INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY

Often we feel that our faith is weak, unable to overcome all our doubts or give us the confidence to face our trials. Jesus' closest friends, his apostles, may have felt the same way, as today we hear them ask him to increase their faith. Jesus responds by issuing them a challenge, telling them that even a small amount of faith has the power to do great things. Let us accept that challenge today, recognizing that our faith, however uncertain, has brought us here in the first place to worship the Lord and celebrate the Eucharist.





TODAY'S READINGS

Habakkuk 1:2–3; 2:2–4 How long, Lord, will you make me witness misery?

Psalm 95:1–2, 6–7, 8–9 If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

2 Timothy 1:6–8, 13–14 Guard the rich deposit of faith you were given.

Luke 17:5-10

When you have done everything for the kingdom, do more.

Habakkuk, living in a time of strife and violence in his nation, cries out to God, "I cry for help but you do not listen!" How many of us have felt the same way? God appeals to Habakkuk to have faith, assuring him that faith gives hope and life to the just one. Paul tells Timothy that faith and love can be found in Christ Jesus. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples how even a little faith can enable them to work wonders. May God's word strengthen our faith and give us the courage to trust in the Lord.

REFLECTION

"Increase our faith" is a strange sort of request (Luke 17:5). Jesus had already told his disciples the parable of the mustard seed, so they already knew that size is deceptive. Now he tells them that even a tiny amount of faith is sufficient to command a mulberry tree—with its extensive root system to uproot itself and plant itself in the sea. In other words: You want your faith to increase? Use it! Like a servant who becomes better

at serving by regularly serving, whether in the field or in the home, a disciple grows in the Lord's service by steadily serving the Lord. In his second letter, Paul asks Timothy to "bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God" (2 Timothy 1:8). In other words, practice your faith, even when it's difficult, and God will give you the strength you need. God gave Habakkuk the strength he needed when he despaired of the destruction and violence, he saw around him. God showed him a vision of the world to come, assuring him that "the just one, because of [his or her] faith, shall live" (Habakkuk 2:4). If you want to increase your faith, act with justice amidst the strife, live out the gospel in the face of hardship, and serve the Lord always. This will suffice.

When has your faith been strengthened by acting upon it?

COMMENTARY

Ah, the mustard seed. This is not the first time Jesus compares something to a mustard seed. Earlier on the road to Jerusalem he compared the kingdom of God to a tiny mustard seed, able to produce a huge bush that can provide a home for a flock of birds. Now he compares it to faith, saying that faith as small and undeveloped as the seed itself can be powerful enough to do great things. Like mustard seeds, God's gifts may appear small and insignificant, but with God's grace they can blossom and grow and flower into something great and powerful. The mulberry tree is notoriously difficult to uproot, as it has an extensive root system. Yet Jesus tells his disciples that faith the size of a tiny mustard seed can do it. Indeed, faith has an extensive root system as well. Our faith is planted in us in baptism. It takes root deep within us, is fertilized and nurtured by others-probably our parents, perhaps other family members, teachers, mentors, peers-and grows Continued on page 5.

FIRST READING

Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2-4 The book of the prophet Habakkuk is one of the smaller books of the Bible. He was a contemporary of Jeremiah, and preached at a time when Babylon (modern-day Iraq) threatened to destroy Jerusalem. Today's passage is a dialogue between the prophet and the Lord.

How long, O Lord? I cry for help but you do not listen! I cry out to you, "Violence!" but you do not intervene. Why do you let me see ruin; why must I look at misery? Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and clamorous discord. Then the Lord answered me and said: Write down the vision clearly upon the tablets, so that one can read it readily. For the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late. The rash one has no integrity; but the just one, because of his faith, shall live.





Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9

Twice in this psalm we hear, "Come." This is not a command, but an invitation. We are tasked with helping our brothers and sisters on earth.





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Come, let us sing joyfully to the Lord; let us acclaim the Rock of our salvation. Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us joyfully sing psalms to him. **R**.

SECOND READING

2 Timothy 1:6–8, 13–14

Although the author attributes the second letter to Timothy to St. Paul, it was probably written by someone else as much as 30 years after Paul's death. This was an acceptable practice at the time. One important theme of this letter is the need to be faithful to the Gospel and not to be swayed by false teachings.

Beloved: I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control. So do not be ashamed of your testimony to our Lord, nor of me, a prisoner for his sake; but bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God.

Take as your norm the sound words that you heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard this rich trust with the help of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us.

and grows for many years. We may feel that our faith is weak, threatened by doubt, but in fact it is rooted more deeply than any tree. What does our faith lead us to do? It is no coincidence that when Jesus is asked about faith, he speaks not of its size but of its power. With faith of any size we have the power to do great things. Not only do we have that power, we have the responsibility to use that power to do great things. Faith demands action. We see the problems and injustices and conflicts of the world through the lens of faith and are called to uproot them. Others may say it is too difficult, too hopeless, or that it requires someone much more powerful. But we have the power of faith. We can each be the one that uses that power to bring hope, bring justice, bring peace.



The month of October each year is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. This is primarily due to the fact that the liturgical feast of **Our Lady of the Rosary** is celebrated annually on **October 7.** Pope Pius V did much to further the spread of the Rosary and it thereafter became one of the most popular devotions in Christendom.

Oct. 4 Saint Francis of Assisi

Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone, better known as Saint Francis of Assisi, was a mystic Italian Catholic friar, founder of the Franciscans, and



one of the most venerated figures in Christianity. He was born in 1182 and died on Oct. 3, 1226 and was buried on May 25, 1230 in the Basilica of San Francesco

d'Assisi in Assisi, Italy. In 1223, he arranged for the first Christmas live nativity scene. Pope Gregory IX canonized him on 16 July 1228.

He grew up leading a privileged life as the son of a wealthy cloth merchant and gave up that life of wealth to live a life of poverty. He established the Franciscan Order of friars and the women's Order of the Poor Ladies.

St. Francis felt **compassion** for everyone, from lepers to birds. He simply recognized that our Father in heaven loves everything he has made, and it only makes sense that we should too. If we have no compassion, it is a sign that we do not truly possesses the love of Christ.

GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

Luke 17:5–10

This gospel comes immediately after Jesus speaks some hard words to his disciples: warnings about being a stumbling block for others on the journey of discipleship. What is needed is correction, repentance, and forgiveness that is generous and uncalculating, even in aggravating circumstances.

The Lord be with you. **R. And with your spirit.** A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Luke **R. Glory to you, O Lord.**

The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith." The Lord replied, "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

"Who among you would say to your servant who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here immediately and take your place at table'? Would he not rather say to him, 'Prepare something for me to eat. Put on your apron and wait on me while I eat and drink. You may eat and drink when I am finished'? Is he grateful to that servant because he did what was commanded? So should it be with you. When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do.'"

PROFESSION OF FAITH

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, (*bow*) who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, (*stand*) suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life ever lasting. Amen.

Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God born of the Father before all ages. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven (*bow*) and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

- 1. The Communion Procession begins with the Communion Song which all are encouraged to sing with the song leader. The communion song is an integral part of the procession.
- 2. As the communion ministers leave the sanctuary, process to the front of the church in the procession while singing the communion song as best you can.
- 3. When standing before the clergy or extraordinary minister bow (from the waist) as the Host (the Real Presence of Christ) is held before you. Do not genuflect when in the procession.
- 4. Stand and extend your hands from the middle of your chest to receive the Host. Your dominant hand is placed under the other hand as support. In essence you are making a throne.
- 5. Say "Amen" as the minister says, "the Body of Christ".
- 6. Place the Host in your mouth and move away from the minister.
- 7. Additional devotion such as making the sign of the cross is not required but a decision of personal piety.
- 8. Return to your seat and participate in the communion song.
- 9. When the tabernacle is closed and the priest is seated, all may sit to participate communally in a time of devotion until the Prayer after Communion is prayed.



OFFERTORY ANTIPHON

In that land there was a man named Job: blameless, upright, and God-fearing, Satan sought to tempt him, and the Lord gave him power over his possessions and his body. And so, he destroyed all of Job's possessions and his children; and indeed, he ravaged his flesh with grievous sours. Job 1: 2:7

OFFERTORY ANTHEM

The liturgical books use specific terms for the Eucharist, and that they do not use the term "Our Lord" for the Eucharist in the monstrance. These are interesting distinctions. It would be good to learn more about them and what they mean.

Eucharist: The word means "thanksgiving" and it refers to the holy communion that we share at Mass. As an adjective it is used for "eucharistic praver" because this prayer of thanksgiving effects the consecration and opens the door to holy communion. We also speak of the liturgy of the Eucharist as the second half of the Mass, and sometimes the Mass is called "the Eucharist."

Holy Communion: This refers to the act of receiving the consecrated bread and wine. Whereas "Eucharist" generally refers to something directly the related to Mass, Holy Communion may be administered outside of Mass. That is why we more properly speak of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (lay people), rather than Eucharistic Ministers (clergy). They function both within and outside of the Mass.

Real Presence: This is our belief that Christ is truly present in certain forms. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal speaks of four ways that Christ is really present at Mass: (1) in the assembly, (2) in the minister, (3) in the Word, "and indeed substantially and (4)uninterruptedly in the Eucharistic species"

Blessed Sacrament: This is how we refer to the hosts reserved in the tabernacle. Thev were once consecrated during a celebration of the Eucharist, but they remain after other hosts were consumed in holy communion. All these hosts offer the

faithful the real presence of Christ, but when referring to the contents of the tabernacle or a monstrance at exposition, it is more appropriate to call such hosts the "Blessed Sacrament", not "holy communion."

Eucharistic Adoration: Takes place apart from Mass, when a host consecrated in the celebration of the Eucharist is put on display in a monstrance and is available for the adoration of the faithful.

Oct. 5 St. Faustina Kowalska

Sister Faustina was a young, unedu-



cated nun in a convent of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland during the 1930s. On Feb. 22, 1931 Jesus appeared to her as the "King of Divine

Mercy" wearing a white garment, with rays of white and red light emanating from near his heart. Sister Faustina continued to receive visions of Jesus who asked her to become his apostle and "Secretary of Mercy." She was recruited to proclaim the truth about God's mercy to the world, and to implore God's mercy for sinners through new forms of devotion. Jesus said to St. Faustina, "I require you to make acts of mercy, which are to come from your love for me. You are always and everywhere to show mercy unto your neighbors; you may not withdraw, excuse or absolve yourself from this." The Chaplet of Divine Mercy given to her by Jesus in the revelations of 13th and 14th September 1935, was at first recited by Sister Faustina on her own. She writes about it many times in her Diary The Catholic Church canonized her as a saint on 30 April 2000. The mystic is classified in the liturgy as a virgin and is venerated within the church as the "Apostle of Divine Mercy".

Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.






