PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus says to his disciples (to us), "Do not let your hearts be troubled." Sometimes as we follow the news of the day it's hard for us not to be troubled.

There's certainly a lot in the world around us to be concerned about. Even if you are not following the news, there's also probably a good number of things in your own personal life or in the life of your family to be concerned about or "troubled."

At every Mass, during the Communion Rite, we remind ourselves of the promise of Jesus's farewell gift of peace to us, his disciples. And then we offer to one another a sign of Christ's peace.

It's possible to be both concerned (or troubled) about something or someone and yet at the same time to cultivate the peace of Christ within our hearts so that we are not overwhelmed by the tough stuff in life. May we each find in this gathering the spirit of peace, the farewell gift of Jesus, the peace of Christ.



COLLECT YOUR BREAD TAGS, HELP PEOPLE IN NEED & THE ENVIRONMENT!

The square, hard plastic tags at the end of bread bags, bagel bags, potato bags, bags of citrus, etc. are made from a very clean natural resource - 100% petroleum. Unfortunately due to processing equipment, they are not recyclable in your curbside cart at home, and throwing them in the landfill is just contributing more to harmful greenhouse gases that cause climate change.

And now we have an alternative - collect them at home and return them to us! We will pass them onto **Danielle Cares for Chairs**, an organization that collects these bread tags and sells them to recyclers in bulk. The money received is then used to buy wheelchairs for people in need all over the world! Just this past year, Danielle Cares for Chairs collected 1.2 million bread tags - that's over 2000 lbs of bread tags that were saved from the landfill. At the start of 2022, Danielle Cares for Chairs had donated 11 wheelchairs to people in need. Considering it takes at least 260,000 bread tags to buy one wheel chair, that is very impressive!

Easter Time, we are During invited to reflect on all the wonderful implications of the Resurrection. The early Church grew and expanded to the extent that more leaders were needed to minister to everyone. We are, as Peter puts it, "living stones," built upon the cornerstone who is Jesus. In the Gospel, Jesus assures his disciples that he is preparing dwelling places for them in his Father's house. Let us place our trust in the Lord, that we will one day reach God's dwelling place.



A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

The nature of the Church's ministry emerges in the first reading from Acts. In response to the continued growth of the early Church, the apostles choose seven men, filled with the Holy Spirit, to share their ministry of service. The role of deacon (from the Greek word diakonein, "to serve") emerges. Preaching (leading people in worship of God) and service (caring for the poor) are the two foundational pillars of ministry.

FIRST READING Acts 6:1-7

In Jerusalem at the time of Christ, some Jewish people spoke Greek, others spoke Ara-maic, and each group went to its own synagogue. It appears that the apostles were among those who spoke Aramaic. In today's reading, we will hear some of the problems this created in the Christian community and how these were addressed.

As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Hellenists complained against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. So the Twelve called together the community of the disciples and said, "It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Brothers, select from among you seven reputable men, filled with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to this task, whereas we shall devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word." The proposal was acceptable to the whole community, so they chose Stephen, a man filled with faith and the Holy Spirit, also Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicholas of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these men to the apostles who prayed and laid hands on them. The word of God continued to spread, and the number of the disciples in Jerusalem increased greatly; even a large group of priests were becoming obedient to the faith.

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SECOND READING

1 Peter 2:4-9

The first letter of Peter was written to a Christian community that felt alienated from their pagan neighbors. Today the author reminds them that they belong to a special group of people, the people of God.

Beloved: Come to him, a living stone, rejected by human beings but chosen and precious in the sight of God, and, like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it says in Scripture: Behold, I am laying a stone in Zion, a cornerstone, chosen and precious, and whoever believes in it shall not be put to shame. Therefore, its value is for you who have faith, but for those without faith: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone, and A stone that will make people stumble, and a rock that will make them fall. They stumble by disobeying the word, as is their destiny. You are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises" of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.

We are past the midpoint of Easter Time, and the readings start to turn from the immediate aftermath of the resurrection and toward the ongoing work the church will face after Jesus's

LITURGY & LIFE

The month of May is the "month which the piety of the faithful has especially dedicated to Our Blessed Lady," and it is



the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world [pay] to the Queen of Heaven. During this month Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home,

offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and veneration. In this month, too, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (St. Paul VI: Encyclical on the *Month of May*, no. 1).

This Christian custom of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin arose at the end of the 13th century. In this way, the Church was able to Christianize the secular feasts which were wont to take place at that time. In the 16th century, books appeared and fostered this devotion.

The practice became especially popular among the members of the Jesuit Order — by 1700 it took hold among their students at the Roman College and a bit later it was publicly practiced in the Gesu Church in Rome. From there it spread to the whole Church.

The practice was granted a partial indulgence by Pius VII in 1815 and a plenary indulgence by Pius IX in 1859. the complete revision indulgences in 1966 and the decreased emphasis on specific indulgences, it no longer carries an indulgence; however it certainly falls within the category of the First General Grant of Indulgences. (A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who, in the performance of their duties and in bearing the trials of life, raise their mind with humble confidence to God, adding — even if only mentally some pious invocation.





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THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The Holy Spirit, as Pope Leo XIII reminded us, is the soul of the Church: All the activity and service of the members of the Church, beginning with the supreme participation of the Blessed Mother in the work of the Church, is vivified by the Holy Spirit as the body, in all its activities, is vivified by its soul. The Holy Spirit is the Paraclete, Advocate, and Comforter which Christ Himself sent to be our consolation in the sorrowful mysteries of life, our source of moderation in the joyful mysteries of life, our added principle of exaltation in the glorious mysteries of life.

In our observance of the Marian month we should take into account the season of the Liturgical Year which largely corresponds with the fifty days of Easter. Our pious exercises could emphasize Our Lady's participation in the Paschal mystery and in Pentecost with which the Church begins. The pious exercises connected with the month of May can easily highlight the earthly role played by the glorified Queen of Heaven, here and now, in the celebration of the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist.





Whom in my parish or in the wider community do I feel called to serve?

How can I serve them and bring them on our journey to the Lord?

MYSTAGOGY

The context for the Gospel reading is Jesus' discourse with his followers at the Last Supper. Jesus refers to himself as "the way and the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6). We are followers of the Way (Jesus) that leads us to the Father. Jesus reveals his intimate relationship with the Father: he is in the Father, as the Father is in him. Jesus' words are the Father's words, and Jesus' works are the Father's works. United with him, Jesus promises his followers that they too will do great works. From these readings emerge a deeper understanding of Jesus and of our identity. Jesus is the human face of God, as Pope Benedict XVI described him in his encyclicals Saved in Hope and Charity in Truth. As God's chosen race, we follow Jesus, the Way, to our eternal home.

MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the beautiful vocation of motherhood and the gift of life. It calls us to cherish the gift of life that we receive from our mothers and to pray for all women to whom God has entrusted life in a very special way. As we pray thanksgiving for the gift of all mothers, we also specifically remember mothers experiencing difficult pregnancies and pray they may find support and encouragement in choosing life for their children.

While Mother's Day is not a liturgical or Catholic observance, many parishes still use this holiday to honor and pray for mothers. The month of May has traditionally been dedicated to Mary, Mother of Jesus. Mother's Day provides an opportunity to pray for mothers while honoring and seeking the intercession of Our Blessed Mother. It is a fitting day to ask God's special blessing on all mothers.

The symbolism of roses varies depending on the color. Pink roses represent elegance, sweetness and appreciation, making them ideal for showing your mom adoration. Yellow roses, on the other hand, represent joy and friendship - perfect for anyone who feels that their mom is their best friend!

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



SAINTS WE CELEBRATE THIS WEEK

St. Damien de Veuster was a Hawaiian missionary and worked closely with the lepers on the island of Moloka' i. Outraged by the deplorable conditions of the island, he sought to restore a sense of dignity to its people. Even though leprosy was highly contagious, he chose to remain in close contact with the people. Damien eventually contracted the disease and died from it. Optional Memorial May 10.

St. John of Avila was a sixteenth-century Spanish priest who was an advocate for Church reform against accusations of heresy. He was inscribed on the General Roman Calendar in 2021 by Pope Francis. Optional Memorial May 10.

Sts. Nereus and Achilleus were soldiers who converted to Christianity and were subsequently martyred. **St. Pancras** was only fourteen when he was martyred in the Diocletian persecutions. He refused to sacrifice to the Roman gods and was subsequently decapitated Optional Memorial, May 12.

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
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
