
# **REJOICE IN THE LORD** ALWAYS



Divine Mercy Parish is a Welcoming Community that Inspires Disciples of Jesus to Share God's Love and Transform the World.

Today is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday, from the Latin of the entrance antiphon for today, Gaudete in Domino semper, Rejoice in the Lord always (Philippians 4:4). The antiphon captures the mood of the entire liturgy as we move into the second part of Advent: there is a sense of joyful expectation, an awareness that the fulfillment of God's great plan for us is near.



# FIRST READING

Isaiah 35:1–6a, 10

TV coverage of events in the Middle East has familiarized us with the empty expanse of arid desert described in today's reading. Therefore, we can appreciate the unbelievable transformation which Isaiah promises. The prophet says that the desert will become a lush garden, as God's chosen people return singing and dancing from their 70-year exile in Babylon.

The desert and the parched land will exult; the steppe will rejoice and bloom. They will bloom with abundant flowers, and rejoice with joyful song. The glory of Lebanon will be given to them, the splendor of Carmel and Sharon; they will see the glory of the Lord, the splendor of our God. Strengthen the hands that are feeble, make firm the knees that are weak, say to those whose hearts are frightened: Be strong, fear not! Here is your God, he comes with vindication; with divine recompense he comes to save you. Then will the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lame leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing. Those whom the Lord has ransomed will return and enter Zion singing, crowned with everlasting joy; they will meet with joy and gladness, sorrow and mourning will flee.

# **R**ESPONSORIAL **P**SALM

# Psalm 146:6–7, 8–9, 9–10

Today's psalm contains all the dramatic tension of Advent: God's verbs are all in present tense, affirming who God is and what God does.

In prison, John received word of the coming of Christ.

What can we see with eyes of faith? Isaiah saw a field of abundant flowers where others saw a parched desert. James saw an urgency to prepare for the coming of the Lord where others focused on its delay. John the Baptist could no longer see what he'd seen in the desert and needed Jesus to remind him of what his disciples were seeing all along: the poor fed, the dead raised, the deaf hearing, and yes, the blind see-ing. With eyes of faith, we see past the bleak onset of winter. We see the coming of the Lord on the horizon.

# Reflection

What happened to the John the Baptist we heard last Sunday, so sure of himself, proclaiming the coming of the Messiah? Today he sounds like doubting Thomas, uncertain that Jesus is truly the one. Really? He saw the Holy Spirit descend upon Jesus like a dove when he baptized him! But things have changed. Herod has thrown John in prison. Note how Jesus replies to John's question. He

proclaims six kinds of miracles: transforming those who are blind, lame, deaf, and so on. But what about those in prison? What hap-pened to "proclaim liberty to captives," as Jesus read in the synagogue (Luke 4:18)? We can hardly blame John for wondering why he was languishing in a cell-or why Herod or the Romans had not been overthrownwhile the Messiah was working miracles. We, too, sometimes wonder why God seems to have overlooked us or our world, do we not? But Jesus did not come into the world to make everything in it perfect. No, he came into the world to redeem it, to bring new life to it. God's life. In Jesus, God is here with us. No need to look for another.


# $\mathbf{Q}$ uestions for the Week

How do you discern the Lord's presence amid your sorrows and suffering?

For John the Baptist, pointing to Christ as Messiah was the complete fulfillment of God's work in him. He didn't do it for his own fame or for reward, but merely to prepare the way.

#### A Joyful Sunday.

The Third Sunday of Advent is also known as Gaudete Sunday. The word gaudete is derived from the Latin words gaudium, joy, and gaudeo, to rejoice or be glad. Gaudete Sunday occurs eight to thirteen days before Christmas, and the nearness of the feast is reason for great joy. This Sunday is а to Laetare Sunday, counterpart during Lent and provides a similar break about midway through a season which is otherwise of a penitential character, and signifies the nearness of the Lord's coming. We use the color rose to indicate a joyful day . During both days, a priest may wear rose vestments.

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# SECOND READING

James 5:7-10

The letter of James was written approximately 50 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was addressed to a group of Christians who were disappointed that Jesus had not yet returned in glory. Using an

# agricultural image, the author encourages them to keep their hope alive as they face the day-to-day trials of life.

Be patient, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You too must be patient. Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand. Do not complain, brothers and sisters, about one another, that you may not be judged. Behold, the Judge is standing before the gates. Take as an example of hardship and patience, brothers and sisters, the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

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# **GOSPEL PROCLAMATION**

### Matthew 11:2-11

In this gospel, Jesus instructs John's disciples to serve as witnesses. Witnesses are people who have seen something firsthand and who share what they have seen for the benefit of those who could not be there. Their presence at the scene of what's happening gives their testimony a certain privilege.

The Lord be with you. **R. And with your spirit.** Are proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Matthew **R. Glory to you, O Lord.** 

## COMMENTARY

Isaiah saw an Israel that no one else could see. Scripture scholars tell us that today's first reading was written when the Jewish people were permitted to return to Jerusalem after years in exile, but found that the city had been utterly destroyed. But Isaiah saw blooming flowers where his compatriots saw a barren desert. He saw God's glory and splendor, not the desecration of the temple. "Be strong, fear not!" he urged his neighbors, for God would save them (Isaiah 35:4). There are times and will continue to be times when we will look at the world, or the country, or our community, and see much to be pessimistic or downright hopeless about. But with the eyes of a prophet, with the eyes of faith, we can envision "the splendor of our God" emerging from the doom and gloom (35:2).

But it is not easy. Witness John the Baptist. What happened to the unborn child who leaped in the womb in Mary's presence when she herself was with child? What happened to his memory of the Holy Spirit coming down like a dove when he baptized Jesus? What happened to his certainty we saw last week when he announced that the kingdom was at hand? Perhaps the four walls of Herod's prison acted like a barrier to his deeper vision. Or perhaps he questioned why a Messiah who healed the blind and deaf and even raised the dead failed to free the imprisoned. What happened to proclaiming liberty to captives? Had God abandoned him? Have we not wondered the same ourselves?

When James refers to "the coming of the Lord" in this passage (5:7), he is speaking of Jesus' Second Coming, but it can be applied to the Lord's presence at any time. If it is really "at hand" (5:8), how are we not seeing it? How are we not feeling it? "Be patient," James counsels (5:7). In today's world, where communication, information, and entertainment are immediately available any time, it takes patience and thoughtful consideration to recognize the Lord. As we near the end of the season, let us ponder and discern the Lord's presence in our lives.

#### **Nicene Creed**

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

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When John the Baptist heard in prison of the works of the Christ, he sent his disciples to Jesus with this question, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Jesus said to them in reply, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me."

As they were going off, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John, "What did you go out to the desert to see? A reed swayed by the wind? Then what did you go out to see? Someone dressed in fine clothing? Those who wear fine clothing are in royal palaces. Then why did you go out? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet.

This is the one about whom it is written: *Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way before you.* 

Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."

#### The Symbolism of Light and Candles

Candles play such an important role in the life of the Church. When you enter a church, candles can be seen everywhere. They can be found on the altar, flickering before statues, and placed beside the Tabernacle. They play a prominent role during Advent, with the lighting of the Advent candles, but also during the Easter Vigil with the lighting of the Paschal Candle.

Candles most likely served a practical purpose in churches before electricity was commonly used. Candles are no longer used to simply to light a darkened room, yet they are still required during the liturgy. Their use has a much deeper biblical and symbolic meaning. Light indicates God's presence and glory. Both the Old Testament and Jewish tradition are filled with light references to and to candlelight.

#### **ERO CRAS**

On December 17, the "O" antiphons begin appearing at our liturgies at the gospel acclamation, helping us notice and shift into the last few days of Advent preparations for Christmas.

They are not antiphons when used in that way at Mass, however; they were first the antiphons to the *Magnificat* at Evening Prayer for each day. Each one offers a specific messianic title for the coming Christ:

December 17—Sapientia (Wisdom)

December 18—Adonai (Hebrew rendering of YHWH)

December 19—*Radix Jesse* (Flower of Jesse's Stem)

December 20—*Clavis David* (Key of David)

December 21—*Oriens* (Dawn, literally "The East")

December 22—*Rex Gentium* (King of All People)

December 23—*Emmanuel* (God with Us)







# LAMB OF GOD



If one takes the first letter of each Latin title, working in reverse from December 23 to 17, two Latin words emerge: *ERO CRAS*—which means, in English, "Tomorrow, I will be [there]." The familiar hymn *O Come*, *O Come*, *Emmanuel* is based on the "O" antiphons. Because their proper appearance in the church's liturgy is so late in the season, we use this hymn (or others based on the "O" antiphons) on the Third and Fourth Sundays of Advent.

# PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



The third Sunday in the season of Advent is by tradition also called "Guadete Sunday" from the original Latin text of the entrance antiphon for today: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near."

The celebration of the Lord's nativity draws closer. We rejoice.

Listen closely to the scriptural word this weekend. Allow the texts of the prayers to sink in. The Lord comes closer to us in this liturgy and speaks a message of consolation and challenge.

God's great plan for our salvation has already been set in motion. We are the recipients of a magnificent gift. God's very self becomes incarnate, dwells among us, and saves us.

The blind receive sight. The lame leap up. Lepers are made clean. The deaf hear. The dead are raised. The poor have Good News proclaimed to them.

We do not have to look any further than Jesus. He restores us to right relationship with his heavenly Father through the Holy Spirit. In that rightness of relationship, rejoice! Imagine how God wants you to become good news for others in this holy season.







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#### **COMMUNION ANTIPHON**

During communion we sing psalms and other songs that express our praise of the Father, our spiritual union in Christ, and our fellowship in the Holy Spirit.

Say to the faint of heart: Be strong and do not fear. Behold, our God will come, and he will save us. cf. Isaiah 35:4

After communion we spend some time in silent prayer and/or sing a psalm or song of praise.

# The month of December is dedicated to the *Immaculate Conception* (*celebrated Dec. 8*) and the *Divine Infancy*.

The first 24 days of December fall during the liturgical season known as *Advent* and are represented by the liturgical color purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

The remaining days of December mark the beginning of *Christmas Time*. The liturgical color changes to white or gold — a symbol of joy, purity and innocence. Christmas Time ends with the Epiphany, Jan. 8.

#### **BLESSING OF STRAW**

Many homes within our Catholic tradition place blessed straw in their homes. You can add it to your nativity scene, or you can follow the old custom and tuck it under the tablecloth. By putting straw on the table, we make our homes like Bethlehem, a word that means "the house of bread." Whenever we welcome guests to eat with us in love, our home becomes a place where God comes to live.

#### Prayer for Blessing of Straw:

Let us bless the Lord. Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation: You have made the earth fruitful with ripe wheat, which we have harvested from the land. Today we come before you with wheat straw. Soon we will use this straw to celebrate the birth of your Son in Bethlehem: For he is the Bread of Life, our Savior and Lord for ever and ever. **Amen.**






