FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

EVANGELIZATION, PART TWO

It just so happened that this past weekend we heard from Luke's gospel the encounter between Jesus and Zacchaeus. The same weekend, I wrote a column for the bulletin on evangelization. I thought it would be good to share with you further thoughts on evangelization that flow from last Sunday's gospel and formed the basis for the homily I offered at St. Philip the Apostle church. Here's a slightly edited version of that homily.

A man named Zacchaeus is seeking to see Jesus. We're not told *why* he's seeking. Most likely the simple answer is the correct one: Jesus is generating huge crowds in Jericho. They're excited by his passing through, kind of like if a rock star's motorcade were to pass through Winnetka or Northfield and people lined the road to catch a glimpse, so later on they can say to their friends and neighbors—I saw *Pink* (or) *Lady Gaga* (or) *Adam Levine*. I don't know. Fill in your favorite rock star.

Because of the huge crowd in Jericho, Zacchaeus is intrigued by this itinerant preacher passing through. Problem is, Zacchaeus can't see over the heads of the crowd. He's vertically challenged. So he climbs a tree in order to see. Jesus notices. They have a dialogue, and like so many other people in scripture, once having met Jesus, Zacchaeus is a changed man. Saved by a sycamore, imagine that!

This Scripture has something important to say to us about how we might be effective evangelizers today, specifically, how we might spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to others.

Last weekend I wrote in the bulletin about evangelization. This scripture offers a couple of key points regarding our evangelization efforts: 1) our excitement, like the excitement of the Jericho crowd, is significant in our evangelization efforts; and 2) getting near to Jesus in order to engage with him on a person-to-person level is also

very important.

It's all there, in the gospel, the excitement of the crowd which, in turn, works on Zacchaeus, causing him to be intrigued. And then Zacchaeus gets near enough to be noticed by Jesus who talks to him, creating a life-changing experience for this tax-collector.

In terms of evangelization, why is this important? According to the latest Barna study (*Reviving Evangelism: Current Realities that Demand a New Vision for Sharing Faith*, A Barna Report Produced in Partnership with Alpha USA, Barna Group, 2019, pps 31-34 and 50-53), two-thirds of all US adults who do not practice Christianity say that spirituality plays little or no role in their everyday lives. Spirituality is not even on their radar screen.

Barna analysts suspect a cultural trend of 'secularizing the sacred' is partly to blame for overall spiritual apathy. In other words, longings and practices that have historically been seen as spiritual are now increasingly being discussed in terms that are not remotely spiritual.

As an example, for many people, *meditation* has become *mindfulness*—placing what was once a spiritual practice into the category of mental awareness. So too, human impulses to connect and to give are diverted into new channels. Money once given in



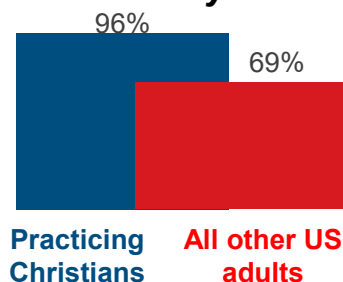
the collection basket instead might now be donated to a secular nonprofit, or into a GoFundMe account. Also, social functions once solely promoted in church bulletins and within a parish community are now more frequently organized on social media completely unconnected to a parish. What was once a *searching for God* is now *looking for meaning and purpose*.

These kinds of secularizing trends are not the only reason our old ways and means of ministry and outreach are prevented from being effective. Previous generations asked questions like—*How do I get to heaven?* (or) *What do I do with my guilt?* Now, however, younger generations ask entirely different questions, like—*What does it mean for me to thrive as a human being?*

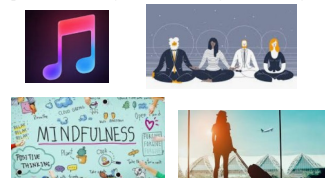
A big reason for this shift in questions of meaning is that Millennials and Gen Z have higher levels of anxiety. Young people have a hard time thinking into the future, like a hiker in front of a bear who's not thinking about that project due next week or retirement plans,

because they're focused much more on the immediate danger. Young people are much more consumed with the threat posed by constant anxiety or depression.

In other words, the question of what happens after we die is simply not something young people are concerned with. It's as if the older and younger generations are speaking two different languages and therefore not communicating, and not understanding each other. When older Catholics share with younger Catholics the riches of Church teaching and the catechism, they don't necessarily *connect* with most young people because Church teaching, doctrine, rules aren't

remotely the ballpark in which young people operate. That "stuff" is just not in their world, it doesn't answer their questions, or serve their deepest needs to minimize anxiety or alleviate loneliness.

Josh Chen, who works with young people in youth ministry, says—*If our only understanding or expression of salvation is what happens after we die, then our message will not be perceived as relevant to most younger people.*

That brings us back to this gospel episode. Jesus says, *Today salvation has come to this house, [to Zacchaeus]!*
Today!

The Good News is that salvation is not a *future* concern for us. It is something that is happening *now*! God is saving us now! The only way younger generations are going to know and see that God is saving us in this present moment is by our own excitement over Jesus. They will not be curious or intrigued unless they see the difference Jesus makes in *our* lives, the energy, joy and sheer liveliness by which we give evidence that the Lord Jesus impacts us in a positive way.

Maybe then, younger folks will be intrigued, climb a metaphorical tree, get to know Jesus personally, and therefore see for themselves true meaning, purpose, and the way forward.
