FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

DID YOU KNOW?

America magazine, the Jesuit weekly periodical published in the USA, has a new feature called "infographic." It's a one-page information sheet that details some interesting phenomena of the Catholic church accompanied by graphics and illustrations to help get the point across.

In their April 29 issue, the infographic was about the "two churches of the United States." What they meant by that is the division between those states that have a growing Catholic population and those that have a declining Catholic population. There are 1,437 fewer Catholic parishes in the United States now than there were in 1971, and yet there are a number of states where dozens of Catholic parishes have actually opened in the past few decades.

Basically, what's happening is that older Catholics are moving south (or where it's generally warmer and/or less expensive to live). The biggest Catholic changes in population are seen in North Carolina, Georgia, Nevada, South Carolina and Utah. The biggest losses in Catholic population are currently seen in Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Michigan, Vermont, and Massachusetts.

Most of the Catholic parishes that are opening up in the south and the west are building churches that are able to seat 1,000 worshippers at a time, partly because while the church is growing in these areas vocations to the priesthood are in decline, thus necessitating larger buildings for bigger assemblies/ fewer Masses. Interestingly, most churches in the U.S. constructed before 1950 had fewer than 500 seats.

So while parishes are closing or consolidating in the north and the east, Catholic parishes in the south and west are increasing. Interesting factoid that I figured you'd be interested in.






FOR YOUR INFORMATION

Early last week, a parishioner who had attended the 9am Mass at Sacred Heart Church two weeks ago, alerted the parish staff of a swastika scratched into the pew in which they sat. 
INDEPENDENCE DAY

As part of our Renew My Church efforts in building our new reality to become a vibrant faith community that seeks to make disciples, build church and serve others, we look to the Holy Spirit for guidance and strive to be BOLD in all that we do! That can manifest itself in many ways, that the possibilities are endless. We wanted to share with you one of the (visible) steps our Senior Leadership Team decided to take to help us be more bold!

One month ago, on June 16th, the Feast of the Holy Trinity, when we celebrated Father's Day with all the wonderful Dads we know, we invited several men from the parish and our staff to share their thoughts on fatherhood.

We wanted to share with you the text of some of those Father's Day Reflections in this column. They're a great reminder to us that we need to be bold!

This reflection comes to you from Deacon Gerry Keenan, who spoke at the 7:30 a.m. and 9:00a.m. Masses (at Sacred Heart Church) on June 16, 2019.

The progressive reformer, Jane Addams, in 1911 wrote, "Poor Father has been left out in the cold. He doesn't get much recognition. It would be a good thing if he had a day that would mean recognition of him."

The first three of the Ten Commandments deal with our relationship with God. The remaining instruct us about our relationship with our fellow human beings. The first of these human-relationship commands reads, "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land which the Lord your God gives you" (Exodus 20:12).

It is a command with promise. Give honor to your parents, and you will be a person whose life will be a quality existence.

Today we celebrate Father's Day in a land where so many children grow up with no father or father figure. We are a society searching for a model father.

My friend, David Hirsch, experienced father absence as a child, and has focused a great deal of attention to promote Fatherhood through the Illinois Fatherhood Initiative, which he founded in 1997.

I'm not as involved in the Fatherhood Initiative as I probably should be. I had a wonderful father; that may have left me less motivated than others. But one of the little things I do is to serve as a judge in the annual Fatherhood Essay Contest for children from Chicago city schools. Hundreds of essays are submitted, but only a few can be selected as winners.

I wanted to share with you one that touched me most deeply.

Hey Dad!

I know it hasn't always been easy for you to be my father, but I also know you've always done, and always do, your very best.

I think God put us in each others lives even before I was born. He knew I needed you long before I did. Maybe God knew you needed me too even before you did.

If there was one sentence, word or expression I could scream that would let you know how lucky I am to call you "Dad," I'd yell it with joy from the highest hilltop. I'd post it on the fridge, in the bathroom, on the front door, on your car mirror, on the back of your phone and maybe, just for fun, even by the toilet.

You've helped me see who I want to

be one day if I'm lucky and God continues to bless me.

You've learned me patience, wisdom, and how to care for others. You've taught me a lot about caring for ourselves too, although I know there are still plenty of lessons to learn.

I wish your father could be here with us to celebrate too. I bet he'd be so proud to see the dad you are to me.

How fun it could be to laugh with him, have a meal together, watch the game, toss the ball around, and just hang with each other on our very special day!

I wonder if he watches down on us and sees us even when we can't see him? Do you think he does?

I'll be with you all day Sunday for our special day. It'll be just you and me in the hospital room as much as the nurses and doctors will let us be. I know you still don't open your eyes and can't talk, but I've got plenty of thank you's to say and lots of hugs to give.

I love you dad. You've always been the best dad for me.

A REFLECTION FROM THE HENRI NOUWEN SOCIETY

Compassion is Being With June 16

Let us not underestimate how hard it is to be compassionate. Compassion is hard because it requires the inner disposition to go with others to the place where they are weak, vulnerable, lonely, and broken. But this is not our spontaneous response to suffering. What we desire most is to do away with suffering by fleeing from it or finding a quick cure for it. As busy, active, relevant [people], we want to earn our bread by making a real contribution. This means first and foremost doing something to show that our presence makes a difference. And so we ignore our greatest gift, which is our ability to enter into solidarity with those who suffer. . . . Those who can sit with their fellow man, not knowing what to say but knowing that they should be there, can bring new life into a dying heart.

Those who are not afraid to hold a hand in gratitude, to shed tears of grief, and to let a sigh of distress arise straight from the heart can break through paralyzing boundaries and witness the birth of a new fellowship, the fellowship of the broken.


The internationally renowned priest and author, respected professor and beloved pastor Henri Nouwen wrote 39 books on the spiritual life. He corresponded regularly in English, Dutch, German, French and Spanish with hundreds of friends and reached out to thousands through his Eucharistic celebrations, lectures and retreats. Since his death in 1996, ever-increasing numbers of readers, writers, teachers and seekers have been guided by his literary legacy. Nouwen's books have sold over 8 million copies and been published in over 28 languages.

Born in Nijkerk, Holland, on January 24, 1932, Nouwen felt called to the priesthood at a very young age. He was ordained in 1957 as a diocesan priest and studied psychology at the Catholic University of Nijmegen. In 1964 he moved to the United States to study at the Menninger Clinic. He went on to teach at the University of Notre Dame, and the Divinity Schools of Yale and Harvard. For several months during the 1970s, Nouwen lived and worked with the Trappist monks in the Abbey of the Genesee, and in the early 1980s he lived with the poor in Peru. In 1985 he was called to join L'Arche in Trosly, France, the first of over 100 communities founded by Jean Vanier where people with developmental disabilities live with assistants. A year later Nouwen came to make his home at L'Arche Daybreak near Toronto, Canada. He died suddenly on September 21st, 1996, in Holland and is buried in Richmond Hill, Ontario.

Nouwen believed that what is most personal is most universal; he wrote, "By giving words to these intimate experiences I can make my life available to others." His spirit lives on in the work of the Henri Nouwen Society, Henri Nouwen Stichting, the Henri Nouwen Trust, the Henri J. M. Nouwen Archives and Research Collection, and in all who live the spiritual values of communion, community and ministry, to which he dedicated his life.

MEET ST. BONAVENTURE FEAST DAY JULY 15th

Perhaps not a household name for most people, Saint Bonaventure, nevertheless, played an important role in both the medieval Church and the history of the Franciscan Order. A senior faculty member at the University of Paris, Saint Bonaventure certainly captured the hearts of his students through his academic skills and insights. But more importantly, he captured their hearts through his Franciscan love for Jesus and the Church. Like his model, Saint Francis, Jesus was the center of everything—his teaching, his administration, his writing, and his life. So much so, that he was given the title "Seraphic Doctor."



Born in Bagnorea (Italy) in 1221, Saint Bonaventure was baptized John, but received the name Bonaventure when he became a Franciscan at the age of 22. Little is known about his childhood, but we do know that his parents were Giovanni di Fidanza and Maria Ritell. It seems that his father was a physician and a man of means. While Saint Francis died about five years after the saint's birth, he is credited with healing Bonaventure as a boy of a serious illness.

Saint Bonaventure's teaching career

came to a halt when the Friars elected him to serve as their General Minister. His 17 years of service were not easy as the Order was embroiled in conflicts over the interpretation of poverty. Some friars even ended up in heresy saying that Saint Francis and his community were inaugurating the era of the Holy Spirit which was to replace Jesus, the Church, and Scripture. But because he was a man of prayer and a good administrator, Saint Bonaventure managed to structure the Order through effective legislation. But more importantly, he offered the Friars an organized spirituality based on the vision and insights of Saint Francis. Always a Franciscan at heart and a mystical writer, Bonaventure managed to unite the pastoral, practical aspects of life with the doctrines of the Church. Thus, there is a noticeable warmth to his teachings and writings that make him very appealing.

Shortly before he ended his service as General Minister, Pope Gregory X created him a Cardinal and appointed him bishop of Albano. But a little over a year later, while participating in the Second Council of Lyon, Saint Bonaventure suddenly died on July 15, 1274. There is a theory that he was poisoned.

Saint Bonaventure left behind a structured and renewed Franciscan Order and a body of work all of which glorifies his major love—Jesus.
