



#### TODAY'S READINGS

#### Isaiah 9: 1-6

The prophet Isaiah lived 750 years before Christ. In his time, the northern Jewish Kingdom of Israel was laid waste by the armies of Assyria. Today's passage offers the conquered people hope for a glorious future under a wonderful king. Christians have seen Jesus as fulfilling this prophecy.

#### Psalm 96:1-2, 2-3, 11-12, 13

the Christian tradition, Psalm 96 has become the great psalm of Christmastime. The psalm celebrates the victory of the Lord who "in the sight of the nations . . . has revealed his justice."

#### Titus 2:11-14

The letter to Titus was written about 30 years after Paul's death, and was written in Paul's name, a practice common in the ancient world. Titus was a traveling companion of Paul, and later was in charge of a Christian community on the island of Crete.

#### Luke 2:1–14

On this most holy solemnity, we celebrate the birth of the world's true light. The Prince of Peace, whom Isaiah prophesied and the angels proclaimed, was born to Mary in the city of David, wrapped in swaddling clothes, and laid in a simple manger. There was no room for him in the inn, so let us always make room for him in our hearts, our lives, and world.

# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

#### REFLECTION

Luke's narrative of Jesus' birth is rich in symbolism. The evangelist begins his account by situating it against the background of the Roman Empire. Jesus is born during the reign of Augustus, who had brought a peace to the world that it had not known for centuries. Notice how the angels Jesus' birth proclaim to shepherds: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests" (Lk 2:14). Contrasted to the peace that Augustus brought through military power, the birth of Jesus will bring a far deeper and more lasting spiritual peace through God's grace that strengthens the bonds between God and humanity as well as among people.

Jesus' birth fulfills the prophecy of peace that we hear from Isaiah in the first reading: "For a child is born to us, a son is given us .... [He is] Prince of Peace" (Is 9:6). Luke's description also sets the stage for Jesus' ministry. His birth has universal significance. The first to learn of Jesus' birth were not kings in palaces but ordinary shepherds in the fields-people society looked down on. Jesus is born in a stable, lying in a manger, a feeding trough for animals, since there was no other place for him. Born like an outcast, Jesus identifies with all those whom society marginalizes and rejects. St. Paul's letter to Titus captures the implications of Jesus' birth for us. God's grace has been revealed in Jesus as God's salvation for all people. We are called to respond to this gift by leading lives that conform to the hope we have in our savior Jesus Christ.

The Nativity of the Lord (Christmas Day) carries such importance within the life of the Church that it is an entire period of liturgical time lasting nearly three weeks. The doctrine of the incarnation states a fundamental Christian belief that God's divine nature assumed a human nature.

A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Luke **R. Glory to you, O Lord.** 

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that the whole world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. So all went to be enrolled, each to his own town. And Joseph too went up from Galilee from the town of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David that is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. While they were there, the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to her firstborn son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Now there were shepherds in that region living in the fields and keeping the night watch over their flock. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were struck with great fear. The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel,

#### Apostles' Creed

#### Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven (genuflect) and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

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UNIVERSAL PRAYER

R. Lord, hear our prayer.

In other words, the unseen God became human. Both human and divine natures come together in the person of Jesus Christ. This became known as the "holy exchange," which tells us that the divine became a human being so that humans could become divine.

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light," Isaiah prophesied, looking ahead to the day that the Messiah would come (9:1). But Isaiah's words may be applied to more than just this blessed night. The two most holy events we celebrate each year occurred in deepest night. On this night, Mary gives birth to the Son of God. And before dawn on that first Easter morning, Jesus was raised from the dead. Tonight, Mary wraps her newborn son in swaddling clothes. Years later his body would be wrapped in a linen cloth. Mary lays her vulnerable infant in a wooden manger; one day her persecuted son would be nailed to a wooden cross. Jesus lay in a trough where animals fed. Years later, he became living bread, giving himself to be food for eternal life. Tonight, the angel of the Lord announces his birth to the shepherds. After the Resurrection, an angel of the Lord proclaimed the joyous news to the women who had come to anoint his body. Whether into the darkness of the Bethlehem night, out of the darkness of the tomb, or throughout our own darkness of sin and death, the unquenchable light who is the Lord comes into our lives, raises us up, and brings us abundant joy and great rejoicing.







# ANNOUNCEMENT OF EASTER AND THE MOVEABLE FEASTS

On the Epiphany of the Lord (Jan. 8), after the singing of the Gospel, a Deacon or cantor, in keeping with an ancient practice of Holy Church, announces from the ambo the moveable feasts of the current year according to the following text.

Know, dear brothers and sisters, that, as we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, so by leave of God's mercy we announce to you also the joy of his Resurrection, who is our Savior.

On the twenty-second day of February will fall Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the fast of the most sacred Lenten season.

On the ninth day of April you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the twenty-first day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the twenty-eighth day of May, the feast of Pentecost.

On the eleventh day of June, the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

On the third day of December, the First Sunday of the Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom is honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen.

#### THE CELEBRATION OF CHRISTMAS

The Church's liturgical season of Christmas is one of its shortest, but also one of its most unique. Within it is the eight-day celebration of the Lord's Nativity — known as the Christmas octave — as well as other feasts pertaining to the manifestation that Jesus is Lord of the nations. And there are feasts of several saints, many of whose stories contain special significance to the season. The configuration of the calendar relative to the season of Christmas is a bit complex. It always begins on the solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord — Dec. 25 — and ends on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, a movable feast roughly three weeks after Christmas. In the U.S., Dec. 25 and Jan. 1 are always holy days of obligation.

#### **RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION**

- The Communion Procession begins with the Communion Song which all are encouraged to sing with the music ministry. The communion song is an integral part of the procession.
- As the communion ministers leave the sanctuary, process to the front of the church in the procession while singing the communion song as best you can.
- When standing before the clergy or extraordinary minister bow (from the waist) as the Host (the Real Presence of Christ) is held before you. Do not genuflect when in the procession.
- 4. Stand and extend your hands from the middle of your chest to receive the Host. Your dominant hand is placed under the other hand as support. In essence you are making a throne
- 5. Say "Amen" as the minister says, "the Body of Christ".
- 6. Place the Host in your mouth and move away from the minister.
- 7. Additional devotion such as making the sign of the cross is not required but a decision of personal piety.
- 8. Return to your seat and participate in the communion song.
- When the tabernacle is closed and the priest is seated, all may sit to participate communally in a time of devotion until the Prayer after Communion is prayed.

#### LORD'S PRAYER

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, ... as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever.

#### SIGN OF PEACE

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles, peace I leave you, my peace I give you; ... Who live and reign for ever and ever.

#### R. Amen.

The peace of the Lord be with your always.

#### R. And with your spirit.

The Sign of Peace is a rite that calls us beyond sin and disunity to Christ's peace and communion. We are called as disciples to live this peace and communion that Christ gives us daily. This indeed becomes then a sign of hope for all peoples.


#### **COMMUNION ANTIPHON**



Christmas, by its very nature, is one of those times of the year to which we attach great importance. The feast itself acts as a kind of waypoint in the journey of life.




