FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

Reflecting back on Father Steve's column from July 1, 2018, we are reminded of the need to renew our church, why change is necessary and important, and Jesus' call to us to "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

From Maintenance to Mission

Renew My Church is not about maintaining what we have. It's about mission—embracing mission, promoting mission—and risking ourselves on behalf of the mission of Christ as we move forward to serve the needs within our parish community and beyond.

Mission does not necessarily mean being a missionary, although in our social outreach programs perhaps it does mean exactly that. Mission also means having a vision and a focus to step forward into the future. Mission is at the heart of the scriptural message. The root of the word mission means to send. God sends each of us to announce the salvation we have in Christ. This is truly Good News and that news is not meant to be kept under our hats, so to speak. We are to make known this news by all we say and do.

Changing Landscape

The world around us is changing. Secularization is affecting all aspects of society and our parishes. Most young people say they don't need organized religion. This stance cuts across all faiths, whether you're talking about Catholic parishes, Protestant congregations and Jewish synagogues. All of us are dwindling.

Renew My Church seeks to arrest and reverse that trend for us Catholics in the Archdiocese of Chicago. The first four phases of Renew My Church have focused on the organizational, structural and operational changes so that we have the optimum number of parishes and pastors to serve the needs of the Church. Once we get past the current phase (phase 4 which is focused on operational change), then we embark on the real work of *Renew My Church*.

Mission Revitalization

In "Building our New Reality," we will concentrate on revamping ministries to promote evangelization and

formation. The goal of "Building our New Reality" is a vibrant parish community that truly concentrates on three basic things. These three basic things are captured in our new mission tag line that the combined parish councils accepted at their May 21 meeting.

That mission statement of our new parish, Divine Mercy, is quite simple and straight forward—

Making Disciples Building Church Serving Others

—and if you recognize these three phrases as being similar to the tag line of the Renew My Church initiative you would be correct. Ours is very similar and deliberately so.

At the core of parish revitalization as envisioned by Renew My Church is the gospel push for disciples to make other disciples. Why?

We do not want "members" of a parish so much as "intentional disciples." Clubs and organizations have members. We are neither. We are Church, a faith community—whose life and faith revolves around a singularly unique person: Jesus Christ.

We are his disciples. Not in a passive, automatic way, but intentionally so! Disciples orient their entire life around Jesus: their whole life, their entire life. That's a tall order, but it is what we are called to be and do by our Baptism.

Disciples make other disciples. They seek to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to everyone else and thus build up the Church. Disciples encourage others to join them in pursuing the kingdom of God.



Discipleship is not just inward-looking, as in helping to build Church. Discipleship is also outward-looking, serving others, even those who do not believe as we do. Disciples make a difference in the world one step at a time, in small and large ways.

Looking Forward

I am excited about the possibilities. I believe we are standing on the threshold of something very exciting, creating a new parish on the foundation of two wonderful faith communities. We will experience many blessings as we confront the challenges before us.

Let us invoke the mercy of God as we move forward. His loving kindness and compassion have brought us to this threshold, this special moment of blending, of creating, of newness—all for the sake of the One who embodies divine mercy, Christ himself.

BE BOLD

As part of our Renew My Church efforts in building our new reality to become a vibrant faith community that seeks to make disciples, build church and serve others, we want to be BOLD in everything we do! That can manifest itself in so many exciting and creative ways. The possibilities are endless. We wanted to share with you one of the (visible) bold steps our Senior Leadership Team decided to take to help move our parish forward. Last Sunday, as we celebrated Mother's Day with all the wonderful women who mother in one way or another, we invited several women from the parish and our staff to share their thoughts on motherhood, as it fit so well with last Sunday's Gospel:

"Jesus said:

"My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish. No one can take them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one can take them out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one."

Given that these reflections were so well received and many parishioners want to hear more from women of the parish, we wanted to share with you the text of those Mother's Day Reflections in this column over the next few weeks. Enjoy. And remember, be bold!

Our first reflection comes to you from Mindi Craddock, who spoke at the 10:30am Mass on May 12, 2019.

Good morning. My name is Mindi Craddock. My husband Tom and I and our sons, Jack, Ryan and Paul, have been parishioners here as a family since 2007. (Prior to that, my husband has been a lifelong member of the SH community). When Father Steve first asked me to speak at a Mother's Day Mass, I hesitated. It is a daunting thing to be asked to speak in front of a large group of people. Secondly, I hesitated because I wasn't sure what exactly I should speak about. Motherhood, obviously. But there are so many things I could say about that.

MY STORY

I could talk about my Mom, who is easily the greatest woman in my life. Or fill the entire hour with memories of my beloved Gram (I am wearing her ring today to honor her). I could

tell you about my amazing mother in law....I know not all of us are lucky to have a good one! I could stand up here and speak about my relationship with my three boys, the three people who have taught me the most about myself, and whom I love more than anything in the entire world. But it's hard to put all my feelings about them into words, and quite honestly...I can't do it. As I get older and the time is flying by, I get so emotional. Just this morning I was bawling at a Hallmark ad about the phenomenon of fleeting moments, the fact that you don't realize you're experiencing your "lasts" with your kids until it's too late. The day you hold them on your hip for the very last time, or give them their last bubble beard in the bath, but you don't know it's the last time. So rather than stand up here

choking back sobs and tell you only MY story, I'd rather talk about what motherhood might mean to **ALL** of us.

ALL MOMS CAN RELATE

Most of you moms can relate to the same stuff as me: the insanity of caring for babies, then young children and then teenagers. We have built our families and made our houses homes....along the way becoming decent cooks, outstanding chauffeurs, and unlicensed pediatricians. We are the carpool Moms, the "no one else can drive ten of us to the movies, so can you?" moms, the "I need 50 bagels for a school party tomorrow" moms, the "is my teenager really texting me

from upstairs to ask for a snack?" moms. We all have that feeling that we are constantly failing at something: not giving them enough veggies, or too much screen time or we yelled too much yesterday but spoiled them too much today. We try to take care of the possible, while trusting God to take care of the impossible. We are all learning as we go, and we are all exhausted and spent because we give of our ourselves to the Nth degree.

OUR GREATEST GIFT

And yet I am assuming that you, like myself, still call motherhood our greatest gift and our biggest blessing. We all show up day in and day out, week after week, year after year, because even though the outcomes are a crapshoot, we are here shaping and loving and nurturing our children. We are here because **they** are the fire in our hearts and the greatest joy in our memories. We love them on their happiest days and their lowest points, we love them when they break our hearts and when they fill them with pride. We **love** them from the deepest place of our souls. That is the only word that comes close to describing this overwhelming feeling: love. It's the same love that Jesus has for us. As I continued to reflect on what I might say today, I thought about my

friends and family members who are struggling today. While many of us look forward to this joyful day to celebrate that special woman in our life, others dread this occasion because it causes them stress or grief or pain. The truth is, if you could survey the women in this church, statistically, you would find that there are very few who would be untouched by miscarriage, infertility, broken marriages and families, or death. For so many, this holiday can be extremely painful.

CELEBRATE WOMEN

So wouldn't it be wonderful to change the perspective and understanding of what Mother's Day is about? Instead of having it revolve around only mothers, shouldn't we celebrate the many fantastic roles all women have?

Being a mother actually has very little to do with birthing a child from your body. That might be the most obvious scenario, but motherhood is so much more than that. There are many women who have mothered, guided, supported, influenced and loved people that they didn't give birth to (and yes, pets should absolutely be included in that). The beautiful parts of motherhood that we celebrate every year: selflessness, tenderness, caring.....they are present in the hearts of most women, whether or not they procreate.

Whether your Mother's Day is perfect in joy and celebration, or marked by putting on of a brave face, my hope is that you are built up by those around you.

- So to those who gave birth and have warm and close relationships with your children we celebrate with you.
- And to those who are in the trenches with little ones every day and wear the badge of food stains—we appreciate you.

- To those who walk the hard path of infertility—we walk with you.
- To those who experienced the loss of a child—we mourn with you.
- To those who are foster moms, mentor moms and spiritual moms—we need you.
- To those who stepparent—we walk with you on these complex paths.
- To those who placed children for adoption—we commend you for your selflessness.
- To those who have adopted children— we applaud you for sharing your love.
- And to those who have lost their mothers—we grieve with you.

So, look all around you — I guarantee you'll find women worth celebrating. Let **every** lady in your life know how amazing they are.

Because we **all** deserve to be honored, today and every day.


