

THE INTRODUCTORY RITES

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

All the earth shall bow down before you, O God, and shall sing to you, shall sing to your name, O Most High! Psalm 66(65):4

The entrance, offertory, and communion antiphons reflect the liturgical spirit of the day or season. Another psalm or hymn of similar spirit may be used in its place per the General Instruction of the Roman Missal.

Introduction to the Liturgy

We call this period of the liturgical year "Ordinary Time," but this time after Christmas is not ordinary at all, for it is now that we learn about the first days of Jesus' public life. In today's Gospel, John testifies that the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus when John baptized him, meaning that the Holy Spirit joined in Christ's entire mission. The Holy Spirit descended upon us in our own baptism as well. May we be conscious of that divine presence as we join in Christ's mission during our own ordinary time.

Together we join our voices in praise singing the Entrance Hymn.







Before we receive the Lord in the Eucharist, we hear the words, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." We will hear these words in today's Gospel, for they were first proclaimed by John the Baptist. John, Isaiah, and Paul all testify to how the Lord has called them and changed their lives. May we be inspired by them and take to heart what we sing in the responsorial psalm: "Here am I, Lord; I come to do your will."

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

REFLECTION

Isaiah, Paul, and John. Each one prepares us for the coming of the Lord. Isaiah calls the people of Israel back home after many years of exile in Babylon. But they are not the only ones. God has made the prophet a light to the nations, so that salvation can reach all the way to the ends of the earth. This sounds joy-ous, and it is, but it is also challenging. Isaiah welcomes not just descendants of but everyone, Abraham, enemies, even those who had just held them captive. But this is the way light works. It does not discriminate; it shines on everyone. Paul, apostle to the Gentiles, knows this well. Corinth was nearly a thousand miles from Bethlehem or Galilee or Jerusalem. Yet its people were just as welcome to become Christian, to become brothers and sisters in faith, as those who could trace their lineage back to David. John the Baptizer, the mystic emerging from his time in the wilderness, saw the Holy Spirit descend upon Jesus when he baptized him. Like light, the Spirit illuminates the whole world. Today we are called to follow their lead—shining the light of Christ, passing on the Spirit, spreading the saving grace of God family, throughout our community, and our world.



The month of January is traditionally dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus. The Jesuits celebrate the Holy Name of Jesus on January 3 as the order's titular feast.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 49:3, 5-6

The book of Isaiah in four different places speaks of a mysterious servant of God. This servant is sent to do great and marvelous things that touch the entire world. Christians have traditionally thought of Jesus as the fulfillment of these passages.

The Lord said to me: You are my servant, Israel, through whom I show my glory. Now the Lord has spoken who formed me as his servant from the womb, that Jacob may be brought back to him and Israel gathered to him; and I am made glorious in the sight of the Lord, and my God is now my strength! It is too little, the Lord says, for you to be my servant, to raise up the tribes of Jacob, and restore the survivors of Israel; I will make you a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 40:2, 4, 7–8, 8–9, 10

We hear this psalm at some big moments in the church year; it is often associated with Mary and proclaimed in conjunction with the annunciation story. But it is also a fitting way to start this new segment of the liturgical calendar. Here, at the beginning of Ordinary Time, we place ourselves in the presence of God; we assume a posture of listening; and we state our intention to live

Sacrifice or offering you wished not, but ears open to obedience you gave me. Holocausts or sin-offerings you sought not; then said I, "Behold I come." **R**.

I announced your justice in the vast assembly; I did not restrain my lips, as you, O Lord, know. **R**.

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SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 1:1-3

For the next several Sundays our second reading will be taken from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians. Today's reading presents the opening words of that letter. It is an example of the salutation used in classical letter writing: Paul identifies himself, acknowledges the community to whom he is writing, and extends warm personal greetings.

Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Sos-thenes our brother, to the church of God that is in Corinth, to you who have been sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be holy, with all those everywhere who call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, their Lord and ours. Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

John 1:29-34

It is easy to see foreshadowing of John the Baptist in Isaiah's reference to himself as one "formed as [God's] servant from the womb." After all, we see John's first moment of action when he leaps in Elizabeth's womb, recognizing Jesus in joy even before either of their faces was visible.

COMMENTARY

Both Isaiah and John the Baptist were blessed with the eyes of faith, the wisdom to understand what they were seeing, and the will to proclaim it. Despite years in exile in Babylon, Isaiah saw the day when God's salvation would come to the whole world. John saw something like a dove descend upon Jesus and realized that this was the Holy Spirit. Baptized with the same Holy Spirit, we too are able to see with the eyes of faith: to recognize the Lord in the word of God just proclaimed, in the Eucharist we are about to share, and in each other and in our world. Do we recognize the Lord as Isaiah and John did?

"If see something, you something" tells us to report something out of place or suspicious. John the Baptist followed this directive in a different way, however, when he saw Jesus coming toward him. He said something all right, but he said it to publicly testify that this was the Son of God, who came to take away our sins. With our eyes of faith we have seen the Lord as well—in the Eucharist, in this community gathered together in his name, and in the stranger in need. We are also called to testify to the presence of Christ where we see him.


Seven times in the first chapter of his Gospel John uses a form of the word testify to describe what John the Baptist has come to do. The word suggests a witness in a courtroom. Much later, when Jesus is called before Pilate to testify, he tells Pilate that he has come into the world "to testify to the truth" (John 18:37). John's Gospel itself is his testimony of the Lamb of God, willingly led to slaughter to take away the sin of the world. To be a Christian is to be called to testify to the truth we know in the Lord.

At least once a year, Christians are reminded of Jesus' prayer for his disciples that "they may be one so that the world may believe" (John 17.21). Hearts are touched and Christians come together to pray for their unity. Congregations and parishes all over the world exchange preachers or arrange special ecumenical celebrations and prayer services. The event that touches off this special experience is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Prayer: God of all, our hearts and bodies are thankful for opportunity to come before you to confess our sins of injustice and divisiveness. Together we come before you, a holy family, united in the beautiful diversity of your creation: some of us are Indigenous peoples, some of us are descendants of the enslaved, some of us are descendants of the enslavers, some of us are migrants, some of us are refugees, but all of us are part of the one Body of Christ. We praise you that through the living waters of baptism our sins, red as scarlet, were washed away and we were healed, as we became part of the beloved community, the family of God. We offer our thanksgiving and praise to you, Creator God. Together on this journey, we celebrate with our hearts and eyes open to understanding and growing in the sacred wisdom that is shared and passed amongst all people. Help us to embrace unity with each other and remind us that we are of one family gathered by your Holy Spirit, in the midst of your creation. Amen.

Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God."



LIVING OUR LITURGY

Becoming Witnesses: Today we are called to witness Christ, which is no ordinary undertaking. There is a beautiful tapestry by John Nava hung over the baptismal font at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles. What is captivating about this piece of art is its

simultaneous simplicity and grandeur depicting the baptism of Jesus. The simple image is one of John the Baptist (facing the viewer) pouring water on the bowed head of Jesus whose back is to the viewer. The



central tapestry of this five paneled monochromatic work is profoundly ordinary in its portrayal of the sacrament yet the message of mission and identity that it proclaims is far from ordinary. Baptismal identity is not only about a conversion to Christ but a witnessing to the world in the light of Christ. Baptism sends us out to claim our identity as Christians who imitate Christ as

light to the nations. Christian witness first requires the humility of Christ. We bow to whatever God calls us to. God has chosen us. Witness does not always involve grand gesture but can be simple acts. Teresa of Calcutta's witness to the poorest of the poor in Calcutta reminds us that little by little the work of God gets done through us, inspiring the saying: "We can do no great things, only small things with great love." These days of ordinary time ought to be filled with extraordinary witness. The "ordinary" only refers to the ordering of weeks between the seasons of Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter. It does not refer to a diminished quality of the liturgy. And so, we recognize the importance of our everyday actions in witnessing our Christian faith with joy and humility.

In the New Testament the word 'liturgy' refers not only to the celebration of divine worship but also to the proclamation of the Gospel and to active charity" (CCC 1069)




