

FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

CONTRASTING APPROACHES

At a recent weekday Mass the scriptures were very interesting, in that they painted contrasting pictures of how to deal with need. Before you read any further, grab your Bible or go on-line and look up the following: Numbers 11:4b-15 and Matthew 14:13-21.

The first reading, from Numbers, details how Moses reacted to the grumbling of the people of God as they wandered in the desert. They were hungry with the lack of food and recalled how in Egypt, as slaves, they had a variety of food to eat. Now freed but in the desert, all they have is Manna from heaven, which while it is nourishing, isn't real tasty. And there's no variety.

Moses, in reaction, complains to God. "I cannot carry this people by myself, for they are too heavy for me. If this is the way you will deal with me, then please do me the favor of killing me at once, so that I need no longer face this distress."

Wow! Grumbling and complaining, all around! The people complain to Moses. Moses complains to God.

Contrast that situation with Jesus in Matthew's gospel where he's preaching and healing. Vast crowds follow him about. Daylight is waning and the disciples advise Jesus to send the crowd away because they are hungry and there's nothing to give them except five loaves and two fish. What does Jesus do? He takes those limited gifts, those few blessings, praises God, prays over those loaves and fish and distributes them to the people. All eat. All are satisfied. Indeed, twelve baskets of food are left over.

GRUMBLE OR BLESS GOD?

We all have needs. We have personal needs. We have needs within our families. We have parish needs.

There are two approaches to our needs. We can grumble and complain because of our needs. Or we can acknowledge and thank God for the blessings and gifts that we do indeed have or experience, raise those blessings and gifts up in prayer—even if they are what we'd describe as "limited" blessings and gifts (like five loaves and two fish).



When we take the approach of Jesus and acknowledge and thank God for the blessings and gifts we do have, I believe that, in Christ, those blessings and gifts get multiplied. In other words, when we focus on the gifts and blessings, the needs will be taken care of by God, in God's own time, in his own way, through his providence and love.

This is true for us as individuals, as families and as a parish. Praise and thank God for what we have and who we are. Those very blessings from God will multiply in a miraculous fashion. Believe it!

HEALING OURSELVES AND OTHERS FROM A PLACE OF CENTERING PRAYER/ MEDITATION

Be Still and Know That I am God. (Psalm 46:10)

This simple wisdom saying is an invitation given to you by God during our spiritual journey. It is a call to take time and set aside some of our activities to explore the rich wisdom and teachings of the Contemplative tradition through the method of Centering Prayer and Meditation.

The main focus in this spiritual journey program is: Who is God in my life? Who am I (from psychological and spiritual perspectives)?, and How can I transform? The Centering Prayer/ Meditation was developed by Fr. Thomas Keating, a Cistercian Trappist Monk, of St. Benedict's Monastery in Snowmass, Colorado. The teaching includes live video conferences given by Fr. Thomas Keating for this Spiritual Journey, discussions and Centering Prayer Meditation.

For the convenience of the participants, weekly sessions are offered on 2 different days and times: (resuming) Thursday, September 19th at 7:00-8:30pm and Saturday, September 21st from 9:15am-10:30am.

A BRIEF BACKGROUND TO CENTERING PRAYER

In the 1970's, a group of Cistercian monks at St. Joseph's Abbey, continued the work started by Thomas Merton of searching for a means of reviving the contemplative tradition and the practice of Lectio Divina. This resulted in the development of Centering Prayer. Centering Prayer is drawn from ancient prayer practices of



the Christian contemplative heritage, notably the Fathers and Mothers of the Desert, the monastic practice of Lectio Divina

(praying the scriptures), "The Cloud of Unknowing," St. John of the Cross, and St. Teresa of Avila. It was distilled into a simple method of prayer in the 1970's by three Trappist monks, Fr. William Meninger, Fr. Basil Pennington and Abbot Thomas Keating at St. Joseph's Abbey in Spencer, Massachusetts.

It was initially offered to priests and religious, and later to lay people. The response was so positive, that Fr. Thomas Keating designed an advanced workshop to train people to teach the way of Centering Prayer. By 1984, it had become clear that those who were deepening their prayer lives through Centering Prayer would benefit from a structure which could provide ongoing support, formation and information. An organization was formed known as Contemplative Outreach. This organization presents Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina through a series of week-end and day retreats, prepares follow-up material for those who wish to deepen their understanding of the spiritual life, and organizes a network of groups and individuals who practice Centering Prayer.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP A LOOK AT THE SCRIPTURES


"For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." Luke 12:34

DEACON MIKE McNULTY'S RESPONSE TO THE SHARPE FAMILY

August 10, 2019

Dear Jerry and Jeanne Sharp,

Thank you for your note, your visit and the book Divine Favor. As it happens, I have had a copy of the book for some time, and it occupies a prominent place on a coffee table in my living room. Some years ago Joseph called the parish. He had heard we were about to renovate once again, and he wondered what would become of all his art work. It included the Vine and Branches, the Baptismal Font, the Holy Water Fonts, and Christ the Teacher and the Four Evangelists. I happened to answer his call and reassured him we considered all to be treasures of our

church. He then told me this story.

The O'Connells were patients of a Dentist who happened to be the father of Reynold Hillenbrand, then our Pastor (at Sacred Heart Church). Msgr. consulted with Joseph who, at that time, described himself as a "starving artist", about creating a rendering of the scripture passage "I am the vine and you are the branches". That passage was central to the vision Msgr. Hillenbrand had for the parish. Of course, thanks to Joseph and his great God-given talent it still is the centerpiece of our sanctuary. That led to our Baptismal Font.

Joseph said he was then living in a rooming house in Chicago. The couple who were his landlords had a brother who was a bit of

a disciplinary problem at Holy Name Cathedral High School. The nuns, in an attempt to "channel his energy into constructive activity", recognized that he had musical talent. The young man wanted to play piano, but as a result of an accident had only 3 fingers on one hand. So the nuns bought him a used trumpet, which of course has only 3 valves and he went on to become a great jazz musician. His name was Muggsy Spanier and I often saw him perform at the Blue Note, then a hot spot located where St. Peter Basilica now stands in downtown Chicago. Because of laws preventing the sale of alcohol on Sundays in those days the Blue Note was closed and Muggsy would bring his band to his sisters' rooming house for a jam session and some dinner on Sunday evenings.

Joseph apparently played a little saxophone himself, and regularly sat in at the jam sessions. He and Muggsy became great pals. The result – when he designed our Baptismal Font Joseph rendered the angel Gabriel blowing his horn with only 3 fingers as a tribute to his pal Muggsy. I asked him what Msgr. had to say about a 3 fingered angel, and he said that 'Msgr, never noticed and I never told him'. After I thought about it I came to the conclusion that a 3 fingered angel was a pretty good metaphor. None of us are perfect, not even angels. Father Ferrigan wanted him to come for the rededication of our church and tell that story, but he declined. I later heard it was because he was dying of cancer at the time. We were sad that he was unable to be with us, but we are truly blessed by his art as well as his story.
