Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In so many ways—large and small—the pandemic has upended our lives together. Families and, in a special way, young people, have faced distressing struggles. The pandemic made our connections with one another challenging and difficult. Exactly in that moment when we truly needed supportive relationships with one another, we found ourselves separated. Sadly, this included the relationships and connections that we have in and through the Church.

We did our best to move forward and I am proud of our collective response to the challenges of the pandemic. When I announced a general dispensation from the obligation to participate in Sunday Mass, many parishes offered on-line Sunday Masses, and went even further and established prayer lines and reached out to those in need. The TV Mass that I celebrated helped to keep us connected as a community of faith in Chicagoland. So many of you have told me how healing and comforting those Masses have been.

In the meanwhile, we are in a new moment. With vaccinations and boosters, restrictions on public gatherings have eased up. Many people feel more comfortable returning to Church. Yet, we know there are some elderly and immuno-comprised persons who are still not ready to return. And they should not return. These vulnerable brothers and sisters have an excusing cause for being absent and for this reason I will continue the TV Mass on ABC for the present time. But for the rest of us, I have decided, in consultation with my advisors, to lift the general dispensation from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass as we begin a new Church year on the First Sunday of Advent, November 26-27.

My hope is that the First Sunday of Advent will provide us with a fresh start to take up again our life together as a community of faith that gathers to worship God. I have asked our pastors to begin the Masses on November 26-27 with the traditional lighting of the Advent wreath. After the homily your pastor will lead the community in a renewal of baptismal promises, acknowledging that we owe our obligation to participate in Sunday Mass to God but also to each other. Our common profession of faith and of our desire to turn away from sin, will be concluded by a sprinkling rite with the waters of baptism.

Let this occasion of our renewal of faith and life, which we all so much want, provide us with a fresh start as we recommit ourselves to worship God and to be supportive of each other week after week as we gather around the Table of the Lord to be nourished and renewed.

Introduction to the Liturgy

Already we are bombarded with urgent reminders to get ready for Christmas. But we gather here today begin different kind a preparation. Over the next four weeks (and it's a full four weeks this Advent), we will we recall how Jesus comes to us. He has come as an infant lying in a manger. One day he will come like a thief in the night, as our judge at the end of time. But today and every day he comes to us as Emmanuel, "God with us." Amid all the Christmas planning and holiday shopping, let us welcome God's most wonderful gift into our world, our homes, and our hearts.

The Advent wreath originated with the Lutherans of eastern Germany a few hundred years ago. The custom of lighting the wreath during the four weeks preceding Christmas took place only in the homes of believers. Gradually, especially in Roman Catholic parishes, this custom made its way into the church. Chapter 47 of the Book of Blessings tells us that the wreath "should be of a sufficient size to be visible to the congregation. It may be suspended from the ceiling or placed on a stand. If it is placed in the presbyterium (sanctuary), it should not interfere with the celebration of the liturgy, nor should it obscure the altar, ambo, or chair." The wreath is blessed only on the First Sunday of Advent, and is simply lighted on the remaining Sundays.

FIRST READING **Isaiah 2:1-5**

The prophet Isaiah dreamed of a day when Jerusalem (sometimes called Zion) would be the center of the world, and all people would come there to receive instruction from God. In today's reading, Isaiah presents a vision of peace and prosperity for the whole world.

This is what Isaiah, son of Amoz, saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In days to come, the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest mountain and raised above the hills. All nations shall stream toward it; many peoples shall come and say: "Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may instruct us in his ways, and we may walk in his paths." For from Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and impose terms on many peoples. They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!



TODAY'S READINGS

Now is the hour to awake from sleep.

Matthew 24:37-44

The Son of Man will come at an hour you least expect.

"Let us then throw off the works of darkness," Saint Paul exhorts us today. It is time to prepare for the coming of the light. We don't want to be caught unaware when the Lord comes. Though we naturally look forward to Christmas Day, today's readings remind us that Jesus will also come to judge us at the end of time. Unlike Christmas Day, which always falls on December 25, the end of the world will come at a time we cannot know. Therefore, let us live in the light of Christ, "the armor of light" as Paul calls it, ever prepared for his coming.

REFLECTION

Advent is not only a season to prepare for Jesus' coming as a tiny baby at Christmas. Today's Gospel reminds us that Jesus will come again at the end of time, like a thief in the night, when those who unprepared will be swept away like victims of the Great Flood. How can we prepare? Isaiah's counsel can help. Isaiah prophesied that those walking in the Lord's paths will take

their swords and spears and turn them into blades for their plows and pruners. Swords and spears are weapons, used against a foe in battle. Plows and pruners are used for preparing fields and trees to grow food. In Isaiah's vision, tools of war become tools of life. Instead of being used to fight, they are used to nourish. Turning confrontation into cooperation, as in Isaiah's prophecy, is how we can prepare ourselves for the arrival of the Prince of Peace, no matter when he comes. May Jesus Christ, that thief in the night, break into our hearts this Advent and guide us to making peace in our families, in our communities, and in the world.

Question for the Week

With whom can you reconcile and cooperate during the next four weeks?

Romans 13:11-14


Behind everything Paul wrote was his strong belief that the hour of Christ's return in glory was near at hand. In this passage, Paul uses the image of darkness and light to describe how Christians ought to live as they await that coining.

Brothers and sisters: You know the time; it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep. For our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed; the night is advanced, the day is at hand. Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and lust, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh.

THE YEAR OF ST. MATTHEW





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GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

Matthew 24:37–44

In the gospel reading Jesus warns his disciples that they are not to be like the people of Noah's generation, who were so immersed in the ordinary and every day that they were unaware of the flood of evil that was gradually encroaching on their lives.

The Lord be with you.

At proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

R. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus said to his disciples: "As it was in the days of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. In those days before the flood, they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, up to the day that Noah entered the ark. They did not know until the flood came and carried them all away. So will it be also at the coming of the Son of Man. Two men will be out in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. Two women will be grinding at the mill; one will be taken, and one will be left. Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come. Be sure of this: if the master of the house had known the hour of night when the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and not let his house be broken into. So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

The Gospel of the Lord. R. Praise to you, Lord, Jesus Christ.

Please be seated after the proclamation.

COMMENTARY

Our readings call us to embrace God's transforming presence in our lives. The first reading, from Isaiah, comes from a popular song the Israelites sang in captivity. It lifted their spirits as they reflected on God's promises to lead them back to their homeland. This song tells of a new age when God will reveal himself ~o that not only the Israelites but "all nations shall stream toward" the house of the Lord (Is 2:2), the Temple in Jerusalem where God will bring peace among all humanity: "They beat their swords into plowshares" (Is 2:4).

St. Paul continues this theme of transformation by reminding us that our salvation is closer now than when we first believed! Our minds and actions need to embrace the necessary changes. True transformation can occur only through the power of Christ's grace: "Put on the Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom 13:14). Like a new set of clothes, Christ embraces us totally and transforms the essence of our being. The Gospel reiterates the urgency to stay awake and prepare for the Lord's coming at the end of our lives or at the end of the world. We do not approach this encounter in fear and trepidation but, in the spirit of our first two readings, with a joyous expectation of God's fulfillment of the longings in our hearts for true happiness, peace, and rest, as St. Augustine addressed God, 'For you have made us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in vou."

Jesus responds to a question about what signs to expect, so as to know when the end of earthly time will be. Jesus' response is both chilling and hopeful. We should not be dismayed when external signs such as natural disasters occur. Rather, we should always be ready for the Lord's return, standing erect, heads raised, ready to greet the Lord at his coming. Jesus paints a picture of what it means to be ready.

We do not know when the time will come-for the end of our lives on earth or for the end of time. Jesus likens our

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT RENEWAL RITUAL

The season of Advent is a time of hope and renewal, a fresh start. Advent takes on special meaning for us this year as we begin anew, after having struggled with illness and separation from one another. We put the darkness of our weakness and woundedness behind us, as we once more embrace Christ, our hope and our light. And so, let us once again turn away from sin and renew our baptismal promises.

Let us recall that it is through Baptism that we were joined to the dying and rising of Christ and to each other as members of his body, the Church. And so, I ask you:

Do you renounce sin, so as to live in the freedom of the children of God? **R. I do.**

Do you renounce the lure of evil, so that sin may have no mastery over you? **R.** I do.

Do you renounce Satan, the author of sin who seeks to divide us one from another? **R.** I do.

Do you believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth? **R. I do.**

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead and is seated at the right hand of the Father?

R. I do.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

R. I do.

May the light of Christ we wait for in these Advent days increasingly reign in our hearts more brightly, casting out all fears, anxieties and sin. And may almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, — have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins and by his grace keep us united in the Body of his Son, who lives and reigns forever and ever. R. Amen.

PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



A few days ago, we celebrated Thanksgiving. I hope your celebration was beautiful, relaxing and filled with family, an "adopted family," or friends. Perhaps you are still enjoying leftovers from that day and basking in warm memories.

Some of you know that the word describing what we engage in at each and every Mass literally means "thanksgiving." That's what the term Eucharist denotes.

Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we give thanks to God the Father for sending us his Son, Jesus, to save and redeem us. We share in the Eucharist, tasting the salvation won for us in Christ.

The bread broken and the cup shared at the Table of the Lord become the offering we render back to God in thanksgiving, even as we partake of this sacred meal. When we gather for Mass, we are not only nourished by the sacrament, we are formed in it, becoming people filled with gratitude for God's blessings and graces.

What I'm saying, in effect, is that we give thanks each day for the presence and action of God in our lives, not just on Thanksgiving Day. Believers and disciples say "thank you, God" each day, every day.

The turkey and trimmings are perhaps once a year. But we don't stop thanking the Lord once the turkey and trimmings are a memory. As Saint Paul says, "I give thanks to my God always on your account for the grace of God bestowed on you in Christ Jesus..." (1 Corinthians 1:4).

Every day, I give thanks to God for the blessing that this parish is to me. May God fill us with every spiritual gift, and may we share those gifts with one another in thanksgiving.

COMMUNION ANTIPHON

After communion we spend some time in silent prayer and/or sing a psalm or song of praise.

The month of December is dedicated to the *Immaculate Conception* (celebrated Dec. 8) and the Divine Infancy.

The first 24 days of December fall during the liturgical season known as **Advent** and are represented by the liturgical color purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

The remaining days of December mark the beginning of the *Christ-mas Time*. The liturgical color changes to white or gold — a symbol of joy, purity and innocence.

The season of Advent originated as a fast of forty days in preparation for Christmas, commencing on the day after the feast of St. Martin (Nov. 11), it was often called "St. Martin's Lent"—a name by which it was known as early as the fifth century. In the ninth century, the duration of Advent was reduced to four weeks, and Advent preserved most of the characteristics of a penitential season which made it a kind of counterpart to Lent.






GRATEFUL FOR ALL OUR THANKSGIVING VOLUNTEERS!
