## THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

#### 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise.

#### Matthew 5:1–12a

Blessed are the lowly, the sorrowing, the poor in spirit.

Ordinary Time gives us the opportunity to focus on the ordinary aspects of our faith and realize their continuity through history. Take the value of humility. Centuries before Zephaniah the Jesus, told people of Judah to seek humility. In the early years of Christianity, Paul explained that God chose the lowly to show that the arrogant are nothing before God. Finally, we hear Jesus teach his disciples that the meek and lowly will inherit the land. Now-two years thousand later—may God's word call us to humility as well.

### Questions for the Week

How can you grow in humility? Can you recognize the blessedness of your dependence on God?

#### **COMMENTARY**

What does it mean to be truly humble, not merely avoiding boastfulness and arrogance, and certainly not full of the false humility that just draws attention to itself? To see what humility really means, let's look at today's readings. Zephaniah says those who are humble observe God's law. They realize that God's law provides a better foundation for living than their own selfish interests. The prophet also says that the humble and the lowly take refuge in the Lord. They rely on a higher power

#### FIRST READING

Zephaniah 2:3, 3:12-13

Zephaniah was a prophet who lived 700 years before Christ. These were bad times for Israel, marked by idolatry and unfaithfulness to the law. In today's passage, we will hear the prophet call the people to become part of a remnant, that is, a select few who would carry their holy tradition into future generations.

Seek the Lord, all you humble of the earth, who have observed his law; seek justice, seek humility; perhaps you may be sheltered on the day of the Lord's anger. But I will leave as a remnant in your midst a people humble and lowly, who shall take refuge in the name of the Lord: the remnant of Israel. They shall do no wrong and speak no lies; nor shall there be found in their mouths a deceitful tongue; they shall pasture and couch their flocks with none to disturb them.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

In this psalm, we hear an affirmation of the gospel's message that God's values are not our own. God's efforts-God's preferential love-are for those who are oppressed, imprisoned, and estranged, those who would be seen as lesser in most societies.



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The Lord keeps faith forever, secures justice for the oppressed, gives food to the hungry. The Lord sets captives free. **R**.

The Lord gives sight to the blind; the Lord raises up those who were bowed down. The Lord loves the just; the Lord protects strangers. **R**.

The fatherless and the widow the Lord sustains, but the way of the wicked he thwarts. The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, through all generations. Alleluia. **R**.

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#### SECOND READING

#### 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

The majority of early Christians were of the lower class. When Paul left the Greek city of Corinth (a major seaport of the ancient world), he was succeeded by Apollos, who was apparently a more polished preacher. Paul grew concerned that the Corinthian Christians were becoming more captivated with oratory than with the heart of the Gospel message.

Consider your own calling, brothers and sisters. Not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. Rather, God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong, and God chose the lowly and despised of the world, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who are something, so that no human being might boast before God. It is due to him that you are in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, as well as righteousness, sanctification, and redemp-tion, so that, as it is written, "Whoever boasts, should boast in the Lord."

for safety and comfort. Saint Paul draws a clear line between those who recognize that their calling is from God and those who ignore that. Those who ignore it think they are wise and strong and noble, and that they got this way on their own. But those who live in Christ realize that they share in the wisdom and power of God, enabling them to the boast in Lord. acknowledge that God is the source of all our abili-ties and talents. Jesus calls the meek and the poor in spirit, the insulted and persecuted, blessed. They are blessed, for they have the humility to recognize that they are not in control of their own fates, that they must rely on God for salvation and satisfaction. To be truly humble is to recognize that ultimately none of us is in control of our own success. We depend on God.

#### INTRODUCTION TO THE GOSPEL

Sitting down in the posture of a rabbinic teacher, Jesus calls his disciples to himself. The crowd is certainly not excluded from what Jesus is saying, but his disciples are at the heart of the people to whom they are called to minister. As we heard last week, only four disciples have been called so far, so it is not the Twelve but the community of disciples, the church to which we belong, that Jesus is addressing in this gospel. Our eyes need to look out and be directed by Jesus's words to the wider "mountain view"-not just to those more immediately around us, but also to our larger society and world.





Showcasing what makes Catholic schools the best for every parent, family, and child is the priority for conducting Catholic Schools Week.

What usually happens during National Catholic Schools Week is the observance of Catholic Masses, assemblies, open houses, seminars, and many other activities for every family, parishioner, and community member. The quality and distinction of Catholic schools can be seen through these, especially for the young, those who will attend enter school. The theme and logo for National Catholic Schools Week for the year 2023 is "Catholic Schools: Faith, Excellence, Service."

The first Catholic school that opened in the United State was called St. Mary's School in Philadelphia, in 1783. After some time, the enthusiasm and curiosity for Catholic education grew and the nation noticed a massive inflow of Catholics from all over the world. By the 1920s, more than 6,000 Catholic elementary schools accepted and enrolled almost two million students and employed 42,000 teachers. By the latter half of that century, enrollment grew, even more, reaching double the number students. Ever since Catholic schools have been widely perceived and established as a viable means of education.
