

FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

GOD'S WORD

It seemed, once again, that the word of God found in Sacred Scripture helped to deal with the present news cycle regarding the Church. Here's how I interpreted last Sunday's scripture.

Homily 9-9-18

The Catholic Church has been in the news a lot—and not in a good way.

This summer, after years of rumors about Cardinal McCarrick acting inappropriately with adult seminarians, the Archdiocese of Newark received an accusation of his abuse of a *minor* and deemed it credible. An investigation was initiated.

A few weeks ago the Pennsylvania grand jury report was released to the public. The bishops in those dioceses apparently fought to keep the information it contained under wraps.

Soon after, Archbishop Viganó, former apostolic nuncio to the U.S., published his so-called testimony, accusing Pope Francis of ignoring or possibly rescinding sanctions which he said were imposed against McCarrick by Benedict XVI when he was pope. As a result, Viganó called on Pope Francis to resign.

Pope Francis, when asked by a reporter about this, said that the Viganó letter spoke for itself so he wouldn't say anything about it right then, maybe later. At the same time, the pope invited journalists to investigate. Most news outlets took the pope's silence as damaging.

It seems to go from bad to worse, to confusing, to upsetting, to overwhelming, to what—what next?

In this situation, steps the prophet Isaiah (first reading)—Say to those whose hearts are frightened: be strong, fear not! Here comes your God with vindication. The eyes of the blind will be opened. The ears of the deaf will be cleared. The lame will

leap! Mute tongues will sing!

We may not be leaping and singing, but, OK, Isaiah, we get the message—*Stay steady, God accompanies us!* So let us let God do God's thing among us to bring wholeness, life and rightness.

How do we let God do God's thing?

First we take a breath. We can follow the lead of Pope Francis. He chose not to say anything immediately. He chose prayer and reflective silence and encouraged others to investigate, check the facts, and set the record straight.

As a result of their investigating, Archbishop Viganó has already walked back his story. Now he's saying it wasn't a sanction that was imposed by Pope Benedict on McCarrick. A *sanction* is a technical, authoritative act under Canon Law that imposes a punishment or restriction on someone.

Viganó now says that he believes
Benedict conveyed a private wish or
recommendation to McCarrick that he
refrain from public activity and
ministry—which McCarrick ignored
and which Viganó also apparently
ignored because in that time frame
Viganó attended a banquet in
McCarrick's honor and concelebrated
a Mass with him. If, indeed, Benedict
privately spoke to McCarrick, Pope
Francis wouldn't have known
anything about it.

What *is* known is that when an accusation finally publicly surfaced this summer, action was taken immediately by Pope Francis.

McCarrick is no longer a Cardinal. He cannot exercise public ministry, pending a full canonical trial.

Pope Francis wisely did exactly as he should have by not immediately responding to Viganó. Why do I say that?

Viganó's agenda is clearly a conservative one. He wants to return to a has-been Church, a pre-Vatican II



Church, a Church characterized by clericalism—which is the very thing that got us into this mess in the first place!

The apostle James warns us (second reading)—Show no partiality! Have you not made distinctions among yourselves?

Partiality: that's what clericalism does. It shows undue partiality to those who are ordained. Distinctions: Isn't that the result of conservatives and liberals each saying, "We know best and nobody else does!" Ultimately, *God* alone knows best!

So the first step in letting God do God's thing is for us, like the pope, to step back, take a breath, pray, ponder and discern quietly how that *best-ness* of God might inform us.

Pope Francis will not allow himself to get pulled into the sick dysfunction which pits conservative voices against liberal voices and creates divisiveness within the Church.

In a dysfunctional family where a number of the members are sick, if there's one healthy member it's best if that healthy family member doesn't allow himself or herself to get caught up in the others' dysfunctionality.

Consistently throughout his pontificate, the agenda of Pope Francis has been to promote a widely embracing *pastoral* Church concerned with serving the needs of the poor, the marginalized, and the excluded, a pastoral Church which is neither liberal nor conservative, a Church which simply goes to every level of society and spreads the joy of the gospel.

FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN (CONTINUED)

This is a vision of the Church firmly based on the teachings of the Second Vatican Council. It's a vision not yet fully implemented and which we need now more than ever.

One way to look at this whole thing is to realize that a new Church *is* truly being born, even if it's being born in fits and starts and with a lot of pain.

We are moving from a top-down, hierarchical pray, pay and obey clerical Church to a Church where laity get much more involved in the mission of Christ, grabbing onto that mission and moving it forward.

Healing *will* take place in this Church of ours. Healing of victims and healing of all those hurt by this crisis. It will take a lot of time and effort. It will take a lot of prayer. It will take a lot of self-examination on the part of bishops. It will take a lot more of truth telling combined with the medicine of penance.

Healing will take place when we invoke and act upon the prayer of Jesus—*Ephphatha! Be opened!*

Be open, Jesus says, to the Spirit—and where that Holy Spirit is guiding us: to a serious reflective silence, a silence that allows light to penetrate darkness so that we might all continue to learn from grave mistakes and then take appropriate action.

Be open, Jesus says, to one another—for it is only in that *togetherness* that we will flourish and find the way to the kingdom which Jesus promises all his disciples.


