FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

Inaugural Year

Here we go. We begin a new adventure together. This new adventure is called *Divine Mercy* parish.

Our parish, as you know, is the result of the combining of two former parishes, Sacred Heart and St. Philip the Apostle. I've used the analogy of a blended family in speaking about this new adventure in past Sacred Heart bulletins. We are that.

We are a blended family and through that blending we end up bigger, stronger, and, capable of doing even more to build our faith community as we spread the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Patient and Persistent

Let's not kid ourselves. The blending is going to take time. Just like in two biological families that get blended, two faith communities that come together as one will take time as we

become more familiar with one other, appreciate one another, and find the concrete ways to express our oneness even though we will, more often than not, be worshipping in different churches.

Patience is required as we develop new ways of being and appreciating each other as we complement one another in our discipleship. At the same time that we exercise patience, we're going to need to be persistent.

From Maintenance to Mission

Renew My Church is not about maintaining what we have. It's about mission—embracing mission, promoting mission—and risking ourselves on behalf of the mission of Christ as we move forward to serve the needs within our parish community and beyond.

Mission does not necessarily mean being a missionary, although in our social outreach programs perhaps it



does mean exactly that. Mission also means having a vision and a focus to step forward into the future. Mission is at the heart of the scriptural message. The root of the word mission means to send. God sends each of us to announce the salvation we have in Christ. This is truly Good News and that news is not meant to be kept under our hats, so to speak. We are to make known this news by all we say and do.

Changing Landscape

The world around us is changing. Secularization is affecting all aspects of society and our parishes. Most young people say they don't need organized religion. This stance cuts across all faiths, whether you're talking about Catholic parishes, Protestant congregations and Jewish synagogues. All of us are dwindling.

Renew My Church seeks to arrest and reverse that trend for us Catholics in the Archdiocese of Chicago. The first four phases of Renew My Church have focused on the organizational, structural and operational changes so that we have the optimum number of parishes and pastors to serve the needs of the Church. Once we get past the current phase (phase 4 which is focused on operational change), then we embark on the real work of Renew My Church.

Mission Revitalization

Phase 5 will concentrate on revamping ministries to promote evangelization and formation. The goal of phase 5 is a vibrant parish community that truly concentrates on three basic things. These three basic things are captured in our new

Let Me Introduce Myself

Hi. I'm Father Lanza and I've been appointed by Cardinal Cupich as the pastor for *Divine Mercy* parish which is comprised of two houses of worship, and thus, two campuses, St. Philip the Apostle church and Sacred Heart church.

For the past four years I've been pastoring Sacred Heart parish. I was ordained in 1981 by Cardinal Cody for the Archdiocese. I've served as pastor in three different parishes: Sacred Heart (4 years), St. Julie Billiart (13 years), and Notre Dame de Chicago (8 years).

I have co-authored the *Foundation in Faith* series of books for use in adult initiation ministry (RCIA). I've also contributed to the grammar school religion textbook series *Faith First*, authoring the 7th and 8th grade parish books in that series. In addition, I 've co-authored of the RCL-Benziger on-line resources *Apprentices in Faith and Young Apprentices* for initiation ministry.

I grew up in Ohio, graduated from Northwestern University (CAS 1976), taught religion for a year in a Catholic high school in Aurora and then entered the *University of St. Mary of the Lake* to study for the Archdiocesan priesthood. My Masters of Divinity is from Mundelein seminary, as well as an STL (Licenciate in Sacred Theology), a pontifical degree, also issued through Mundelein seminary.

mission tag line that the combined parish councils accepted at their May 21 meeting.

That mission statement of our new parish, *Divine Mercy*, is quite simple and straight forward—

Making Disciples Building Church Serving Others

—and if you recognize these three phrases as being similar to the tag line of the *Renew My Church* initiative you would be correct. Ours is very similar and deliberately so.

At the core of parish revitalization as envisioned by *Renew My Church* is the gospel push for disciples to make other disciples. Why?

We do not want "members" of a parish so much as "intentional disciples." Clubs and organizations have members. We are neither. We are Church, a faith community—whose life and faith revolves around a singularly unique person: Jesus Christ.

We are his disciples. Not in a passive, automatic way, but intentionally so! Disciples orient their entire life around Jesus: their

whole life, their entire life. That's a tall order, but it is what we are called to be and do by our Baptism.

Disciples make other disciples. They seek to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to everyone else and thus build up the Church. Disciples encourage others to join them in pursuing the kingdom of God.

Discipleship is not just inward-looking, as in helping to build Church.
Discipleship is also outward-looking, serving others, even those who do not believe as we do. Disciples make a difference in the world one step at a time, in small and large ways.

How Will We Get There?

We will spend the next year evaluating and creating a strategy for the future. As we do so, the current ministries will continue in both places, at the Sacred Heart and St. Philip sites of our parish. I encourage you to explore what each site has to offer. Try a new ministry, attend a new event.

Everyone currently on staff will continue, although we may experiment with moving various staff people from site to site, as well as with details of their current jobs. Meanwhile, the former Sacred Heart stewardship council and the former St. Philip parish

council will meet together as one combined council for *Divine Mercy*.

This combined council, as well as the parish staff, will strategize and brainstorm our way into the future. We will certainly communicate to you what we're thinking. There most likely will be some sort of town hall or general meetings to open up the conversation to everyone who is interested.

Fair warning: we will be considering some real changes that some will find challenging. The situation demands it. We can either ignore things or meet our needs head on. To help us assess the current situation all priests of the Archdiocese are required to attend a special summit in October called *Divine Renovation*.

Divine Renovation

This three-day summit will be under the direction of the author of the book by the same title, Father Mallon. We'll be bringing back to the parish ideas for revitalization that he will share with us. Pastors will be able to invite a handful of persons from the parish to this three-day workshop in October.

Many months ago I scheduled my annual retreat for the same time as the October Divine Renovation


Up for Some Reading?

Father Mallon has written about the task ahead of us in his book, *Divine Renovation*, *Bringing your parish* from *maintenance* to *mission*, Twenty Third Publications, 2014 (286 pps).

Just to give you a sense of what he writes about, the title chapters are 1) House of Prayer: Remembering our Identity and Purpose, 2) Rebuild My House: From Vatican II to Pope Francis, 3) House of Pain: The Experience of a Maintenance Church, 4) Clearing out the Junk: What We Need to Jettison if We Are Going to Rebuild, 5) Laying the Foundation: How to Transform the Culture of the Parish Community, 6) The Front Door: The Sacraments as Our Greatest Pastoral Opportunity, 7) Leader of the House: The Essential Role of Leadership.

We ask this of you who live and reign with the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.



Renew My Church

Our Renew My Church journey is both spiritual (to re-encounter Jesus Christ as disciples and parish communities) and structural (to ensure our parishes have adequate resources for vitality).



Why the need for spiritual renewal?

We are facing not an "age of change" but a "change for the ages."

What is the fundamental change needed for a truly renewed Church?

Making sure that everything we do is implicitly and explicitly rooted in helping people know and share Jesus Christ. This involves change, or conversion, on three levels:

- **Personal:** Our own, personal encounter with Christ through which we become missionary disciples.
- Parish: Sharing with each other the life we have experienced in encountering Christ. This means taking responsibility for the building up of the parish as a community of faith, starting with the need to cooperate and collaborate as your parish prepares for and eventually becomes activated in the Renew My Church process within your grouping.
- Archdiocese: The Cardinal and his staff are responsible for providing vision, resources, and support necessary to lead people and communities to authentic relationship with Christ.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Will the Mass Schedule Change?

The Mass schedule is contingent upon the number of priests we have at Divine Mercy. Right now, we do not expect the schedule to change.

What about the Priests?

As of today, Fr. Mike Solazzo's term as Administrator of St. Philip the Apostle comes to an end. Instead, he becomes an Associate Pastor of Divine Mercy Parish. Fr. Dean Semmer has also been assigned as an Associate Pastor of Divine Mercy Parish. Fr. Dan Cassidy becomes a resident of Divine Mercy Parish.

What happens to Sacred Heart School?

The school operation remains as it is, but as a part of Divine Mercy Parish. We should note that it is the first time in four years that enrollment at Sacred Heart School has increased. Congratulations to our school principal, our faculty, staff and dedicated parents.
