Jesus himself is the light who shone through the darkness from the very moment he was born. Now he challenges his disciples to be that light—the light of Christ—for others. We are given that same challenge. May we be conscious of receiving the Lord today in the word and the Eucharist, so that we may go forth to shine the light of Christ, transforming the darkness around us.

Isaiah has some advice to help us disperse the darkness and live in the light. Hint: Light is meant to be shared. Paul is determined to bring the light of faith to the Corinthians by displaying the power of the Holy Spirit. Jesus tells his disciples to let their light shine for all to see. May God's word inspire us to be like the just one responsorial in the psalm, lighting the way for others through the darkness.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

COMMENTARY

Are you a practicing Catholic? It seems silly to ask that question here, for you are practicing your faith at this very moment. "Attends Mass on Sundays" is often shorthand for "practicing Catholic." But the word of God that we hear today offers a different perspective. In this passage from Isaiah, the Lord com-mands us to feed the hungry, to set the oppressed free, to shelter homeless, to clothe the naked. This is what heals and vindicates us. This is what brings light to the gloom. We know from the feeling we get when we do something good for someone else that this is how to practice our faith. Saint Paul was the first to admit that he brought faith to others not through his words or his wisdom, but through a demonstration of the Holy Spirit working through him. Jesus calls his disciples the light of the world. Their light needs to shine for all, so "that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father" (Matthew 5:16). This then is a necessary part of being a practicing Catholic: doing good for those in need. In doing so we practice our faith, we become vindicated in God's eyes, and we live as God wills for us.

Question for the Week

What will you do this week to shine as Christ for others, to practice your Catholic faith?



World Marriage Day is celebrated every year on the second Sunday in February, sometimes coinciding with St. Valentine's Day. This year, it takes place on February 12. World Marriage Day officially began in 1983 in the United States of America. The purpose of World Marriage Day is to emphasize the beauty of marriage and to honor husbands and wives for their faithfulness and sacrifices.

FIRST READING Isaiah 58:7-10

The Jewish people had just returned from exile in Babylon. They were poor. The prophet in today's reading reminds them of the religious practice that pleases God most of all, and he encourages them to share the little they have with one another.

Thus says the Lord: Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed; your vindication shall go before you, and the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer, you shall cry for help, and he will say: Here I am! If you remove from your midst oppression, false accusation and malicious speech; if you bestow your bread on the hungry and satisfy the afflicted; then light shall rise for you in the darkness, and the gloom shall become for you like midday.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 112:4-5, 6-7, 8-9

This psalm echoes the imagery of both gospel and first reading; people who act in justice and generosity are both recipients and conduits of God's very own light.



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Light shines through the darkness for the upright; he is gracious and merciful and just. Well for the man who is gracious and lends, who conducts his affairs with justice. **R**.

He shall never be moved; the just one shall be in everlasting remembrance. An evil report he shall not fear; his heart is firm, trusting in the Lord. **R**.

His heart is steadfast; he shall not fear. Lavishly he gives to the poor; his justice shall endure forever; his horn shall be exalted in glory. **R**.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD



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SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 2:1-5

In this reading, Paul continues to address the problem of factions in Corinth. One group followed a Christian named Apollos, an eloquent preacher who came there after Paul had left. Some criticized Paul because his oratory didn't compare with that of Apollos. In today's passage, Paul defends his preaching style.

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, proclaiming the mystery of God, I did not come with sublimity of words or of wisdom. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. I came to you in weakness and fear and much trembling, and my message and my proclamation were not with persuasive words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of Spirit and power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.



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INTRODUCTION TO THE GOSPEL

When Jesus calls his disciples "the salt of the earth," he is suggesting by this metaphor that they have a responsibility for savoring the world with God's love, making it more to "God's taste" (see 2 Kings 2:19-22), healing its wounds. The other comparison that Jesus makes is to light. Disciples are the light of the world, as the Rite of Baptism declares by the presentation of the burning candle.



February 11 is *World Day of the Sick,* an observation introduced by Pope Saint John Paul II as a way for believers to offer prayers for those suffering from illnesses.

From Pope Francis: "Illness is part of our human condition. Yet, if illness is experienced in isolation and abandonment, unaccompanied by care and compassion, it can become inhumane. let us turn our thoughts to the Shrine of Lourdes, a prophetic lesson entrusted to the Church for our modern times. It is not only what functions well or those who are productive that matter. Sick people, in fact, are at the center of God's people, and the Church advances together with them as a sign of a humanity in which everyone is precious and no one should be discarded or left behind.

"To the intercession of Mary, Health of the Sick, I entrust all of you who are ill; you who care for them in your families, or through your work, research and volunteer service; and those of you who are committed to weaving personal, ecclesial, and civic bonds of fraternity. To all, I impart my heartfelt blessing."

World Day for Consecrated Life was celebrated in the Church on Feb. 2 and is celebrated in parishes this weekend. Please pray for all those who have made commitments in the consecrated life, and be sure to thank them on their special day.





THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

Introduction to the Eucharistic Prayer

Around this table we are given a mere glimpse of the light that will fill the halls of the heavenly banquet. Here, we are called to become light for this world, giving everyone we meet a glimpse of the glory of God.



The Preface is like the overture of the Eucharistic Prayer. Preface means "before the act," and refers to the great works of the Eucharistic Prayer, center of the celebration of the Mass. The reason for this preface is to thank God for all of God's gifts, for all of the favors that God has granted us throughout the history of salvation. The Preface echoes the theme of the day or liturgical season with over 90 different prayers to choose from The Preface always concludes with an acclamation—the Holy, with its text entirely from Scripture, Isaiah 6:3, Ps. 118:26, Rev. 4, and Matthew 21:9. The translation of "hosanna" is "please, save us".

The Mystery of Faith or Memorial Acclamation follows the Institution narrative — the words Jesus used at the Last Supper over bread and wine.

This acclamation is our response to God's coming to dwell among us, particularly in the transformation of bread and wine into Christ's Body and

We make the Eucharistic Prayer our own and complete the great Trinitarian Doxology by singing "Amen" at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer It is the most solemn Amen of the Mass. With this 'Amen', the we ratify the holy Sacrifice of the Mass. St. Augustine says, "To say 'Amen' means to endorse.
