Luke 19:1-10

Jesus came to seek and save what was lost. Today's first reading begins with the wonderful image of the whole universe in God's eyes being like a single drop of morning dew upon the earth. The author of Wisdom goes on to extol the LORD's mercy, which descends upon us all, cleansing and refreshing us much as the morning dew does to all living things. We hear Saint Paul's words of reassurance to the early Christian community in Thessalonica. In the Gospel, Zacchaeus climbs a tree in order to see Jesus on his way to Jerusalem. May God's word renew and refresh us like the morning dew!



REFLECTION

Last weekend Jesus told us a parable that featured a repentant tax collector who admitted his sinfulness and pleaded for mercy. Today Jesus meets such a tax collector. The tax collection system in ancient Rome was rife with cor-ruption. Chief tax collectors, like Zacchaeus, won contracts promising to collect more taxes than rivals. They over assessed the wealth of the citizens in their districts so they could collect more, and extorted even more to pad their own pockets. Luke tells us that Zacchaeus was wealthy, so it is likely that he profited from both the corrupt system and his own personal greed. But none of his wealth could enable him to see over the heads of his fellow citizens. However, Zacchaeus finds a way to see Jesus . . . and for Jesus to see him. When Jesus calls to him, he immediately pledges to give half of his wealth to the poor and to repay any extortion fourfold. Jesus, who "has come to seek and to save what was lost," forgives him, reminding us that "this man too is a descendant of Abraham" (Luke 19:9–10). Zacchaeus is one of those stars in the sky, shining for us with the glory of God's mercy.

COMMENTARY

In God's eyes, the author of Wisdom says, the entire created universe is as a single grain, or a tiny drop of morning dew. A single speck of light in the night sky would seem to be a similar analogy. In the Gospel, Jesus refers to Zacchaeus as a descendant of Abraham, bringing to mind God's promise to Abraham that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. Zacchaeus, a corrupt tax collector, a collaborator with the Roman government, a known sinner, is one of those stars. Overlooked, if not scorned, he too is part of the innumerable points of light in the night sky, shining forth with the light of God's mercy. As God loves all creation, what we may overlook as insignificant is never unimportant to God.

...Luke tells us that Jesus "intended to pass through the town" of Jericho, implying that Jericho itself was an insignificant town on the way to Jerusalem, his ultimate destination (19:1). But when he sees Zacchaeus in the sycamore tree, he doesn't just

FIRST READING

Wisdom 11:22-12:2

The book of Wisdom was written about 50 years before Christ, and was the last book of the Old Testament to be written. After the first verse of today's passage, the author speaks directly to God and does so in poetic fashion.

Before the Lord the whole universe is as a grain from a balance or a drop of morning dew come down upon the earth. But you have mercy on all, because you can do all things; and you overlook people's sins that they may repent. For you love all things that are and loathe nothing that you have made; for what you hated, you would not have fashioned. And how could a thing remain, unless you willed it; or be preserved, had it not been called forth by you? But you spare all things, because they are yours, O Lord and lover of souls, for your imperishable spirit is in all things! Therefore you rebuke offenders little by little, warn them and remind them of the sins they are committing, that they may abandon their wickedness and believe in you, O Lord!

stop, he stays. Here is a lost sheep like the one the Good Shepherd pursued in the desert. Here is a penitent thief—not long before Jesus would meet another on the cross—promising to repay all that he had taken from anyone. Here is one of God's children, a sinner, anxious to see Jesus, responding to Jesus with joy, and immediately expressing his contrition. Jesus encountered exactly the kind of person he came to save and so he found himself right at home.

Sometimes our ability to see the Lord is blocked and we struggle through life, losing our way, unaware that mercy and forgiveness are within reach. We are called to approach Jesus with humility and repentance, like Zacchaeus, or the tax collector in the temple in Jesus' parable last Sunday. We have this opportunity today. Jesus is here today, here in this house of sinners, here to bring the good news of salvation, for "today salvation has come to this house . . . for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:9–10).

The Solemnity of All Saints is celebrated this Tuesday. It is a solemnity, a holyday of obligation and the day that the Church honors all of God's saints, even those who have not been canonized by the Church. It is a family day of celebration—we celebrate the memory of those family members (sharing with us in the Mystical Body, the doctrine of the Communion of Saints) now sharing eternal happiness in the presence of God. We rejoice that they have reached their eternal goal and ask their prayers on our behalf so that we, too, may join them in heaven and praise God through all eternity.

The honoring of all Christian martyrs of the Faith was originally celebrated on May 13, the date established by the fourth century. Pope Boniface IV in 615 established it as the "Feast of All Martyrs" commemorating the dedication of the Pantheon, an ancient Roman temple, into a Christian church dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the martyrs. By 741, the feast included not only martyrs, but all the saints in heaven as well, with the title changing to "Feast of All Saints" by 840.

In 844, Pope Gregory IV transferred the feast to November 1, timing it around the harvests to be able to provide food for the pilgrims. Some scholars believe this was to substitute a feast for the pagan celebrations during that time of year. Pope Sixtus Continued on page 8.

IV in 1484 established November 1 as a holyday of obligation and gave it both a vigil (known today as "All Hallows' Eve" or "Hallowe'en") and an eight-day period or octave to celebrate the feast.

This feast is marked with liturgical observances that have changed over the centuries. By 1955, the octave and vigil of All Saints were abrogated. Instead of a separate vigil on the calendar, the celebration begins the evening before, as mentioned in The General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar:







The Eucharistic Prayer is the heart of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. In this prayer, the priest acts in the person of Christ as head of his body, the Church. He gathers not only the bread and the wine, but the substance of our lives and joins them to Christ's perfect sacrifice, offering them to the Father.

The apostolic Church called this part of the Mass the anaphora, from the Greek verb meaning "to carry back," since each celebration of the Eucharistic prayer carries us back to the Upper Room with Jesus, to live anew the precious sacrifice of his own flesh and blood

In our tradition there are four variations of the Eucharistic Prayer. They all share the same basic themes.

- The Eucharistic Prayer takes the form through which Christ and the Passion of Christ are sacramentally re-presented to us.
- The Eucharistic Prayer is our prayer, proclaimed by the priest, who presides on our behalf.
- The Eucharistic Prayers have emerged from various traditions throughout the history of the Church.

EVANGELIZATION Part II

Saint Pope Paul VI said it best, "Above all the Gospel must be proclaimed by witness. Take a Christian or a handful of Christians who, in the midst of their own community [by "community" he means the town or place where they live, not Church community], show their capacity for understanding and acceptance, their sharing of life and destiny with other people, their solidarity with the efforts of all for whatever is noble and good. Let us suppose that, in addition, they radiate in an altogether simple and unaffected way their faith in values that go beyond current values, and their hope in something that is not seen and that one would not dare to imagine.

Through this wordless witness these Christians stir up irresistible questions in the hearts of those who see how they live: Why are they like this? Why do they live in this way? What or who is it that inspires them? Why are they in our midst? Such a witness is a silent proclamation of the Good News and a very powerful and effective one. Here have an initial act evangelization." (EN n 21) In other words, one type of evangelizing activity is simply seen in the way in which we who believe in Jesus Christ live our lives such that others see in us something of value. I love those questions in the text: Why are they like this? Why do they live this way? What or who is it that inspires them? Why are they in our midst?
