PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



Last weekend we celebrated our patronal feast day on the Second Sunday of Easter/Divine Mercy Sunday. I was reading a little booklet of Pope Francis entitled "The Name of God is Mercy."

In one section of the booklet, he says: "Jesus said he came not for those who were good but for the sinners. He did not come for the healthy, who do not need the doctor, but for the sick. For this reason, we can say that mercy is God's identity card. God of Mercy, merciful God. For me, this really is the Lord's identity. . . . So mercy is deeply connected to God's faithfulness. The Lord is faithful because he cannot deny himself. This is explained well by Saint Paul in the Second Letter to Timothy: 'If we are unfaithful, he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.' You can deny God, you can sin against him, but God cannot deny himself. He remains faithful."

On this Third Sunday of Easter, let us extol the God of mercy who loves us deeply and is so very faithful to us!

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY

As we continue our celebration of Easter, we praise God for this miracle that brings new life to us all, and we pray that we will continue to grow in understanding of the many ramifications of this event.

Today we hear the story of how two disciples making their way back to Emmaus slowly grow in understanding until the moment the stranger they'd met on the road breaks bread with them. Suddenly they recognize the Lord in their midst. May we always be open to recognize the Lord in our midst as well.

Alleluia!

Today's Gospel reading vividly reveals the transforming power of an encounter with the risen Lord. Two bitterly disappointed disciples are leaving Jerusalem, where their hopes have been destroyed. Jesus, "the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word" (Lk 24:19) and whom they believed had promised a new kingdom, had been crucified, died, and was buried. All their hopes and expectations have come to nothing. Along the road to Emmaus, a stranger joins them, and share with him their they frustrations. The Gospel reading contains a remarkable message for us and every generation. Like those disciples on the road to Emmaus, we encounter the presence of the risen Lord time every we gather to hear the Scriptures proclaimed and witness the bread of the Eucharist broken. "The Church has always venerated the divine Scriptures just as she venerates the body of the Lord, since, especially in the sacred liturgy, she unceasingly receives and offers to the faithful the bread of life from the table both of and Christ's God's word of body" (Dei verbum, 21).



INTRODUCTION TO THE FIRST READING

of None the Scripture readings during the sevenweek Easter Time are from the Old Testament. But the Acts of the Apostles, which is read every Sunday during Easter, frequently quotes Old Testament passages which the early Christians saw as fulfilled in Jesus. Today's reading gives part of Peter's sermon at the first Pentecost. Peter quotes from Psalm 16 which, like most of the Psalms. popularly was thought to have been written by David.

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.



Then the Collect is prayed.

FIRST READING

Acts 2:14, 22-23

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed: "You who are Jews, indeed all of you staying in Jerusalem. Let this be known to you, and listen to my words. You who are Israelites, hear these words. Jesus the Nazorean was a man commended to you by God with mighty deeds, wonders, and signs, which God worked through him in your midst, as you yourselves know. This man, delivered up by the set plan and foreknowledge of God, you killed, using lawless men to crucify him. But God raised him up, releasing him from the throes of death, because it was impossible for him to be held by it. For David says of him:

I saw the Lord ever before me, with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed. Therefore my heart has been glad and my tongue has exulted; my flesh, too, will dwell in hope, because you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your holy one to see corruption. You have made known to me the paths of life; you will fill me with joy in your presence.

"My brothers, one can confidently say to you about the patriarch David that he died and was buried, and his tomb is in our midst to this day. But since he was a prophet and knew that God had sworn an oath to him that he would set one of his descendants upon his throne, he foresaw and spoke of the resurrection of the Christ, that neither was he abandoned to the netherworld nor did his flesh see corruption. God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses. Exalted at the right hand of God, he received the promise of the Holy Spirit from the Father and poured him forth, as you see and hear."

They recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread.

Luke tells us one of the most beautiful stories of Iesus' appearances after his resurrection in his account of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. Though they do not recognize him until he breaks bread with them, they realize at once that their hearts had been burning within them as he broke open the scriptures for them on their journey. May the scripture we hear today set our own hearts aflame as we take in the wonder and triumph of the Easter event.



QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Luke says that at first the disciples' "eyes

were prevented from recognizing him" (24:16).

What prevents me from recognizing the Lord in our midst?

LITURGY AND LIFE

Doing what is called the examen on a daily basis can help people discover how God is working in their lives. The Examen also helps with recognizing the many positive, loving people who are in our midst. Just as the two disciples walking on the road toward Emmaus did not recognize Jesus, we often don't realize how Christ walks with us during our daily routine as well as through our struggles.

The Daily Examen is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us. The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience. The method presented here is adapted from a technique described by Ignatius Loyola in his Spiritual Exercises. St. Ignatius thought that the Examen was a gift that came directly from God, and that God wanted it to be shared as widely as possible. One of the few rules of prayer that Ignatius made for the Jesuit order was the requirement that Jesuits practice the Examen twice daily-at noon and at the end of the day. It's a habit that Jesuits, and many other Christians, practice to this day.

This is a version of the five-step *Daily* Examen that St. Ignatius practiced.

- 1. Become aware of God's presence.
- 2. Review the day with gratitude.
- 3. Pay attention to your emotions.
- 4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it.
- 5. Look toward tomorrow.

SECOND READING

1 Peter 1:17-21

The Christians for whom the first letter of Peter was written were recent converts from paganism. They found themselves a small minority in pagan surroundings. Their neighbors and local authorities made life miserable for them. Today's passage offers encouragement by remind-ing them that Jesus died and rose for them.

Beloved: If you invoke as Father him who judges impartially according to each one's works, conduct yourselves with reverence during the time of your sojourning, realizing that you were ransomed from your futile conduct, handed on by your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold but with the precious blood of Christ as of a spotless unblemished lamb.

He was known before the foundation of the world but revealed in the final time for you, who through him believe in God who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them, "What are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who

does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive.

Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recog-nized him, but he vanished from their sight.

Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread.

Keeping joy, as I learned while I was suffering from depression, isn't an easy task. While suffering may mark the first part of the Easter story, it isn't the last part that is essential for all of us faithful to remember.

1 Peter 1:3 reminds us to praise God and to recognize that "In

his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." Easter is about a "living hope," not one that is gone in a day, but one that lives in us.

My family celebrates Easter Time with intention, just as we do Lent. Here are a few practices we've adopted that have lightened my soul and altered our family culture around the Easter Season:

We practice gratitude daily.

In a personal journal, I write down at least two things that I'm grateful for each day. These can be as small as walking the dog or enjoying the sunshine. When I pick my children up from school, I ask them to practice this with me. "What brought you joy today?" I inquire. Because I have elementaryage schoolchildren, I delight in their stories of races won and lost at recess, of learning new science facts in school, and of lunchtime antics between their many friends.

We create an Easter Time family calendar.

We began this practice with Advent, and we've learned that liturgical calendars based around the Easter season help us partake in at least one joyful, praising activity each day. For Easter Time, some of these activities include reading a Catholic book together, singing worship songs, dancing, celebrating Saints with Feast Days during the season like Saint Catherine of Siena, finding and planting flowers, serving others in the community, and praying. We build these calendars around what works in our home, and each day the children mark off what we've accomplished. "We can't go to bed without dancing!" they'll exclaim, and they'll be right.

Even on days when I don't feel ready to praise, the calendar reminds me — and my family that Easter is the season of joy, of living and sharing in the happiness that is Christ's resurrection.

Mystagogy

According to the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, the Fifty Days of Easter (Easter Time) make up the Period of Mystagogy for the newly baptized and received, as well as for the entire community. Mystagogy means "savoring the mysteries." The entire Easter season is a time for the newly initiated and the entire community to deepen their grasp of the paschal mystery through sharing in the Eucharist, meditating on the Easter Scriptures, and sharing in works of charity (RCIA, 244). Two books help new Catholics (and "seasoned" Catholics as well) celebrate this Easter season of mystagogy. The Fifty Days of Joy: Easter Season Reflections for New Catholics by Fr. Dennis Chriszt is a great resource to assist new Catholics in celebrating the fifty days of Easter Time. The book contains seasonal scripture readings as well as reflections to assist new Catholics in their journey through the fifty days. Fr. Richard Fragomeni's work, In Shining Splendor, is a wonderful book for every Catholic. It contains a reflection for each of the fifty days of Easter based on a portion of the Exsultet, The Easter Proclamation proclaimed at the Vigil. Available from giamusic.com.

LITURGY CAN BE MEANS OF CONVERSION

A person who attended the Easter Vigil on April 8 upon the invitation of a friend, approached a staff member and said how much they were moved by the liturgy and Worship. This individual then asked, "I've not been to church for so long, how do I learn more so that I can return?" Without hesitating, the immediate reply was an invitation to attend our Alpha sessions to reconnect with the church.






