FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

THE SUBJECT IS MONEY

It's surprising to some, but Jesus talks quite a bit about money, stewardship, giving to the poor and the proper place of wealth in the lives of his disciples. Just Google the subject "Jesus and money" and a variety of scriptural lists will come up. This past Sunday's gospel text is one example of the subject matter.

The rich man tears down his barn to build a bigger one so that he can store all his piled up goods, his wealth. That night he dies. How has his stockpiling helped him out now? Jesus advises us to store up riches in heaven. That would be the most important priority for us believers.

It's in this light and in light of many other teachings of Jesus on wealth, and the management of wealth, that we tackle the topic of how Divine Mercy manages the gifts and donations of generous parishioners and friends of the parish.

Capital Income

We've talked about this before, but once again, just to be clear: if you made a pledge and have paid on it to either the Sacred Heart or the St. Philip the Apostle capital campaign, your gift remains with that particular campaign. It will therefore be used for that campus and that campus only.

The campaign at St. Philip has concluded. All of the projects that comprise that campaign have been taken care of with funds raised through that particular campaign. Since then, other necessary projects for that campus have come to light. With the approval of the Finance Council, whose membership is drawn from both worship sites, untapped funds raised from the capital campaign have been used to take care of those additional capital projects. For example, the absolutely necessary sewer work that needed to be done at St. Philip, including sewer

rodding and replacement of sump pumps. A number of St. Philip CD's also were tapped for additional projects including, but not limited to, replacement of the rectory boiler, replacement of the church sound system and other projects.

The campaign at Sacred Heart has not yet concluded. While some projects have been completed (school boilers and church stained glass windows), there are a number of items from the case statement that will be addressed in the near future. Funds raised at Sacred Heart for the Legacy of the Heart have been used and will continue to be used for the particular campaign projects. A footnote: the rectory window project was not a part of the campaign. It has been funded, in large part, through the wonderful generosity of parishioners who wished to provide new, workable windows for the rectory located at Sacred Heart.

In both cases, my point is the same. Funds raised for the two capital campaigns were used at each campus for that campus only. Why? Because that is the proper thing to do. In any capital campaign, donors donate to specific projects or causes. We must honor the intention of the donor. And we do.

Ordinary Income

Gifts are given in the collection basket at every weekend Mass. In addition, gifts are given on-line. In these instances, the gifts are for the ordinary upkeep of the parish operation.

There is only one parish, Divine Mercy. So while we track each collection amount by Mass and each electronic donation by campus, the funds raised through Sunday giving are used to pay for salaries, benefits, maintenance costs, and other ordinary expenses of the parish throughout both campuses.



Divine Mercy parish is responsible for running both campuses. Both campuses are the physical platform for Divine Mercy to peruse the mission of Christ in this world. Therefore what donors give in the Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections all goes toward the pursuit of that mission as enacted on and from the two campuses.

Further Notes

There is only one parish checkbook, so to speak. In past times, parish organizations maintained their own checkbooks from funds raised within the organization, for example, the men's club or women's guild. A number of years ago, the Archdiocese asked all pastors to attend to a "best practices" list.

One of those best practices was the elimination of separate checkbooks for parish organizations and groups. Does that mean that funds raised for that group are no longer used for the purposes of the group? Not at all.

Those funds continue to be disbursed as the group discerns. The group leaders work with the parish accountant to disburse such funds.

Every bit of our financial workings, whether that is ordinary or extraordinary income and expenses, is overseen by the parish Finance Council. Current members include: Jim Dietz Felicia O'Malley Tom Borders Bob Snediker Chris Kaiser Jim Campbell Jon Skelly and Rob O'Keef.



They meet monthly with myself, our Director of Operations, Michelle Wasielewski, and our parish accountant, Cindy Atsaves. In that we are in phase five of Renew My Church, the Archdiocese also monitors our budget and our financial operations. There are a lot of eyes on our accounting and financial decision-making. That's a good thing.

All of this, of course, goes back to Jesus' teaching on wealth and good stewardship. We are blessed to have many generous donors. Our goal is to make the best possible use of these gifts for the sake of the kingdom of God as we continue to pursue the mission of Christ in the world as we: Make Disciples, Build Church and Serve Others.

A scripture reflection group meets every Monday morning. We'll meet at the Sacred Heart offices after the 8:30am Mass.



MEET ST. MAXIMILIAN MARY KOLBE

St. Maximilian Kolbe was born as Raymund Kolbe on January 8, 1894, in the Kingdom of Poland, part of the Russian Empire. He was a Polish Conventual Franciscan friar and a martyr in the German death Camp of Auschwitz during World War II.

St. Maximilian Kolbe was very active in promoting the Immaculate Virgin Mary and is known as the Apostle of Consecration to Mary. Much of his life was strongly influenced by a vision he had of the Virgin Mary when he was (age) 12.

"That night I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity, and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both." One year after his vision, Kolbe and his elder brother, Francis joined the Conventual Franciscans. In 1910, Kolbe was given the religious name Maximilian, after being allowed to enter the novitiate, and in 1911, he professed his first vows.

At the age of 21, Kolbe earned a doctorate in philosophy from the Pontifical Gregorian University. He would also earn a doctorate in theology by the time he was 28. St. Maximilian Kolbe organized the Militia Immaculata (Army of the Immaculate One) after witnessing demonstrations against Pope St. Pius X and Benedict XV. His goal was to work for the conversion of sinners and enemies of the Church, specifically, the Freemasons and he would so with the intercession of Mary.

In 1918, he was ordained a priest and continued his work of promoting Mary throughout Poland. Over the next several years, Kolbe took on publishing. He founded a monthly periodical titled, "Rycerz

Niepokalanej" (Knight of the Immaculate). He also operated a religious publishing press and founded a new Conventual Franciscan monastery at Niepokalanow, which became a major religious publishing center. Kolbe also founded monasteries in both Japan and India. To this day, the monastery in Japan remains prominent in the Roman Catholic Church in Japan.

In 1936, Kolbe's poor health forced him to return home to Poland, and once the WWII invasion by Germany began, he became one of the only brothers to remain in the monastery. He opened up a temporary hospital to aid those in need. When his town was captured, Kolbe was sent to prison but released three months later.

Kolbe refused to sign a document that would recognize him as a German citizen with his German ancestry and continued to work in his monastery, providing shelter for refugees - including hiding 2,000 Jews from German persecution. After receiving permission to continue his religious publishing, Kolbe's monastery acted as a publishing house again and issued many anti-Nazi German publications.

On February 17, 1941, the monastery was shut down; Kolbe was arrested by the German Gestapo and taken to the Pawiak prison. Three months later, he was transferred to Auschwitz.

Never abandoning his priesthood, Kolbe was the victim to severe violence and harassment. Toward the end of his second month in Auschwitz, men were chosen to face death by starvation to warn against escapes. Kolbe was not chosen but volunteered to take the place of a man with a family.


It is said during the last days of his life Kolbe led prayers to Our Lady with the prisoners and remained calm. He was the last of the group to remain alive, after two weeks of dehydration and starvation. The guards gave him a lethal injection of carbolic acid. The stories tell that he raised his left arm and calmly awaited death.

St. Maximilian Kolbe died on August 14 and his remains were cremated on August 15, the same day as the Assumption of Mary feast day.

Recognized as the Servant of God, Kolbe was beatified as a "Confessor of the Faith" on October 17, 1971 by Pope Paul VI and canonized by Pope John Paul II on October 10, 1982. Pope John Paul II declared Kolbe not a confessor, but a martyr.

Kolbe's is often depicted in a prison uniform and with a needle being injected into an arm. He is the patron saint of drug addicts, prisoners, families, and the pro-life movement and his feast day is celebrated on August 14.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

It may be helpful for some to know the history of how the Solemnity of the Assumption came about.

"On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names—Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.





Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven.
Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. (Tradition identifies her with the "woman clothed with the sun.") Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven."

"What is the Assumption of Mary?
The Assumption of Mary is the teaching that:
The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed

the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory [Pius XII, Munificentissimus Deus 44].

What level of authority does this teaching have? This teaching was infallibly defined by Pope Pius XII on November 1, 1950 in the bull Munificentissimus Deus (Latin, "Most Bountiful God"). As Pius XII explained, this is "a divinely revealed dogma" (ibid.). This means that it is a dogma in the proper sense. It is thus a matter of faith that has been divinely revealed by God and that has been infallibly proposed by the Magisterium (leadership) of the Church as such."
