

FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Work will begin shortly on a number of capital projects at both Sacred Heart and St Philip campuses. The project to clean and repair the stained glass windows and their frames (at Sacred Heart) has already begun. The project to address some areas of concern in the school gym (at St Philip) has also begun.

I'd like to remind all our parishioners that your payments on your pledges for these projects stay within the particular campus or house of worship. In other words, if you pledge and paid toward the *Legacy of the Heart* capital campaign at Sacred Heart, your gift remains at Sacred Heart in order to fund the various capital expenditures as outlined in the original case statement for that campaign. The same goes for the *To Teach Who Christ Is* capital campaign at St Philip.

As you read this, try not to be confused by the names of the campaigns. Every parish in the Archdiocese was required to mount a fundraising effort for the Archdiocesan *To Teach Who Christ Is* (TTWCI) campaign. Individual parishes were given the option of running their own campaign, as long as they fulfilled their TTWCI goal. Sacred Heart opted to run its own campaign, hence the different title, *Legacy of the Heart.* St Philip chose to go with the Archdiocesan campaign title.

In either case, the point is that your gift in support of capital projects stays within whatever campus you originally pledged. I know this sounds a bit complicated, but only because of the nomenclature. Forget the nomenclature. The reality is as I've just described it: we are honoring your capital pledge to a particular place because we must.

Thank you for your sacrificial giving and commitment to making this new parish and our combining a success.

VATICAN CHANGES CATECHISM TEACHING ON DEATH PENALTY

The Vatican changed (on Thursday, August 2nd) the Catechism of the Catholic Church's teaching on the permissibility of the death penalty, which the Church has taught is legitimate in limited cases, stating the penalty is 'inadmissible,' and its elimination should be sought.

A new draft of paragraph 2267 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church was issued by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith Aug. 2, after Pope Francis approved it in May.

Quoting Pope Francis' words in a speech of Oct. 11, 2017, the new paragraph states, in part, that "the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that 'the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person,' and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide."

Reasons for changing the teaching, the paragraph says, include: the

increasing effectiveness of detention systems, growing understanding of the unchanging dignity of the person, and leaving open the possibility of conversion.

Until now, the Church has consistently taught that the state has the authority to use the death penalty, in cases of "absolute necessity," though with the qualification that the Church considered such situations to be extremely rare.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church had stated: "Assuming that the guilty party's identity and responsibility have been fully determined, the traditional teaching of the Church does not exclude recourse to the death penalty, if this is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor."

The new teaching will be included in all the editions of the Catechism going forward, a Vatican communique stated Aug. 2.

The full text of the new draft of paragraph 2267 states, in full: "Recourse to the death penalty on the part of legitimate authority, following a fair trial, was long considered an appropriate response to the gravity of certain crimes and



an acceptable, albeit extreme, means of safeguarding the common good."

"Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not lost even after the commission of very serious crimes. In addition, a new understanding has emerged of the significance of penal sanctions imposed by the state. Lastly, more effective systems of detention have been developed, which ensure the due protection of citizens but, at the same time, do not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption."

"Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that 'the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person,' [1] and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide."

In a letter to bishops Aug. 2, Cardinal Luis Ladaria, prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, gave a brief overview of developments to the Church's teaching on the death penalty over the last decades, and the perspective of the three most recent popes.

He noted, in particular, Pope St. John Paul II's teachings in Evangelium Vitae, which were subsequently added to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, presenting the death penalty as not a

> proportionate penalty for the gravity of certain crimes, though justifiable if "the only practicable way to defend the lives of human beings effectively..."

"The new revision... situates itself in continuity with the preceding Magisterium while bringing forth a coherent development of Catholic doctrine," Ladaria wrote.

"The new formulation of number 2267 of the Catechism of the Catholic

Church desires to give energy to a movement towards a decisive commitment to favor a mentality that recognizes the dignity of every human life," he said.

"And, in respectful dialogue with civil authorities, to encourage the creation of conditions that allow for the elimination of the death penalty where it is still in effect."



ADULT FORMATION

FINDING GOD IN EVERYDAY LIFE

There are 4 key elements in finding God in our everyday lives.

- The realization, the conviction, that God is there. After that, it is all very easy.
- A belief in the Good News that Jesus won a victory over sin and death by his dying and rising for us.
- Dying to Self.
- Careful practice.

God is there

Once I really realize God is there, and become convinced of it, my heart hungers to find God there. Once my appetite is whet, I desire to find God in a much different way than I look for my car keys. What I'm really desiring is intimacy with God. I want to know I'm not alone in my life. I want to be connected with God.

How is God there? Or, "who am I connecting with?" God made this whole world and gave life to each and every one of us who lives in it. God made us with purpose - that we be happy with God forever. So, we are not looking for or connecting with a God who is distant or indifferent. Our God is passionately engaged in drawing us to the fullness of life we were created for. We are seeking to find a God who loves us and is always seeking intimacy with us. It is simple. A sense of absence vanishes when I am open to a sense of presence.

Living in the Good News

I can hardly go through a single day without encountering the reality of sin and death - in me and in the world around me. One way to cope is to join in our culture's denial of the reality of sin and death. Our faith gives us another way. We have come to believe that Jesus is Lord, most especially where sin and death seem to prevail. We have come to believe that we can open our eyes and act fearlessly in the face of death. We have come to believe we have nothing to fear. We have come to believe that it is precisely in the places where we encounter the greatest darkness or brokeness or confusion that we will find God. There we discover our Savior. There we experience the Good News. It is in those everyday places - where we taste frailty, unreliability, emptiness - that we find God's love is most powerfully present. Attentive faith finds the gift being offered in every human

situation: a love and a peace the world can not give.

Less Self-absorbed

When I don't fear death as much, I am less afraid of dying to myself. It sounds so obvious. When I'm absorbed with myself - my needs, how much attention I'm getting, doing things my way, everything in reference to me - it is pretty difficult to find God. The "space" inside of me is pre-occupied. However, as my openness to and hunger for a loving presence grows, I am de-selfished and freer. Often my self-pity or selffocus comes out of a fear that I won't have "enough." I fear any "emptiness" so I "fill" it guickly. However, when I ask to be emptied, I discover an empowering fullness. When I become more and more focused on how very much is being offered me in the loving presence of Jesus, discovered in every part of my day, I discover the

power of Augustine's prayer: "O Lord, Our God, you have created us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest in you."

Practice, Practice, Practice

Practice makes the difference. What did we ever "get good at" that didn't involve lots of practice? Changing my patterns, my habits, my routines may be difficult, but I know that I am very resilient and quite resourceful when I really want something. Choice is the key. Making the choice to adopt some new patterns allows it to happen. God is always choosing to be with me, in any way, in any situation I will be open to. The choice to get better at meeting God there is all mine.


