

#### Introduction to the Liturgy





#### FIRST READING Exodus 17:3-7

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

The woman in today's Gospel comes to the well to draw water, something she had probably done every day of her life as far back as she could remember. But on this day she encounters the Messiah and her whole life changes. We have an opportunity right now to encounter the Lord in the word of God. May our lives be changed by the words we hear today.

#### QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

What can I do or say that will show others the living water that I have found in Jesus, the water that satisfies my spiritual thirst? Will I make that my mission this week?

#### COMMENTARY

Water. Without it, we would not long survive. In ancient times, entire villages and towns would develop around a reliable well. In today's Gospel, we meet a Samaritan woman on her daily trip to Jacob's well. There she meets a stranger who offers her a different kind of water: water that will quench one's thirst forever, "water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14). This living water, water the woman dearly wants as soon as she hears of it, is the very water poured over us in baptism. We already have within ourselves the living water that Jesus offers. This living water can satisfy so many of our thirsts: our thirst for eternal life, our thirst for meaning, our thirst for God. In the Sinai desert, the Lord gave life-sustaining water to the Chosen People despite grumbling. At Jacob's well, Jesus slaked the deep thirst of the Samaritan woman despite checkered past. In Jesus, God pours out the water of eternal life despite our sinfulness. To this we testify.

In those days, in their thirst for water, the people grumbled against Moses, saying, "Why did you ever make us leave Egypt? Was it just to have us die here of thirst with our children and our livestock?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? A little more and they will stone me!" The Lord answered Moses, "Go over there in front of the people, along with some of the elders of Israel, holding in your hand, as you go, the staff with which you struck the river. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock in Horeb. Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink." This Moses did, in the presence of the elders of Israel. The place was called Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled there and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord in our midst or not?"

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# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

#### **SECOND READING**

Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

In writing to the Romans, Paul is dealing with a community he had not yet visited. Many Roman Christians were converts from Judaism who believed they would be saved by how they lived out the Jewish Law. Paul stresses here, as he does frequently in his writings, that Christians are saved not by the Law, but by faith — faith in what Jesus accomplished by his dying and rising.

Brothers and sisters: Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith to this grace in which we stand, and we boast in hope of the glory of God. And hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the un-godly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.

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#### Introduction to the Gospel Proclamation

When John wrote his gospel, he was well aware that Samaria had been the first region beyond Jerusalem to receive the good news (see Acts 8:2-9; 9:31). John is writing after the fact of the historical acceptance of the Gospel, but he sees it as what it truly is: an encounter with Jesus through the preaching of the early church.

Today and for the next two Sundays we will meet three fascinating Gospel characters: the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, and Lazarus. They will show us-those of us already baptized and those preparing for baptism at the Easter Vigil (the Elect) - how Jesus is constantly transforming us. All the Scriptures on these days present images of baptism and conversion. Paul's theology of baptism runs throughout his Letter to the Romans. Today we hear him say: "The love of God has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit" (Rom 5:5) like the waters in which we were baptized. Our salvation, he reminds us, comes from God's grace, not our own efforts. We must live according to that grace. In today's Gospel Jesus converses with the Samaritan woman. Although the story begins with Jesus' thirst, it is the woman who is refreshed. She enters the story as a catechumen and becomes an evangelist, bearer of Good News!

In her encounter with Jesus, we see a healing narrative arc for the woman at the well. She begins from a place of defensiveness; she knows Iews usually think Samaritans. She continues in a guarded manner, giving only a partial answer when asked about her husband. Deciding that this must be a prophet, she moves to challenge Jesus, asking intelligent questions to probe his wisdom. When he reveals to her his identity as Messiah, she finally arrives in a place of trust such trust that she leaves her water jar behind and becomes a powerful evangelist, her testimony the cause of many neighbors' belief.

Such is the power of encounter with Christ; one who is known to be sinful, who slinks to the well in the heat of the day to avoid the crowds of cooler times, is transformed into one whose testimony is so powerfully true that the same townspeople who would have judged her are transformed, too.

#### **TODAY'S SCRIPTURE INSIGHTS**

At first the woman was befuddled by this stranger. Why would this Jewish man speak to her, an unaccompanied Samaritan woman? And why did he come to Jacob's well without a bucket or jug? Then she was amazed. Somehow he knew her entire marriage history and that she was not married to the man she lived with. Finally, she believed. At first she recognized him as a prophet, then she realized he was the Messiah himself. Over the course of an extraordinary conversation, she came to believe, and her newfound faith led her to go forth to testify to her neighbors about the Christ.

Today we celebrate the first of three Scrutiny Sundays. It is an occasion to look deeply and honestly into our own hearts to uncover and heal whatever is sinful and bring forth what is good so that it may be strengthened. When encountered the woman at the well, he looked deep within her and saw her history, and he also sparked that flicker of faith deep within her, faith in a Messiah who would tell her everything. Immediately she became his missionary, testifying to everyone she knew about what he had said and done, telling everyone that he really was the One. As these scrutinies lead our Elect to the waters of baptism in Christ, may they provide the opportunity for us to continue the mission of the baptized, to testify to everyone we know what Christ has done.

The waters of baptism cleanse us of our sins even as they quench our spiritual thirst. The water God provided for the Chosen People in the desert did as well. God provided water, giving them sustenance and forgiveness. Jesus could shamed the woman for her many marriages, but instead he offered her living water, water to give her life eternal. Similarly, we do not deserve the life-giving water we receive in baptism, but Jesus offers it to us, as Paul would say, while we are still sinners, in mercy and love.

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him,

"How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" —For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water. "I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking with you." Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him.

When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."



#### What Are the Scrutinies?

The next two Sundays are special time for the Church and a significant time for our Elect and for the Elect around the world. This is the period in which they celebrate the scrutinies, three occasions in which they look deeply and honestly into their hearts and thoughts to learn weaknesses and tendencies, so that their intentions may be purified and their resolve may be strengthened. It is also an opportunity for each of us to examine our own conscience and pray that the Holy Spirit strengthen our weaknesses as well as we journey toward the Great Vigil of Easter on April 8. The Scrutinies continue next Sunday at 10 a.m.

The scrutinies are intended to complete the conversion of the Elect. The term "scrutiny" sounds judgmental, invasive, and antiquated. What's worse, the ritual includes an "exorcism", which sounds medieval, sensational, and horrific. The Roman Ritual of the Catholic Church calls for the performance of three scrutinies in the weeks preceding the baptism of the Elect. The scrutinies have a long and honored history in the Church. Scrutinies are first mentioned by Ambrose of Milan (339-397). They examined the holiness of candidates by exorcising their bodies and spirits. "So far the mysteries of the scrutinies have been celebrated. These sought out whether impurities clung to anyone's body. Through the exorcism not only of the body but also of the soul, sanctification was searched for and grasped." The ritual suggests several important points: Scrutinies are for the Elect. It is the Elect who bow their heads or kneel while the assembly stands to intercede for them. The celebration of all three scrutinies helps the Elect on their journey toward baptism, even as it reminds the assembly of the season's penitential spirit, which they too are called to embrace. Ultimately, scrutinies are about conversion. They are about leaving behind one way of life and taking up another.

## THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

#### **R**EVIEW OF THE **R**EADINGS

Today we accompany Jesus as he meets the woman at the well. The setting is Samaritan town of Sychar (Shechem), noteworthy because of its association with the patriarch Jacob, though the Old Testament never mentions the well of Jacob. Samaritans were not considered by Judeans to be truly Jewish, as they worshipped not at the temple (which was in Judea) but at Shechem ("on this mountain"). Jesus tells the woman that there will come a time (considered fulfilled at the time of the writing of the Gospel of John) "when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth."

Water emerges as a major player in today's readings. The Israelites thirst for water. Jesus encounters the Samaritan woman drawing water from a well. In both cases, water serves to meet a basic biological need-and more. Jesus speaks of living water, the kind that satisfies thirst forever. Those who drink of it shall enjoy eternal life.

This focus on water midway through Lent draws our attention and prayers to those in our community and around the world who are preparing for baptism. In a few short weeks, they will be submerged in lifegiving water and emerge forever changed as members of the Body of Christ. The Lord provides all the water we need to never thirst again.

The Lenten scriptures teem with images of reconciliation and this Sunday's readings are no exception. The Rite of Penance (also known as Reconciliation and Confessions) are celebrated weekly at Divine Mercy (see the weekly calendar for days and times.)

Remember in your prayers our students who will participate in their First Reconciliation celebration during the next two weeks.
