


Following the Greeting.

COLLECT

Because the Gloria (Glory to God) is a festive song, during Lent it is omitted from Mass except on March 19, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, and March 25, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord.

FIRST READING Genesis 12:1-4a

The first 11 chapters of Genesis have very little historical foundation but they teach religious truths parable form. Today we begin 12th chapter which the stories contains with identifiable historical roots. The first of these is the call of Abraham, whose original name was "Abram".

The Lord said to Abram: "Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father's house to a land that I will show you. "I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you and curse those who curse you. All the communities of the earth shall find blessing in you." Abram went as the Lord directed him.

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to be still and present to God's movement in the silence. Stillness accompanies silence. It is the time during the Liturgy of the Word for us to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

What crosses have I not even thought to carry, but my taking them up could ease the burden for someone close





SECOND READING

2 Timothy 1:8b-10

The second letter to Timothy, although probably written some 30 years after Paul's death, was written in his name. This was an acceptable practice at that time. It was not a forgery, but an acknowledged way of continuing someone's spirit and authority. In this passage, the author encourages the readers in the face of trials.

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Introduction to the Gospel Proclamation

The gospel story of the transfiguration describes a vision showing Jesus in his heavenly glory. But before that point is reached, Jesus must first be raised from the dead, emphasizing the paschal mystery and that there can be no eternal life with God without death.

Jesus took Peter, James, and John his brother, and led them up a high moun-tain by themselves. And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light. And behold, appeared to them, Elijah and conversing with him. Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Lord, it is good that we are here. If you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." While he was still speaking, behold, a bright cloud cast a shadow over them, then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." When the disciples heard this, they fell prostrate and were very much afraid. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Rise, and do not be afraid." And when the disciples raised their eyes, they saw no one else but Jesus alone. As they were coming down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, "Do not tell the vision to anyone until the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."

HOMILY

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE INSIGHTS

In Scripture, the desert is the place to discover the limits of the human spirit, and the mountain is the place to encounter the spirit of God. During Lent, we visit both: last week the desert, today the mountain. In the first reading, God directs Abram to leave his homeland for a new land. An encounter with God often leads to a journey. This journey represents a new spiritual discovery in the relationship with God. When we speak of our Lenten journey, we don't actually take a trip but rather embark on a spiritual journey, an exercise of self-examination. The instruction to Abram is to take up a physical journey-a lot to ask of a whole household. But this is an account of divine providence, and the author lists five blessings that God will provide. Whenever God asks us to move into the future and deepen our relationship with him, we accompanied by blessings only God can provide.

The psalmist prays on behalf of the people and expresses an abiding trust in the Word of the Lord. This trust comes from reflecting on God's past actions. As the future unfolds, those who have trusted in the Lord will not be disappointed. God will be their only salvation.

The transfiguration of the Lord is an example of a biblical theophany. Jesus goes "up a high mountain" (Mt 17:1) accompanied by James and The details John. of the transfiguration event have echoes with other such theophanies, such as Moses' time on Mount Sinai when he received the Law and his face shone brightly (see Ex 34:35) and when God spoke to him from the cloud (see Ex 34:5-7). Similar events occurred at the baptism of Jesus as he began his ministry. These details signal that the mission of Jesus is rooted in the history of God's saving intervention. As Jesus and the apostles come down from the mountain, it is clear that this work of God will continue.




COMMENTARY ON THE READINGS

God speaks from the cloud at the Transfiguration, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5). Those last three words were given to his disciples as a command then, and they are given to us as well, for we too are his disciples. Are we listening to Jesus today? Are we making the effort to listen for Jesus' voice during this holy season? Whether we look inside ourselves or out into the world, we can see plenty of things that could be done, plenty of things that we should do, plenty of things that Jesus is asking us to do.

Just before this scene, Jesus had told his disciples that he will be persecuted by the authorities and put to death. Peter had immediately rebuked him, to which Jesus responded, "Get behind me, Satan! . . . You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do" (Matthew 16:23). Significantly, Peter is one of the three who now hear God say about Jesus, "Listen to him." It's almost as if God is saying: My Son is telling you the truth. You better listen! You need to understand this!

After confronting Peter's rebuke, Jesus speaks to the other disciples, telling them, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny [themselves], take up [their] cross, and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). God affirms this statement in commanding Peter, James, and John to listen to Jesus. This command is addressed to us as well. If we are to come after Jesus, if we are to be raised to eternal life with him, we must deny our own desires, take up our crosses, and follow him.





PROMPTS FOR FAITH-SHARING

What helps to reassure you of God's presence when it is not obvious?

What helps you listen to the voice of God, especially when-as is most common for most of us — God is speaking in whispers and hints?

Where in your life of faith do you need patience with God? What would help you to faithfully wait for God, who does not often work on the timelines we would have chosen for ourselves?

LITURGY AND LIFE

St. Teresa of Avila can serve as inspiration for Lent. She trusted in God despite years of spiritual desolation and was canonized almost five hundred years ago today. In your prayer this week, ask for her intercession as you strive to place greater trust in God.

Many saints and mystics have described experiences of utter claritywhen reality moments transfigured before their eyes and suddenly appeared in a shining glory. For example, Thomas Merton saw ordinary people on a street corner suddenly shining with light and love; St. Hildegard saw a vision of the Trinity bathed in fire and light; St. Francis saw the crucified Christ surrounded with flaming seraphwings. But for most of us, the clear vision of the mystic mountaintop remains elusive, and the transfigurations we witness are simpler and smaller. Are we alert enough to notice them when they come?



Fridays of Lent are days of obligatory abstinence for those between age 14until age 59. Traditionally Fridays of Lent are devoted to remembering the Passion of the Lord and in such we do not eat meat. Eggs, milk, fish, grains, and fruits and vegetables are allowed.

Code of Canon Law 1251

The next three Sundays are a special time for the Church and a significant time for our Elect and for the Elect around the world. This is the period in which they celebrate the scrutinies, three occasions in which they look deeply and honestly into their hearts and thoughts to learn weaknesses and tendencies, so that their intentions may be purified and their resolve may be strengthened. It is also an opportunity for each of us to examine our own conscience and pray that the Holy Spirit strengthen our weaknesses as well as we journey toward the Great Vigil of Easter on April 8. The Scrutinies begin next Sunday at 10 a.m.

The Triduum The word "Triduum" can mean any three-day period of prayer that typically precedes a feast day. The Easter Triduum (or Paschal Triduum) is the three days of prayer that precede the celebration of Easter. These three days see the celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 6, a Good Friday Liturgy, April 7, that recalls the Passion and Death of Jesus Christ, and finally, the three days culminate in the celebration of Christ's Resurrection at the Easter Vigil, April 8, after nightfall on Holy Saturday but before dawn on Easter Sunday. The "mother of all holy vigils", on this night, the Church keeps vigil for the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is also at this Mass that the Church welcomes its newest members through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist). There is not a more joy-filled or a more glorious celebration on this earth than the Easter Vigil. A lot more could be said, but words just won't do it justice. These days are the culmination of the entire church year because they celebrate the Paschal Mystery which is the basis of our faith, dying Christ destroys our death and rising he restores our life
