INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY

As days grow shorter, leaves fall from trees, and the last of the year's crops are harvested, the Church calls to mind those who have died and of Jesus' promise of eternal life. Earlier this week we honored the saints on All Saints Day and remembered our beloved dead on All Souls Day. Today we hear Jesus affirm the resurrection of the dead when faced with a group of religious authorities who refuse to accept it. May our faith in Jesus, who is the resurrection and the life, give us hope during these dark days.

TODAY'S READINGS

2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

Luke 20:27-38

In God there is no death. The selections from scripture that we hear today portray people whose faith in eternal life with the Lord gives them confidence times during of trial. Maccabees, seven brothers and their mother were arrested and tortured for their faith. Saint Paul is pursued by wicked people who will do anything to stop him from preaching. Jesus is in Jerusalem now, where soon he will be arrested and sentenced to death. But the dead will rise, Jesus tells the Sadducees, for the Lord is God of the living. May this give us hope as well.

REFLECTION

Faith allows us to accept what the human mind cannot even imagine. Witness the faith of the seven brothers in today's first reading. Each is willing to die at the hands of the cruel king rather than renounce his faith. The king, in a position to enjoy the finer things in life, could not imagine that anyone would willingly give up their life. But the brothers

firmly believed that God would raise them up to live again and live forever. In the Gospel, the Sadducees suffered from the same lack of imagination, arguing logically that a belief in resurrection led to absurd consequences. Jesus explains that the customs of this life cannot be applied to the resurrected life. God is a God of the living, and so all who preceded us in faith are yet alive. To accept this takes faith. But we put faith in what we cannot truly understand all the time. Few among us understand all the science behind the medicine we take or the technology we use or the planet we live on, but we place our faith in those who have made the study of these things their life's work. Jesus' life's work, redeeming us by his death, enables us to live with the faith in a life greater than this world, a life beyond our imagination.

COMMENTARY

QUESTION FOR THE WEEK

How does your faith give you confidence in something greater?

The month of November is traditionally a time in which the Catholic community remembers those who have died. It is related to the fact that the end of November is the end of the Liturgical Year with a new year starting the First Sunday of Advent (Nov. 27) – the four-week period of preparation before Christmas.

FIRST READING

2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

The two books of Maccabees describe a period of persecution suffered by the Jews about 150 years before Christ. At that time, they were a nation subject to Syria whose king tried to force them to abandon their religious customs. Today's passage describes the resistance of one family, whose bravery became legendary.

It happened that seven brothers with their mother were arrested and tor-tured with whips and scourges by the king, to force them to eat pork in violation of God's law. One of the brothers, speaking for the others, said: "What do you expect to achieve by questioning us? We are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors." At the point of death he said: "You accursed fiend, you are depriving us of this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever. It is for his laws that we are dying." After him the third suffered their cruel sport. He put out his tongue at once when told to do so, and bravely held out his hands, as he spoke these noble words: "It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." Even the king and his attendants marveled at the young man's courage, because he regarded his sufferings as nothing. After he had died, they tortured and maltreated the fourth brother in the same way. When he was near death, he said, "It is my choice to die at the hands of men with the hope God gives of being raised up by him; but for you, there will be no resurrection to life."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

This week's psalm is forward-looking and anticipates the resurrection spoken of in the first reading and the gospel. "Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full." This idea of salvation after mortal life is not new in the time of Jesus, but has been included in the belief of the Israelites since the formation of the Torah.

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SECOND READING

2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5

The two letters to the Thessalonians were addressed to a Christian community founded by Paul early in his missionary travels. Thessalonica was located in the northeastern portion of modern-day Greece. Early Christians believed that Jesus would return soon; these letters address how they ought to live as they await that coming.

Brothers and sisters: May our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who has loved us and given us everlasting encouragement and good hope through his grace, encourage your hearts and strengthen them in every good deed and word. Finally, brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may speed forward and be glorified, as it did among you, and that we may be delivered from perverse and wicked people, for not all have faith. But the Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one. We are confident of you in the Lord that what we instruct you, you are doing and will continue to do. May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the endurance of Christ.

COMMENTARY

As Jesus inches ever closer to his passion and death, his opponents continue to argue with him. While today's dialogue between the Sadducees and Jesus is centered on the reality of the resurrection, their questioning of Jesus seems more like a method of self-preservation. The Jesus who dined with sinners and welcomed the outcast was gaining popularity among the people. The Sadducees in today's gospel, like the Pharisees previously, want to assert, ensure, and preserve their own power.

As we move closer to our celebration of Christ the King (Nov. 20) and the end of this liturgical year (Nov. 26), the readings continue to invite us to reflect on the sources of power in our lives. Where does power come from? While God is the obvious answer, and true authority comes from God, it might be more helpful to consider the things we prioritize over God in our own lives. To whom or what do we bow? Do we prostrate ourselves to false power? Do we genuflect to greed and status? Do we try to assert our own power or authority by putting other people down or trying to intentionally confuse them, as the Sadducees do in today's gospel?

May our prayer today be the prayer of Paul in the second letter to the Thessalonians: "May the Lord direct [our] hearts to the love of God and to the endurance of Christ." For when we direct our hearts to God, we come to intimately know and believe God is not a God of the dead, but rather the God of the living.

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GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

Luke 20:27–38 [or 20:27, 34–38]

Part of the basic beliefs of the Sadducees is that there is no such thing as resurrection. They are a Jewish sect active at the time of Jesus, but they differ from the Pharisees because they are solely focused on the physical reality of life right now. Aspects of the spiritual realm—angels, de-mons, the afterlife—are not entertained by Sadducees. When they approach Jesus to challenge him with a hypothetical question, they know it's silly, and they want to point out how ridiculous Jesus is. Jesus, of course, sees right through their motives and responds by leaning into the very things the Saddu-cees don't accept: an afterlife that is not governed by the rules of this world.


R. Glory to you, O Lord.

Some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward [and put this question to Jesus, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us, If someone's brother dies leaving a wife but no child, his brother must take the wife and raise up descendants for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman but died childless. Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her."] Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord,' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."



Introduction to the Eucharistic Prayer

Today's liturgy places before us a vision of the glories of Resurrection Day. Jesus tells us that our friendships and our family ties will be trans-figured in heaven, so that all are bound together in a love that even death will not part. Around this sacred altar, in the presence of Christ, we share a sweet foretaste of that day.

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The month of November is dedicated to the Souls in Purgatory, whose feast was celebrated on Nov. 2. With the exception of the last four days, the entire month of November falls during the liturgical season known as Ordinary Time, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time. The last portion of the liturgical year represents the time of our pilgrimage to heaven during which we hope for reward. The culmination of the liturgical year is the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (Nov. 20). "This feast asserts the supreme authority of Christ over human beings and their institutions.... Beyond it we see Advent dawning with its perspective of the Lord's coming in glory."— The Liturgy and Time, A.G. Mortimort Before we conclude the liturgical year, however, we observe the national holiday of Thanksgiving on Nov. 24 with an 9 a.m. Mass at Sacred Heart. The last Sunday (Nov. 27), marks the beginning of Advent, the liturgical color changes to purple, representing a time of reflec-



National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 6-12, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to the promotion of vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U.S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

EVANGELIZATION PART III

I think a lot of Catholics are wary of the term evangelization because it calls to mind for them evangelical Protestants or perhaps it evokes in their minds images of street corner preachers. Not to speak ill of either our Protestant brothers and sisters or those who preach on street corners, go back again to what Paul VI said about the "silent witness" of a Christian's life.

Evangelization can (and should at some points) be explicit, that is, spoken and preached. However, it can just as well be implicit and conveyed through that lovely "silent witness" that Saint Pope Paul VI writes about. Refining that type of evangelization is well within the grasp of every believer. As a person becomes more comfortable with the Lord Jesus, and the Lord Jesus becomes the central figure in one's life, the lens by which all of life is lived, then it should become easier to speak about the Lord to others, whether that's family members estranged from the Church, or anyone else we come in contact with whom we know would benefit from knowing Jesus.

Alpha is a great way to deepen one's relationship with Jesus, or to initiate a relationship with Jesus. That's two reasons why we are doing Alpha at Divine Mercy parish and will continue to run Alpha. As Saint Pope Paul VI taught in his encyclical that the Church exists in order to evangelize: "Evangelizing is in fact the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity" (EN 14).

We have in Christ Good News, news that must be shared with all others!



- Alpha brings people together while providing the chance to encounter Jesus.


