and laity—to fight for the unborn with renewed vigor. We must educate family, friends, legislators, and fellow citizens about how it is never necessary to intentionally kill unborn children in order to save their mothers. Local action is especially important. . . .

I urge Catholics, and thoughtful Americans of all religions or none at all to advocate for local change. Sign up for your State Catholic Conference or diocesan pro-life advocacy network, which can help you communicate to elected officials. Or seek out state and local pro-life groups, including parish respect life groups, that are making a difference at the state level.

Though we live in very dark days, we know that the Lord has already triumphed over death. But we must use this time on earth to be His hands and feet. This means each of us rededicating ourselves to prayer, and fighting for the most vulnerable among us, especially unborn children and their mothers."

PRAYERS NEEDED FOR REESE FELDERMAN

The following is an excerpt from Reese's Facebook page on February 2nd, in which Reese's Mom, Jen, asks for continued prayers for Reese.

"On Thursday night Reese was terribly ill, again. It was ramping up, slowly, for a couple days and then it really hit around bedtime on Thursday. The pain, the nausea, the vomiting. A fever. Just like last time, a couple weeks ago. Chris ended up taking Reese to the emergency room, again, in the stroller at 1:30am....

We don't understand what is happening, or why it is happening. Reese has everyone a little perplexed, again. Her viral panel is negative and no one thinks it's bacterial. We have found a pattern... severe pain and nausea that lasts for about three hours and ends in vomiting. It's a horrible pattern I wouldn't wish on anyone, especially a little four-year-old girl who has suffered so greatly. Her threshold for pain is very high, she expects it to a certain degree, which also makes it difficult to determine exactly what is going on. There are a few theories, some more difficult than others....

Watching her suffer is difficult, heart wrenching. ..Hopefully we get the information we need to move towards complete healing, and tomorrow is a little better than the day before.

We need your prayers for Reese and her complete healing.


