



excitement bubbles Isaiah's over as he describes how the glory of the Lord will attract pilgrims to Jerusalem from all over the world. Paul preaches that all people—Gentiles as well—are equal partners in this new faith, coheirs to kingdom. In the Gospel, we hear the story of the magi, journeying to Bethlehem to offer their gifts to the newborn king. May God's word inspire us as we make our own journeys to the new Jerusalem.

QUESTIONS FOR THE WEEK

Where can you look for Christ? Have others found Christ within you?

Epiphany originated in the Eastern church and at first included a celebration of Jesus' birth. By 354 Jesus' birth was being celebrated in Rome on December 25, and later in the 4th century the church in Rome began celebrating **Epiphany** separately on January 6. Since Vatican II the feast is transferred to the nearest Sunday.

FIRST READING Isaiah 60:1-6

The last part of the book of Isaiah contains the words of a prophet who lived after the Jews returned from exile in Babylon (which is modern-day Iraq). They found their temple destroyed and the city leveled. But with great faith the prophet envisions a wonderful future for Jerusalem.

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the Lord shines, and over you appears his glory. Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance. Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather and come to you: your sons come from afar, and your daughters in the arms of their nurses.

Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow, for the riches of the sea shall be emptied out before you, the wealth of nations shall be brought to you. Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the Lord.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

COMMENTARY

Where do you suppose the magi expected to end up when they began their journey from the east? A bright star like the one they had seen at its rising was regarded as a sign that a great ruler was born. As they traveled, they must have marveled at this especially bright star growing brighter and brighter each night as they drew closer to Bethlehem. We are told that their initial destination, however, was nearby Jerusalem. Of course! It was the most prominent city in the area, the capital of Judea, the site of the temple, the home of the king. Where else would they look for a newborn ruler as powerful as this star? But God's signs are rarely as straightforward as we would like. Much as David was the unexpected choice among Jesse's sons, the Son of David was not found where the magi expected—not in Herod's home, not in a palace, not in Jerusalem at all. They found the newborn king in a feeding trough, in a stable, in the last place they would have expected. Before his death, Jesus himself surprises his disciples as to where they can find him, telling them he is found in the least among them. Then and now, he can be found where we least expect him. May we reorient our vision.



SECOND READING

Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

The Ephesians were a community in which Jewish and Gentile converts to Christianity lived side-by-side. The author of this letter confirms that God's saving grace is available to everyone, whatever their ethnic or religious background.

Brothers and sisters: You have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for your benefit, namely, that the mystery was made known to me by revelation. It was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

Today is a feast of gospel reversals. In our Christmas creches, the magi may seem "odd men out" in the humble company of Mary, Joseph, and

A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

R. Glory to you, O Lord.

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.



The chalking of the doors is one of many popular customs for Epiphany. This household tradition includes the ritual marking over the home's main entrance with the year, crosses, and the first initial of the traditional names of The Three Kings (Caspar, Melchior, Balthazar): 20 + C + M + B + 23. The custom also holds that the three initials are the first letters for the Latin text, *Christus mansionem benedicat* ("Christ bless our home").

Bless, O Lord God almighty, this home, that in it there may be health, purity, the strength of victory, humility, goodness and mercy, the fulfillment of your law, the thanksgiving to God the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord.


