FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

On this past weekend, I once again found the scripture readings to speak to our current crisis in the Church.

Homily 9-16-18

I recently got a call from someone I know, John. John is self-employed. He is a salesman. He's been in telecommunications his entire professional life. Right now, John is being sued. This actually has happened once before. The first time he was sued he lost everything. Back then, he had to start over.

He survived that threat and he survived the threat of cancer, not once, but *twice*. John has been through an awful lot. You'd think all that would make him resilient, but John needed to talk because with this latest lawsuit, he feels the walls are closing in.

He's smart enough to know his current panic attacks, his shortness of breath, his inability to sleep are all signals that he's spiraling into depression, and with depression comes shame. John says he's ashamed he's not his normal self. He's ashamed he can't sit still. He's ashamed he can't make a sales call. He's ashamed he can't do anything outside of the house.

So I said to John, "*Look, you ever break your arm?*" His response was "*Yeah.*"

I then asked, "*What'd you do?*" He replied, "*Went to the emergency room, got the bones set and the doctor put a cast put on it.*"

When I asked, "*Were you ashamed of that?*" he replied "*No!*"

I then said, "*So why wouldn't you go now to a therapist, a counselor, a professional for some help? Sure, it's not a broken arm. But it's a broken psyche, a broken spirit.*"

We can't always fix things all by ourselves! Shame stops us cold. *Hope*, having some hope, even just a little bit of hope, is what moves us! A lot of good Catholics are a little depressed and ashamed right now. In this tough place where we find ourselves, the gospel sheds some light.

Peter blurts out his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, the *Christos*. But when Jesus

elaborates on the bad stuff in store for the Messiah—great suffering, rejection, death—Peter reacts negatively and tries to prevent Jesus from going in this direction. Jesus says—*You're thinking like humans, and not like God. Don't be like Satan and try to tempt me to avoid where I must go!*

Jesus says something very interesting to Peter—*Get behind me*.

He's teaching Peter, and us, the proper place of a disciple which is: to follow the Master. You can't do that unless you "get behind" the Master and allow the Master to do what the Master does, which is: he leads!

See? Jesus didn't say to Peter—*Here's the whole plan. I'm going to end up in Jerusalem on a cross. Even though I'll rise, I'm going to leave you for heaven and then send the Spirit, which is then going to cause you to end up in Rome, upside down, dying. But you'll eventually be revered as the first pope and keeper of the pearly gates!*

All Jesus said is—*Get behind me, follow!* One simple step a step focused on the person of Jesus—grounded in Peter's relationship with and trust in the Lord—that's enough.

Back to salesman John: he's had three sessions with a psychologist. In the third session, the therapist suggested something real simple, just one step for him to take in working through the depression. As a result, John has some hope that healing is actually possible.

In this Church situation, what steps can we ourselves take? I realize that these are "common sense" steps that you may already be doing. For what it's worth, here they are:

First, we pray, in fact, we pray more than ever, for victims, for Church leadership, for ourselves, for our parish. And if we can, we pray with others, that is, we don't pray alone.

Second, we celebrate the Eucharist, again and again, every weekend. Why would we deprive ourselves of the sacrament that nourishes and strengthens us, the sacrament



of loving self-sacrifice, the bread broken and the cup poured out for our sakes?

Third, we contemplate scripture, especially in these days, the Passion of Christ, realizing, once again, that the sins of this world are nailed to the Cross.

Fourth, we redouble and triple our efforts to do good and make a difference in the world—because we can and in doing so we conquer evil and Satan.

Meanwhile, some serious steps are being taken by Church leadership. In November, at the annual meeting of the U.S. bishops' conference, Cardinal DiNardo will introduce a three-point plan:

1. a full investigation into Archbishop McCarrick utilizing a Vatican led Apostolic visitation in concert with a group of lay experts identified by the current lay-run National Review Board,
2. opening up new and confidential channels for reporting complaints against bishops,
3. advocating for more effective resolution of future complaints.

The Holy See has promised that it will soon be publicly responding to the claims made by the recent Vigano letter. Pope Francis himself has demonstrated that he has learned from his mistake in dealing with Chile and not only corrected *that* mistake, but he immediately dealt with Archbishop McCarrick, and now Bishop Brunfield of West Virginia.

Pope Francis has also called a summit this February of all the presidents of the over-100 bishop's conferences world-wide to talk about the protection of minors and vulnerable adults, putting this concern squarely on the front burner of the Church.

As you know, victims of abuse are frequently overwhelmed by shame, even though they are *not* in any way responsible

for what happened. Shame is what prevents them from revealing they've been abused. Isaiah says—*I shall not be put to shame. See, the Lord God is my help.*

So, disciples—take the first step—get behind the Lord Jesus and allow him to lead us where we would never go on our own!



THE ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO TO HOLD A MASS FOR HOPE AND HEALING AT HOLY FAMILY PARISH—OCT. 20TH

The Mass is held to pray for the ongoing healing for child and youth sexual abuse survivors and their families.

The Archdiocese of Chicago's Office of Assistance Ministry will hold a Mass for Hope and Healing on Saturday, October 20, 2018 at 11 a.m. at Holy Family Church, 1080 West Roosevelt Road, Chicago. Fr. Michael Gabriel, pastor of Holy Family Church, and Fr. Larry Dowling, pastor of St. Agatha Church, will co-celebrate the Mass, where we will offer prayers for the ongoing healing of child and youth sexual abuse survivors, their families and the Church.

Michael Hoffman and Jim Richter, both victims-survivors, will give witness on behalf of victim-survivors of clergy sexual abuse. Attendees will include clergy, victim-survivors of clergy sexual abuse, family members and caregivers of survivors, church lay ministry staff, Catholic school leadership and many others who are committed to the protection and safety of children and youth.

"I attend this Mass every year and I am grateful for the opportunity to share something in common with abuse survivors in this heartfelt and prayerful liturgy," said Hoffman. "This type of outreach has helped me to reconcile myself to the traumatic loss I experienced at the hands of my abuser. I am thankful for this healing opportunity."

The Office for Assistance Ministry works to provide pastoral care, support and resources to victims-survivors of clerical sexual abuse and their loved ones in their efforts to achieve psychological, emotional and spiritual healing. The office was established as one of the first victim assistance ministries in the United States in 1992 to respond to the sexual abuse of minors by Archdiocesan clergy. Since its creation, it has provided services and support to more than 400 victims-survivors and their family members.

"I am grateful for the energy, support and company of others on this journey of hope and healing," said Richter. "I pray that other victims who live in silence with shame and guilt will also find a way to emerge from the shadows of pain and loneliness to find a measure of peace and comfort."

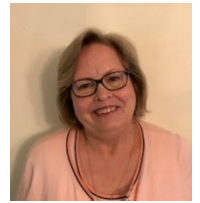

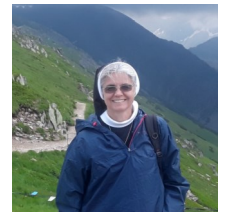

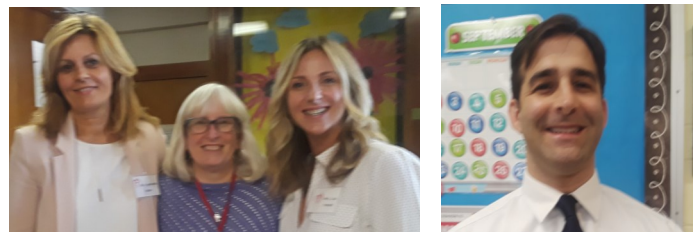
