
Introduction to the Liturgy

TODAY'S READINGS

Acts 10:34a, 37-43

Apostle The Peter was originally skeptical about preaching the Gospel to non-Jews. But one day, the Holy summoned him Spirit preach to a Gentile — the pagan army officer Cornelius and his household. Today's passage is a portion of Peter's sermon, which summarizes the life and ministry of Jesus.



Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23

The sheer, wholehearted rejoicing of this psalm reminds us that God is working in unexpected ways, for it is the stone rejected by the builders that God chooses as the cornerstone.

Colossians 3:1-4

The letter to the Colossians depicts Christ as the only mediator between God and the world. A previous passage of the letter presented baptism as the way we are united with Christ. The author will today remind us of the heights to which Christ has raised us, and then call upon us to live up to this.

FIRST READING

Acts 10:34a, 37-43

Peter proceeded to speak and said: "You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

John 20:1-9

The Lord be with you.

R. And with your spirit.

A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to John **R. Glory to you, O Lord.**

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

TODAY'S READINGS

Easter Sunday crowns the Triduum celebration and begins a new period of time within the liturgical year. Easter Sunday is the pattern and purpose for all other Sunday celebrations of the year and begins a time of reflecting on how the followers of Jesus came to receive and understand his resurrection from the dead.

"The Lord is truly risen, alleluia," proclaims today's entrance antiphon. All three readings speak to this foundational confession. In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter witnesses to the life, death, and resurrection of Christ Jesus and draws out its significance for us: "Everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name" (Acts 10:43)

Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, also expresses the meaning of Christ's death and resurrection for us. Since we have been raised with Christ, our focus should not be on things of this world, but we must "seek what is above where Christ is seated at the right hand of God" (Col 3:1).

One figure central to all of the Gospel accounts of Jesus' resurrection is Mary Magdalene. The early Christians called her "the apostle to the apostles." She was the first to break the news to the disciples of the empty tomb and the first to witness the risen Lord.

In today's reading from John's Gospel, Mary, on discovering the tomb to be empty, tells this news to "Simon Peter and the other disciple whom Jesus loved" (Jn 20:2). The two run to the tomb. The Beloved Disciple arrives first but, out of deference, allows Peter to enter the tomb before him. Peter sees the burial cloths lying there. When the Beloved Disciple enters, the narrator deliberately comments that "he saw and believed" (20:8). Until this time, they had failed to understand Jesus' teaching that "he had to rise from the dead" (20:9). The Beloved Disciple was the first to believe. Only through love does one come to grasp the mystery of Jesus' resurrection and God's love for us.

REFLECTION

Easter is filled with energy in our parish as we celebrate the removal of the rock from the haunting tomb. Christ has resurrected and new life flows abundantly. That new life is seen in the explosion of sacramental celebrations following the Lenten fast. The Easter Vigil starts it off with a triple play of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. The sanctuary blossoms with life and fragrance.

The paschal candle has its proper place either by the ambo or by the altar and IS lit at least in all the more solemn liturgical celebrations of the season until Pentecost Sunday, whether at Mass, or at Morning and Evening Prayer. After Easter Time the candle is kept with honor in the baptistery, so that in the celebration of Baptism the candles of the baptized may be lit from it. In the celebration of funerals the paschal candle is placed near the coffin to indicate that the death of a Christian is his or her own passover.

The celebration of Easter is prolonged throughout Easter Time. The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday are celebrated as one feast day, the "great Sunday".

This sacred period of fifty days concludes with Pentecost Sunday, when the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Apostles, the beginnings of the Church, and the start of her mission to all tongues and peoples and nations are commemorated.

The whole Church rejoices at the forgiveness of sins, which is not only for those who are reborn in holy Baptism, but also for those who have long been numbered among God's adopted children". By means of a more deeper spiritual effort, all who celebrate the Easter feasts will by the Lord's grace experience their effect in their daily lives.

EASTER FOODS AND THEIR MEANING

Candle(s)—Represents Christ as the Light of the World. These can be blessed and placed on your table during Easter Dinner.

Easter Bread—A round or long loaf topped with a cross, symbolic of Jesus, who is the Bread of Life.

Eggs (either colored eggs or decorated with symbols of Easter)—Indicates new life and Christ's Resurrection from the tomb. You may color your eggs red. The red egg symbolizes the Blood of Christ shed on the Cross. Its hard shell represents the sealed tomb and cracking it symbolizes the Resurrection.

Horseradish—an element of the ancient Passover, this bitter herb mixed with vinegar is symbolic of the Passion of Christ and the sour wine given to Jesus on the Cross.

Butter—Dairy products are included to celebrate the end of Lent and the richness of our salvation; reminds us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things Butter is often shaped into a lamb or a cross. This reminds us that Christ is the true Paschal Lamb who takes away the sins of the world.

Salt—A reminder that Christians who glory in the Risen Christ are called to be "Salt for the Earth" and "Light for the world." (Pepper may also accompany salt as a condiment. Also symbolic of the Passion).

Sausage—whose round shape reminds us of unending life.

Easter Meats (ham, lamb or veal)—reminders of the abundant life God has called us to live.

Smoked Bacon—With its great fattiness, it is a symbol of the overabundance of God's mercy and generosity.

Cheese—Symbolic of the moderation Christians should have at all times.

Wine—A bottle of wine can be added to the contents of the basket in remembrance of the Blood given up by Jesus on the Cross.

Sweets—Fruits, candy, poppy seed and nut rolls, pastry items; to name a few, symbolizes the promise of eternal life or good things to come.

Holy Water—Used to bless the home, animals, fields and used in various rituals

throughout the year. Take home bottles will be available after the Easter Vigil and all Sunday Masses on Easter Day.

LITURGY AND LIFE

EASTER SYMBOLS

The fleur-de-lis, "lily" in French, is a



popular Easter symbol of the resurrection. The three flourishing petals also symbolizes the Holy Trinity.



Butterflies are a powerful metaphor of the resurrection. Jesus Christ was buried in a dark tomb for three days, and then emerged, still

himself but changed and glorified. The parallel to a butterfly is striking; caterpillars "bury" themselves within a chrysalis, emerging as transformed butterflies.

In ancient time many held the belief that



the peacock's flesh never decayed, even after it died. Early Christians adopted the bird as a symbol of the Resurrection. In medieval times, it was also thought that peacocks molt (shed their

feathers) every year, and the new ones that grow are more beautiful than the old ones. Along with this idea, medieval legends included the theory that the gorgeous colors of a peacock's feathers came from a special diet: It was believed that peacocks could kill and eat poisonous serpents, ingesting the poison and transforming it into the colors of their feathers. This too contributed to their being an apt symbol of Christ's Resurrection, since Christ "became sin" [cf 2 Corinthians 5:21] for us on the Cross, but then rose from the dead with his glorified body and wounds having conquered the powers of evil.

BLESSING FOR THE EASTER MEAL You shower us with blessings, O God of love. In this season of joy, when we celebrate Christ's Death and Resurrection, you continue to bless and protect us. As we prepare to share this meal, keep us mindful of those who this night will die of hunger. As believers who have put on Christ in Baptism, make us bearers of gospel justice. Bless this food and the friendships we share. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

EASTER SYMBOLS

The Paschal Candle at the front of the church, represents Christ the Light of the World. The candle is made of pure beeswax representing the sinless Christ who was formed in the womb of his mother. The wick signifies Jesus' humanity, the flame, his Divine Nature, both soul and body.

During last night's Easter Vigil, a new fire, symbolizing our eternal life in Christ, was made. The candle, is blessed by the priest who then inscribes in it a cross, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, (Alpha and Omega `the beginning and the end') and the current year, as he says a prayer; then he inserts five grains of

incense into the candle to form a cross. The incense recalls the aromatic spices used to prepare Jesus' body for the tomb, and the five wounds in his hands, feet, and side. Five "nails" are inserted into the candle to hold the incense in place. After lighting the candle from the fire, the deacon carries it in procession into the dark church proclaiming "Christ, our Light" as the assembly responds, "Thanks be to God". The Easter candle is lighted each day during Mass throughout the eight Paschal week Season, until Pentecost Sunday, the final Sunday of Easter Time.



Receiving Holy Communion

- 1. The Communion Procession begins with the Communion Song which all are encouraged to sing with the music ministry. The communion song is an integral part of the procession.
- 2. As the communion ministers leave the sanctuary, process to the front of the church in the procession while singing the communion song as best you can.
- 3. When standing before the clergy or extraordinary minister bow (from the waist) as the Host (the Real Presence of Christ) is held before you. Do not genuflect when in the procession.
- 4. Stand and extend your hands from the middle of your chest to receive the Host. Your dominant hand is placed under the other hand as support. In essence you are making a throne.
- 5. Say "Amen" as the minister says, "the Body of Christ".
- 6. Place the Host in your mouth and move away from the minister.
- Additional devotion such as making the sign of the cross is not required but a decision of personal piety.
- 8. Return to your seat and participate in the communion song.
- When the tabernacle is closed and the priest is seated, all may sit to participate communally in a time of reflection until the Prayer after Communion is prayed.




