Luke 16:19–31

There once was a rich man, and at his gate lay the beggar Lazarus. Amos condemns the people of Zion in today's first reading, for they relax in complacency and selfabsorption while their country is collapsing. In the Gospel, Jesus condemns the rich man to an eternity in torment after he spent his life in luxury while ignoring the beggar at his gate. Whom do we ignore while enjoying the comfort of our own lives? As we listen to God's word, let us look at our own life from the point of view of someone like Lazarus. How would someone like him see us?

REFLECTION

We can all fall prey to selective blindness: a purposeful disregard of something we'd rather not see. The more comfortable our own lives are, the easier it becomes to ignore unpleasant things. Witness the rich man in the Gospel. With his nice home, fine wardrobe, and sumptuous meals, he preferred to ignore poor Lazarus outside his door. During their time on earth the rich man's front gate was as great a divide as the chasm between heaven and hell was later. He was willfully blind to the

plight of Lazarus, his brother in the covenant of Abraham. Now he can see clearly, but it's too late. Amos, in the first reading, is even more critical of the well-off among the Israelites, complacent in their luxury while the kingdom of Northern Israel teeters on the edge of collapse. From Amos's time to Jesus' to ours, people often become selectively blind to other people's problems. At the end of Jesus' story, Abraham says that the rich man's brothers will not change even "if someone should rise from the dead" (Luke 16:31). But now someone has. Will we change?

Question of the Week

Who is someone you have overlooked whom you realize now you should respond to with Christ's love and compassion?

COMMENTARY

We are hearing from Amos on backto-back Sundays, which is most unusual, as he is considered a "minor prophet." One of the earliest prophets, he preached in the Northern Kingdom of Israel as the prosperity of an earlier age led his people to stray from the covenant. The moral failure of the people can be seen in the way the well-off ignore the outcasts, the oppressed, and the powerless. Amos repeatedly warns the people that if they continue to ignore the economic and social injustices of their nation, divine judgment will rain down upon them: "Woe the complacent to in Zion!" (6:1). Complacency is a temptation for us today as well. Many of us are rather well insulated from poverty, violence, famine, and curable disease. But such is not the case in developing countries, in inner cities, or even in pockets of our own hometowns. Are these not our brothers and sisters? Do we choose not to see them? The rich man in the Gospel chose not to see Lazarus. But he knew he was there. He even knew his name. But during his life, he chose to remind blind to his needs, not even dumping the scraps from his table Continued on page 5.


FIRST **R**EADING Amos 6:1a, 4–7

Our first reading is from Amos, the prophet of social justice. In today's passage, he denounces the hollow prosperity of the rich, a self-indulgent life-style maintained at the expense of the poor.

Thus says the Lord the God of hosts: Woe to the complacent in Zion! Lying upon beds of ivory, stretched comfortably on their couches, they eat lambs taken from the flock, and calves from the stall! Improvising to the music of the harp, like David, they devise their own accompaniment. They drink wine from bowls and anoint themselves with the best oils; yet they are not made ill by the collapse of Joseph! Therefore, now they shall be the first to go into exile, and their wanton revelry shall be done away with.

RESPONSORIAL **P**SALM Psalm 146:7, 8–9, 9–10

In the psalm today, the Lord "sets captives free" and "raises up those who were bowed down." We see that happen for Lazarus, who is freed from his life of poverty and illness. This continues the theme from last week, placing value and success outside the realm of material comfort.



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Blessed is he who keeps faith forever, secures justice for the oppressed, gives food to the hungry. The Lord sets captives free. **R**.

The Lord gives sight to the blind; the Lord raises up those who were bowed down. The Lord loves the just; the Lord protects strangers. **R**.

The fatherless and the widow he sustains, but the way of the wicked he thwarts. The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, through all generations. Alleluia. **R**.

SECOND READING 1 Timothy 6:11–16

In the latter years of the first century, when the first letter to Timothy was written, Church leaders were concerned that Christianity not be seen as opposed to the good order of society. So, today's passage pictures Paul exhorting Timothy to lead an upright life.

But you, man of God, pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Compete well for the faith. Lay hold of eternal life, to which you were called when you made the noble confession in the presence of many witnesses. I charge you before God, who gives life to all things, and before Christ Jesus, who gave testimony under Pontius Pilate for the noble confession, to keep the commandment without stain or reproach until the appearance of our Lord Jesus Christ that the blessed and only ruler will make manifest at the proper time, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who alone has immortality, who dwells in unapproachable light, and whom no human being has seen or can see. This week's gospel continues with variations on a theme of poverty above riches. The story of Lazarus is a simple dichotomy: the rich man has separated himself from love and reaps the result, and the poor man receives the mercy of God upon death.


outside his gate for him to eat. Perhaps this would be an acknowledgment that he could do something to ease his suffering. To inoculate himself from guilt he chose to ignore him, to pretend there was nothing he could do. Even now, do we assume there is noth-ing we can do to help the masses of Lazaruses at our gates? At the end of Jesus' parable, Abraham dismisses the rich man's pleas to send the deceased Lazarus to warn his brothers, saying that "neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead" (Luke 16:31). As Luke knew when he wrote his Gospel, now someone had risen from the dead. Nearly two thousand years later, does Jesus' resurrection persuade us to end complacency our and give compassion and mercy to those in need?

"Building the Future with Migrants and Refugees" is the theme chosen by the Holy Father for the 108th World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR). Pope Francis highlights the commitment that we are all called to share in building a future that embraces God's plan, leaving no one behind.

Sept. 27—Saint Vincent de Paul

(?1580—Sept. 27, 1660) The deathbed confession of a dying servant opened



Vincent de Paul's eyes to the crying spiritual needs of the peasan-try of France. This seems to have been a crucial moment in the life of the man from a small farm in Gascony, France, who had become a

priest with little more ambition than to have a comfortable life. Pope Leo XIII made him the patron of all charitable societies. Outstanding among these, of course, is the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, founded in 1833 by his admirer Blessed Frédéric Ozanam. Jesus said to the Pharisees:

"There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even used to come and lick his sores. When the poor man died, he was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. "The rich man also died and was buried, and from the netherworld, where he was in torment, he raised his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. "And he cried out, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am suffering torment in these flames.' "Abraham replied, 'My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. Moreover, between us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to go from our side to yours or from your side to ours.' "He said, 'Then I beg you, father, send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may warn them, lest they too come to this place of torment.' "But Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them.' He said, 'Oh no, father Abraham, but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent.' "Then Abraham said, 'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead.""

Saints Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael Angels—messengers from God appear frequently in Scripture, but only Michael, Gabriel and Raphael are named.

Michael appears in Daniel's vision as "the great prince" who defends Israel against its enemies; in the *Book of Revelation*, he leads God's armies to final victory over the forces of evil. Devotion to Michael is the oldest angelic devotion, rising in the East in the fourth century. The Church in the West began to observe a feast honoring Michael and the angels in the fifth century.

Gabriel also makes an appearance in Daniel's visions, announcing Michael's role in God's plan. His bestknown appearance is an encounter with a young Jewish girl named Mary, who consents to bear the Messiah.

Raphael's activity is confined to the Old Testament story of Tobit. There he appears to guide Tobit's son Tobiah through a series of fantastic adventures which lead to a threefold happy ending: Tobiah's marriage to Sarah, the healing of Tobit's blindness, and the restoration of the family fortune.

The Feasts of Gabriel and Raphael were added to the Roman calendar in 1921. The 1970 revision of the calendar joined their individual feasts to Michael's.

Saints Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael are the Patron Saints of: Death, Germany, Grocers, Police Officers/First Responders, Radiologists. Saint Gabriel is the Patron Saint of Broadcasters and Communicators. Saint Raphael is the Patron Saint of the blind and travelers

Who are the 7 archangels? Gabriel, Michael, Raphael, Selaphiel, Uriel, Barachiel, and Jehudiel. Archangels are recognized as leaders, and they are entrusted by God with special duties. The name Michael means "one who is like God." Gabriel means "God is my strength". Raphael means "God is my health".






SIGN OF PEACE

The Sign of Peace is a rite that calls us beyond sin and disunity to Christ's peace and communion. We are called as disciples to live this peace and communion that Christ gives us daily. This indeed becomes then a sign of hope for all peoples.



Sept. 30 St. Jerome (c. 347—419/420) Most of the saints are remembered for some outstand-ing virtue or de-votion which they practiced, but Jerome is

frequent-ly remembered for his bad temper! It is true that he had a very bad temper and could use a vitriolic pen, but his love for God and his son Jesus Christ was extraordinarily intense; anyone who taught error was an enemy of God and truth, and Saint Jerome went after him or her with his mighty and sometimes sarcastic pen.

He was above all a Scripture scholar, translating most of the Old Testament from the Hebrew. Jerome also wrote commentaries which are a great source of scriptural inspiration for us today. He was an avid student, a thorough scholar, a prodigious letter-writer and a consultant to monk, bishop, and pope. Saint Augustine said of him, "What Jerome is ignorant of, no mortal has ever known."

Saint Jerome is particularly important for having made a translation of the Bible which came to be called the Vulgate. It is not the most critical edition of the Bible, but its acceptance by the Church was fortunate. As a modern scholar says, "No man before Jerome or among his contemporaries and very few men for many centuries afterwards were so well qualified to do the work." The Council of Trent called for a new and corrected edition of the Vulgate, and declared it the authentic text to be used in the Church.

In order to be able to do such work, Jerome prepared himself well. He was a master of Latin, Greek, Hebrew, and Chaldaic. He began his studies at his birthplace, Stridon in Dalmatia. After his preliminary education, he went to Rome, the center of learning at that time, and thence to Trier, Germany, where the scholar was very

much in evidence. He spent several years in each place, always trying to find the very best teachers. He once served as private secretary to Pope Damasus.

After these preparatory studies, he traveled extensively in Palestine, marking each spot of Christ's life with an outpouring of devotion. Mystic that he was, he spent five years in the desert of Chalcis so that he might give himself up to prayer, penance, and study. Finally, he settled in Bethlehem, where he lived in the cave believed to have been the birthplace of Christ. Jerome died in Bethlehem, and the remains of his body now lie buried in the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome.

October 1 St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus Marie Thérèse Martin was born at Alencon, France on January 2, 1873, the



youngest of five daughters. Her father, Louis, was a watchmaker, and her mother, Zelie, who died of breast cancer when Thérèse was four, was a lace maker. She was brought up in a model Christian home. While still a child she felt the attraction of the cloister, and at fifteen obtained permission to enter the Carmel of Pope Saint John Paul II Lisieux. declared her a Doctor of the Church in 1997. Remember your word to your ser-vant, O Lord, by which you have given me hope. This is my comfort when I am brought low. *cf. Psalm 119(118):49–50*






