They are the people who constantly brainstorm to come up with ways to welcome, invite and inspire parishioners to be part of our amazing faith community.




They are the people who clean up the pews after Mass or bring Holy Communion to nursing homes, hospitals and the homebound.

Engaging Children's Hearts

SEASON OF SACRAMENTS

Divine Mercy Children's Ministry has been blessed with bountiful sacraments and sacramental preparations this past month. We held a First Communion Retreat for nearly 50 First Communicants, held a Reconciliation Service for our Confirmands, a First Reconciliation and then Confirmation for nearly 50 children from Children's Ministry, Sacred Heart School and Northridge Prep. Blessings multiplied.

FIRST COMMUNION RETREAT

Thanks to our wonderful, engaged catechists, we were able to bring back our traditional First Communion Retreat after a three-year pandemic hiatus. Children made bread with their parents, which was baked in the Parish Center oven; created *Makelt* plates; practiced receiving the Eucharist; and participated in a Last Supper play.



Children's Ministry Board member Tim Womack was Jesus in all four plays! The children also had a chance to play Mass Bingo, which tested their parents' knowledge as much as their own! We had tremendous participation, great volunteer help from our board, including Bobbie Weiss, Tim Womack, and Stephanie

RECONCILIATION

Prior to Confirmation, all candidates receive the sacrament of Reconciliation. The Service, led by Father Steve Lanza along with Father Bob Heinz, was prayerful but joyful. The Examination of Conscience, read by our students, offered everyone a chance to reflect. It is a blessing to pause during this Lenten season, to hear the beautiful music and to have a few moments to recognize our failings while knowing we are forgiven.

FIRST RECONCILIATION

Our First Communicants carefully prepared for this special sacrament. They made beautiful votives, a parish tradition, gluing pieces of cut tissue paper onto a glass votive. The Agnew girls – Molly and Ellie – graciously offered to put a finished coat of seethrough glue on each votive. After the children completed their reconciliation, they met their parents to light their candle, signifying that Christ is lighting the way. At the end of the service, all the candles are brightly shining in the darkened church. It is beautiful. They take them home that night, and hopefully will light them during special gatherings and prayerful times in the years to come. They are beautiful lit at Christmas, reminiscent of stained glass windows.



Our 7th graders received a teen Bible this past month as part of their Confirmation journey. Each Bible is personalized and presented during a special service, which was led by Father Bob Heinz. Our wonderful 7th grade catechists – Sam Fifer, Jeff Link and Dan Hagedorn, along with teen aide Jimmy White – presented each Bible and Father Bob gave each child a blessing. What a gift! Father Bob shared many stories and memories about growing up, when the Bible only sat on the coffee table rarely to be opened except to add a sibling's latest sacrament. But he also shared that through his years as a priest and pastor he has opened, read and fallen in love with the scriptures. Amen!

CONFIRMATION

Bishop Robert Casey, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Chicago, came to the parish on Tuesday, March 21 to

confirm 50 children. Every pew was filled. It was a beautiful sight with anxious sponsors, proud grandparents, excited parents and well-dressed candidates. The music soared, the Bishop's homily encouraged children

to live out their faith with funny and relevant stories, and the children all looked proud and happy as they were anointed with the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Bishop Casey's words resonated as he encouraged the children to continue to actively build their faith. Despite the staggering statistic that only 15 percent of those confirmed continue to practice their faith, he encouraged them: "Be the #16!" We continue

to seek ways to involve our teens in the faith and are thrilled to have 18 active teen aides this year, the most we've ever head.

Next up, sessions, our May Crowning Family Mass and three First Communions on Mother's Day weekend. Amen!

Connected Through Service

While a student at the University of Notre Dame, John Russell volunteered for three years with the Big Brothers Big Sisters Program. He remembers the first time he went to the home of his little brother, who lived in public housing, and saw how the boy lived. This first-hand experience of poverty stuck

with John for the rest of his life, leading him to advocate for school choice so that poor, inner-city children, like his little brother, could have greater opportunities in life.

John believes that while education is a key social justice issue, it is crucial to pair service with faith. A man of great personal faith who also leads our parish's online Rosary group that meets at 7:30 am on weekdays, the link to which can be found on our website homepage www.divinemercynorthshore.org. John notes that, "You have to pray hard."

After being involved for many years with school choice programs, John became an early leader in the organization that became Empower Illinois. Through Empower Illinois, the Big Shoulders Fund, and a few other organizations, taxpayers can contribute to the Illinois Invest in Kids scholarship program. This program offers a 75 percent income tax credit to individuals and businesses that contribute, and then provides scholarships for students whose families meet the income requirements to attend qualified nonpublic schools.

There are two reasons John remains involved in education issues. The first is to help create a more equitable education system so that poor, inner-city children can leave public schools that are unsafe and academically failing, to attend private schools. The other is to help the Catholic school system, which faces financial challenges in innercity environments but also offers unique benefits that only faith-based education can provide. As

"The benefit it gives a kid to go who attend Tolton will go to a college prep high school and from there go on to college," school of one of the Divine Mercy sharing parishes, St.

to Augustus Tolton versus a local public school is huge. Those kids John says, referring to the parish Moses the Black.

While between 6,000-7,000 children benefit from tax credit scholarships each year, the program can grow by an additional 30 percent to reach more students. John notes that the program is not widely known, and the taxpayer must take some steps to participate. The steps are not hard, however, and help is available. "You can just call Empower Illinois, and they'll walk you through what to do," he says.

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
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
