TODAY'S READINGS

Acts 2:14a, 36–41 The promise is made to all.

Psalm 23:1–3a, 3b–4, 5, 6 The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.

1 Peter 2:20b–25 Jesus bore our sins upon the cross.

John 10:1–10 Jesus is the gate for the sheep.

Peter echoes the words of John the Baptist in the first reading-"Repent and be baptized"though he can also tell the people that they will receive the Holy Spirit. In his letter, he encourages us to look to Christ as an example when we suffer for doing what is right and good. In the Gospel, Jesus, the Good Shepherd, describes himself as the gate through which we can find life abundant and eternal. Let us look to the Lord as our shepherd, who provides all that we shall need, all that we shall want.

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

FIRST READING

Acts 2:14a, 36-41

In last Sunday's reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we heard a portion of Peter's sermon at the first Pentecost. Today's passage gives the last part of that sermon, and the reaction of those who heard it.

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed: "Let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified." Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart, and they asked Peter and the other apostles, "What are we to do, my brothers?" Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is made to you and to your children and to all those far off, whomever the Lord our God will call." He testified with many other arguments, and was exhorting them, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand persons were added that day.





INTRODUCTION TO THE PSALM

Psalm 23 can sometimes feel blunted by familiarity; it comes up frequently in the liturgical year, plus it is ubiquitous on wall plaques and throw pillows, sometimes to the point of watering down its beautiful and powerful imagery of God as our shepherd. If you find your eyes glazing over at this psalm, try to spend some time with it in imaginative prayer. Really bring to life the scenes it paints, including what each of your five senses would experience if you were in the loving care of God as described today.

LITURGY & LIFE

For many of us, baptism was long ago. We might take for granted that we are part of God's flock of sheep and do not remember what it was like to ever be outside it. This is an important season to listen to the witness of those more newly initiated into the church; their stories of coming in from the outside are often very powerful and can remind us of what we're about. If you are a newer convert, consider ways you might share your story with those around you.

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Mystagogy

Together with Church's the neophytes, the new lambs, we constantly listen to the voice of Jesus that calls us into the safety and security of a belonging community. We hear the call to find Christian identity within a flock that listens to each other and embraces love for all. Through the distractions of this world, are we able to identify various voice patterns for diversity, equity, and inclusion? Each pattern locates a particular need and each cry for help provides an entry point to compassionate listening. Like the two on the road to Emmaus, we sometimes miss recognizing the voice and presence of Jesus in our midst.

INTRODUCTION TO THE GOSPEL

In this gospel for Good Shepherd Sunday, Jesus mixes his metaphors a bit. We usually think of him as the Good Shepherd, and he is that; he is the one who contrasts with the thief sneaking in to steal and slaughter. He is the one who calls us by name and whose voice we know. He is the one

who provides our sustenance and protection. in this But parable, he also identifies himself as the gate into sheepfold. the This is an even humbler image than that of shepherd, for in



this metaphor, he is not even human. He is our way, our path to all that is good and real. It is through him that we enter safety and rest. And it is he who serves as our protection, because he has conquered those evil forces in the world that would wish us harm.

SECOND READING

1 Peter 2:20b-25

Today's passage from the first letter of Peter was addressed to Christian slaves who were being treated harshly by their pagan masters. The author reminds them that they are members of a flock whose shepherd walked ahead of them in the face of insults and unjust treatment. encouragement by reminding them that Jesus died and rose for them.

Beloved: If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in his footsteps. He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth. When he was insulted, he returned no insult; when he suffered, he did not threaten; instead, he handed himself over to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body upon the cross, so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. For you had gone astray like sheep, but you have now returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Jesus said: "Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever does not enter a sheep-fold through the gate but climbs over elsewhere is a thief and a robber. But whoever enters through the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has driven out all his own,

he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice. But they will not follow a stranger; they will run away from him, because they do not recognize the voice of strangers." Although Jesus used this figure of speech, the Pharisees did not realize what he was trying to tell them.

So Jesus said again, "Amen, amen, I say to you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy; I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

QUESTIONS FOR THE WEEK

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is also known as Good Shepherd Sunday. In today's Gospel proclamation Jesus portrays himself not as the shepherd but as the gate, the door to the sheep fold, the place where the sheep are housed and protected. It was customary for the shepherd to sleep in the entrance of the sheepfold to provide security for the sheep against predators or thieves. Jesus' self-portrait assures us of his unconditional love for us.

What better comfort could we have than his promise that he has come among us so that we "might have life and have it more abundantly" (Jn 10:10)?

How can I be that gate, in imitation of Jesus?

How do I protect others from danger or trauma and how do I comfort those who are lost or in pain?







The feast day of Philip, along with that of James the Less, was traditionally observed on 1 May, the anniversary of the dedication of the church dedicated to them in Rome (now called the Church of the Twelve Apostles). Philip was born in Bethsaida, Galilee.

He may have been a disciple of John the Baptist and is mentioned as one of the Apostles in the lists of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and in Acts. Aside from the lists, he is mentioned only in John in the New Testament. He was called by Jesus himself and brought Nathanael to Christ. Philip was present at the miracle of the loaves and fishes, when he engaged in a brief dialogue with the Lord, and was the Apostle approached by the Greek Jews from Bethsaida to introduce them to Jesus. Just before the Passion, Jesus answered Philip's query to show them the Father, but no further mention of Philip is made in the New Testament beyond his listing among the Apostles awaiting the Holy Spirit in the Upper Room. According to tradition he preached in Greece and was crucified upside down

at Hierapolis under Emperor Domitian. His feast day is May 3.





OUR SAINTS

In 1955, Pope Pius XII declared May 1 as the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker. This date is also International Workers' Day and believed to reflect Joseph as the patron saint of workers.

Symbols associated with Joseph include the carpenter's square and lily. The carpenter's square not only symbolizes Joseph's trade but also the concept of truth. The lily, represents purity and Joseph's celibate marriage to the Virgin Mary. Although we know Joseph as a working carpenter, he is descended from royal lineage, the line of David.

Joseph is the patron saint of the Universal Church, families, fathers, expectant mothers, travelers, immigrants, house sellers and buyers, craftsmen, engineers and working people, among others.



Joseph is also considered to be the patron saint of the New World, China, Canada, Korea, Mexico, Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Peru, Vietnam and several cities and dioceses.






