Let us take this opportunity to be enlightened by his teachings.

The Collect is the official term for what is generally known as the Opening Prayer. After the invitation "Let us pray" the entire assembly prays in silence, bringing their own prayers to the Mass. The priest then gathers these silent prayers into one prayer. All members of the assembly should learn to pray in silence. We respond "Amen" (so be it) at the conclusion of the prayer.

FIRST READING

4.

The book of Sirach was written by a wise teacher who lived 200 years before Christ. Sirach ran a school for young people in Jerusalem. In today's passage, he urges his students to make the right choices in life.

If you choose you can keep the commandments, they will save you; if you trust in God, you too shall live; he has set before you fire and water; to whichever you choose, stretch forth your hand. Before man are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses shall be given him. Immense is the wisdom of the Lord; he is mighty in power, and all-seeing. The eyes of God are on those

who fear him; he understands man's every deed. No one does he command to act unjustly, to none does he give license to sin.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

The psalm states briefly and explicitly what the other readings get at more obliquely: "Open my eyes, that I may consider the wonders of your law." God's commands sometimes feel like a drudgery because of the consequences of sin, but they are in fact a gift, a gracious revelation that enables us to live wholeheartedly aligned with Christ.




Blessed are they whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the Lord. Blessed are they who observe his decrees, who seek him with all their heart. R.

You have commanded that your precepts be diligently kept. Oh, that I might be firm in the ways of keeping your statutes! **R.**

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 2::6-10

Paul continues to address the Corinthian community, who criticized him because, according to Greek standards, he lacked wisdom. To the Greeks, wisdom meant a certain pattern of logical reasoning that followed fixed forms. In this reading, Paul speaks of a wisdom that is far greater than this.

INTRODUCTION TO THE GOSPEL

Jesus affirms that the commands of Mosaic Law still stand, and also reveals that by-the-book obedience to them is not enough. Righteousness is not just a checklist we can tick off; it is , not a measurable accomplishment. The orientation of our hearts matters more than the externals of our actions.

A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Matthew **R. Glory to you, O Lord.**

Matthew 5:17-37 or 5:20-22a, 27-28, 33-34a, 37

In the shorter form of the Gospel, the four passages in brackets are omitted.

Jesus said to his disciples: **(** "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I

say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all things

have taken place. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do so will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. But whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called greatest in the kingdom of heaven.]

tell you, unless your righteousness Ι surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven. "You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, You shall not kill; and whoever kills will be liable to judgment. But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judg-ment; and whoever says to his brother, 'Raqa,' will be answerable to the Sanhedrin; and whoever says, 'You fool,' will be liable to fiery Gehenna. Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Settle with your opponent quickly while on the way to court. Otherwise your opponent will hand you over to the judge, and the judge will hand you over to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Amen, I say to you, you will not be released until you have paid the last penny.

"You have heard that it was said, You shall not commit adultery. But I say to you, everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. [If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body thrown into Gehenna. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body go into Gehenna. "It was also said, *Whoever divorces his wife must give her a bill of divorce*. But I say to you, whoever divorces his wife—unless the marriage is un-lawful causes her to commit adultery, and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.]

"Again you have heard that it was said to your ancestors, *Do not take a false oath, but make good to the Lord all that you vow.* But I say to you, do not swear at all; [not by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by the earth, for it is his footstool; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Do not swear by your head, for you cannot make a single hair white or black.]

Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,' and your 'No' mean 'No.' Anything more is from the evil one." Jesus said to his disciples: I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven. 
The Gospel of the Lord.

The word raqa generally is thought to be of Hebrew origin coming from a root that means "empty." In this context, the word used as an insult would indicate that someone is *empty-headed or foolish*. In Jesus' account, using this insult involves a violation of the law with regard to the Sanhedrin, the Jewish legal body.
