

FIRST READING Isaiah 11:1-10

The prophet Isaiah lived 750 years before Christ. Despite the political unrest of that period, he looked forward to a kingdom so wonderful that even nature is at peace. This perfect world would be ruled by a descendent of King David. (As you listen to this reading, it helps to know that "Jesse" is the name of David's father.)

On that day, a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him: a spirit of wisdom and of understanding, a spirit of counsel and of strength, a spirit of knowledge and of fear of the Lord, and his delight shall be the fear of the Lord. Not by appearance shall he judge, nor by hearsay shall he decide, but he shall judge the poor with justice, and decide aright for the land's afflicted.

He shall strike the ruthless with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall slay the wicked. Justice shall be the band around his waist, and faithfulness a belt upon his hips. Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them. The cow and the bear shall be neighbors, together their young shall rest; the lion shall eat hay like the ox. The baby shall play by the cobra's den, and the child lay his hand on the adder's lair.

There shall be no harm or ruin on all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be filled with knowledge of the Lord, as water covers the sea. On that day, the root of Jesse, set up as a signal for the nations, the Gentiles shall seek out, for his dwelling shall be glorious.

TODAY'S READINGS

Isaiah 11:1-10

God, the source of patience, enables us to live in harmony.

Matthew 3:1–12

Prepare the way of the Lord! "Prepare the way of the Lord," Isaiah cries through John the Baptist's words, and continue to heed that call today. Before we hear John quote him, we hear Isaiah himself, longing for the day when the LORD's chosen one would arrive, and justice and harmony would blossom. Let us prepare a place in our hearts and in our homes for the Lord, so that we may sing, like the psalmist, of a new day of justice and peace for one and all.

REFLECTION

Today's first reading, from Isaiah, looks forward to the coming of the long-awaited Messiah, who will be filled with the fullness of God's Spirit. He will bring peace to the world, a peace he describes in a vision where "the calf and the young lion shall browse together" (Is 11:6). The coming of Jesus inaugurates this fulfillment. The reading from the Letter to the Romans connects back to the hopes of the Old Testament. Jesus' coming fulfills the promises made to

the patriarchs and extends them to the Gentiles "so that [they] might glorify God for his mercy" (Rom 15:9). Jesus' coming brings all peoples together in their praise and glory of God.

In the Gospel reading, God's Word comes to the people in the desert through the person of John the Baptist. The desert is the place where the Israelites had wandered for forty vears and where God formed them into a people. The prophets foresaw that God would lead the people back to the desert to form them again into God's people. John the Baptist, who resembles the prophets with his clothing and diet, calls for a change of heart: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" (Mt 3:2). John speaks of one who is to come, one who is far greater than he. While John baptized with water, the one to come, Jesus, will baptize "with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Mt 3:11). As John the Baptist called on his people to set things right, so we are called this Advent to set things right with God as we await the coming of Jesus at Christmas and welcome his presence into our lives.

Questions for the Week

What do you need to repent of today? How can you repent so that you are reconciled with both God and neighbor and given a new opportunity at life?



RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 72:1-2, 7-8, 12-13, 17

In this psalm, we see that the heart of justice is indeed about people getting their due, but what they are owed not as wrongdoers but as beloved children of God. The justice with which this King is concerned is justice that protects the poor, recognizing the dignity of all who seem lowly by our worldly standards.



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O God, with your judgment endow the king, and with your justice, the king's son; he shall govern your people with justice and your afflicted ones with judgment. **R.**

Justice shall flower in his days, and profound peace, till the moon be no more. May he rule from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth. **R**.

For he shall rescue the poor when he cries out, and the afflicted when he has no one to help him. He shall have pity for the lowly and the poor; the lives of the poor he shall save. **R**.

May his name be blessed forever; as long as the sun his name shall remain. In him shall all the tribes of the earth be blessed; all the nations shall proclaim his happiness. **R**.





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SECOND READING

Romans 15:4-9

In the early days of the Church, some Jewish converts to Christianity continued to practice their Jewish traditions. Many of them were members of the Church in Rome, along with others who were Gentiles. They sometimes found it hard to get along. As Paul nears the end of his letter to them, he encourages them to live in harmony by drawing upon the Scriptures they had in common — what we have called the "Old Testament."

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Brothers and sisters: Whatever was written previously was written for our instruction, that by endurance and by the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to think in harmony with one another, in keeping with Christ Jesus, that with one accord you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Welcome one another, then, as Christ welcomed you, for the glory of God. For I say that Christ became a minister of the circumcised to show God's truthfulness, to confirm the promises to the patriarchs, but so that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written: *Therefore, I will praise you among the Gentiles and sing praises to your name.*

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GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

Matthew 3:1-12

In the Gospel reading, God's Word comes to the people in the desert through the person of John the Baptist. The desert is the place where the Israelites had wandered for forty years and where God formed them into a people. The prophets foresaw that God would lead the people back to the desert to form them again into God's people.

The Lord be with you. R. And with your spirit. A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Matthew R. Glory to you, O Lord.

COMMENTARY

The wolf does not become the lamb, nor the lamb the wolf. In Isaiah's vision, animals that are natural enemies are able to get along, not by ceasing to be what they are, but by changing their behavior. Note the lion eating hay, embracing a vegetarian diet in order to coexist with the ox. Also note that in each pairing, one is gentle and often young: a lamb, a calf, a baby. Possibly the presence of such a harmless creature on God's holy mountain tames the fierce one. We are called to be the peaceful ones, finding ways to reduce tension and reconcile with those with whom we've failed to get along.

John the Baptist is the first to refer to Jesus as the Lamb of God, though that comes only after he sees him, not in today's Gospel. Jesus, the Lamb, is put to death after a threatening crowd, like a pack of ravenous wolves, demands that he be killed. Isaiah's vision of the world after the Son of David, the root of Jesse, arrived was not realized. The world carried on with its injustices, its poverty, and its aggression. And it still does. Yet, the vision of God's peaceable kingdom sustains our hope. John's first words provide a path: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" (Matthew 3:2). To reach that kingdom, where all will live in harmony, we need to repent. All of us are called to be sorry and atone for our sins. And it begins with me.

The qualities of the spirit of the Lord that Isaiah lists at the beginning of this passage may sound familiar, for they are the gifts of the Holy Spirit, which were bestowed on us all at confirmation. The Holy Spirit enables us to continue the work of the Lord when we make the effort to use those gifts for the benefit of each other. In doing so, we produce good fruit (as John the Baptist calls us to do) and harmonize with one other (as Paul tells the Romans).

PROFESSION OF FAITH

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John the Baptist appeared, preaching in the desert of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" It was of him that the prophet Isaiah had spoken when he said: A voice of one crying out in the desert, Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths.

John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. At that time Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region around the Jordan were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins.

When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The word Advent is derived from the Latin word adventus. meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word parousia. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1).

PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



A few weeks ago, I was pleasantly surprised. Our parish took up a special collection to help Catholic Charities assist asylum seekers being settled in the Chicagoland area.

The funds we collected that weekend, with additional donations arriving after it, far exceeded any other special collection of the past year. To date, we have received just over \$5,000. Normally, our biggest second collection is the Mother's Day one, in support of the work of Catholic Charities.

The remaining days of December mark the beginning of the *Christ-mas Time*. The liturgical color changes to white or gold — a symbol of joy, purity and innocence.

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




