PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



Yes, we celebrate the Sixth Sunday of the Easter season today. At the same time, throughout the nation, we honor and celebrate our mothers.

Happy Mother's Day to all the moms out there!

For most of us, just the word itself (mother, mom, mommy, ma - however you call her) evokes warm feelings. Whether or not your mother is still physically present to you or, like myself, your mother is spiritually present to you because she has gone to her eternal rest, mom is a pivotal and important figure in our lives.

So, we designate an entire day to honor her. May your celebration of Mother's Day be a lovely reminder of how important it is to nurture, comfort, support and encourage one another!

It's no accident that on this Mother's Day weekend we also celebrate our parish First Communions. The Eucharist nourishes us and offers us comfort, support and encouragement sacramentally.

Congratulations to all our parish candidates who approach this sacrament for the first time! I'm sure their mothers (and fathers and siblings) are very proud of them.

COLLECT YOUR BREAD TAGS, HELP PEOPLE IN NEED & THE ENVIRONMENT!

The square, hard plastic tags at the end of bread bags, bagel bags, potato bags, bags of citrus, etc. are made from a very clean natural resource - 100% petroleum. Unfortunately due to processing equipment, they are not recyclable in your curbside cart at home, and throwing them in the landfill is just contributing more to harmful greenhouse gases that cause climate change.

And now we have an alternative - collect them at home and return them to us! We will pass them onto **Danielle Cares for Chairs**, an organization that collects these bread tags and sells them to recyclers in bulk. The money received is then used to buy wheelchairs for people in need all over the world! Just this past year, Danielle Cares for Chairs collected 1.2 million bread tags - that's over 2000 lbs of bread tags that were saved from the landfill. At the start of 2022, Danielle Cares for Chairs had donated 11 wheelchairs to people in need. Considering it takes at least 260,000 bread tags to buy one wheel chair, that is very impressive!

TODAY'S READINGS

Acts 8:5–8, 14–17

Last week we heard how the Christian assembly in Jerusalem chose seven of their number to minister to the Greek-speaking Christians who lived there. Philip was one of the seven. Today we find him in Samaria, about 60 miles north of Jerusalem, fearlessly proclaiming the good news of Jesus and experiencing astounding results.


Easter rejoicing. The Holy Spirit's ongoing presence, promised in the gospel and demonstrated in the first reading, is reason for a renewed outpouring of gratitude and thanksgiving.

1 Peter 3:15-18

The first letter of Peter was written to Christians whose pagan neighbors continually questioned and ridiculed them about their faith. Since most of the Christians were low-born or slaves, their neighbors couldn't understand why they were so joyful and hopeful. Today's passage offers pastoral advice and encouragement.

John 14:15-21

This gospel echoes the themes of last week as Jesus is preparing his disciples to live without him for a time, or at least without the bodily presence they have come to know and which will depart earth at the ascension. This week adds a foreshadowing of the upcoming Pentecost Solemnity.



A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

FIRST READING

Acts 8:5-8, 14-17

Philip went down to the city of Samaria and proclaimed the Christ to them. With one accord, the crowds paid attention to what was said by Philip when they heard it and saw the signs he was doing. For unclean spirits, crying out in a loud voice, came out of many possessed people, and many paralyzed or crippled people were cured. There was great joy in that city. Now when the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent them Peter and John, who went down and prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Spirit, for it had not yet fallen upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit.

LITURGY & LIFE

Mother's Day isa wonderful opportunity to highlight the beautiful vocation of motherhood and the gift of life. It calls us to cherish the gift of life that we receive from our mothers and to pray for all women to whom God has entrusted life in a very special way. As we pray in thanksgiving for the gift of all mothers, we also specifically remember experiencing mothers difficult pregnancies and pray they may find support and encouragement in choosing life for their children.

While Mother's Day is not a liturgical or Catholic observance, many parishes still use this holiday to honor and pray for mothers. The month of May has traditionally been dedicated to Mary, Mother of Jesus. Mother's Day provides an opportunity to pray for mothers while honoring and seeking the intercession of Our Blessed Mother. It is a fitting day to ask God's special blessing on all mothers.

The symbolism of roses varies depending on the color. Pink roses represent elegance, sweetness and appreciation, making them ideal for showing your mom adoration. Yellow roses, on the other hand, represent joy and friendship - perfect for anyone who feels that their mom is their best friend!





The International Day of Families is observed on 15 May every year. The Day was proclaimed by the UN General Assembly in 1993 and reflects the importance the international community attaches to families





How can I respond with grace and respect to someone who maligns me or strongly disagrees with me?


Can I imagine my response defusing the disagreement?

MYSTAGOGY

In the name of Jesus, Philip drove out demons and cured those who were disabled. In that time, possession by the devil and physical infirmity were considered to be manifestations of sin. (Recall that Jesus' disciples asked him whether it was the blind man's sin or his parents' sin that caused his blindness, assuming it must be the sin of one of them.) When Philip healed people in Christ's name, it was thus a physical sign of God's forgiveness. The healing of so many was a sign of a new age, an age when forgiveness and healing flowed like water. No wonder "there was great joy in that city" (Acts 8:8)!

In his first letter, Peter speaks particularly to those who suffering. Christians were persecuted in that era, so he had to know that his letter would find plenty of people who were suffering. He asks those who are questioned about their faith to treat the questioners gently and reverently. After all, they are children of God as well. "Suffer for doing good," he counseled, as Jesus had (1 Peter 3:17). Despite our suffering, God calls us to love those who malign us as God loves them. And who knows? If we respond to our opponents with grace and without vitriol, we may disarm them and find a glimmer of goodness within them.

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments," Jesus told disciples (John 14:15). Taken one way, it may seem quite demanding, but it was really the equivalent of saying, "If you love me, you will want to keep my command-ments." Think about someone you love dearlyyour spouse, your significant other, your parent, your child. Do you not want to do what they ask? You want to please them, you want to bring them joy. Assuming that they are sincere and not demanding or unreasonable, you want to do what they ask. Submission to someone else's will is a consequence of love. Love of God brings us a desire to do God's will, to do what God asks of us.





With the revision of our liturgical calendar during Vatican II, it was left to each bishop to decide if their archdiocese or diocese would celebrate Ascension on Thursday or move the solemnity to the following Sunday, thus replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter. Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, Omaha, and Philadelphia retained the usual observance on the fortieth day after Easter. All other archdioceses and dioceses decided to move the observance to the following Sunday.

SAINTS WE CELEBRATE THIS WEEK

St. Isidore (the Farmer) reminds us that no matter how ordinary our lives seem we can lead lives of holiness. He was known for his love of the poor, and there are accounts of Isidore's supplying them miraculously with food. He had a great concern for the proper treatment of animals. Optional Memorial May 15.

St. Pope John I inherited the Arian heresy, which denied the divinity of Christ. Italy had been ruled for 30 years by an emperor who espoused the heresy, though he treated the empire's Catholics with toleration. His policy changed at about the time the young John was elected pope. Optional Memorial May 18.

St. Bernardine of Siena Most of the saints suffer great personal opposition, even persecution. Bernardine, by contrast, seems more like a human dynamo who simply took on the needs of the world. Bernardine strongly emphasized scholarship and further study of theology and canon law. When he started there were 300 friars in the community; when he died there were 4,000. He returned to preaching the last two years of his life, dying while traveling. Optional Memorial, May 20



Though this novena can be prayed any time of year, it is traditionally prayed from the Friday after Ascension Thursday (when the Ascension is not transferred to the following Sunday) until the Saturday before Pentecost. The next traditional time for the novena to begin is May 19 and is prayed daily until May 27.

The Pentecost novena is really THE original novena. The disciples waited in unity and prayer for the Holy Spirit for nine days after Jesus' ascension to heaven. Jesus asked them to pray constantly in the upper room until the descent of the Holy Spirit.

Let us pray: Grant,

O merciful Father, that your Divine Spirit may enlighten, inflame and purify us, that he may penetrate us with his heavenly dew and make us fruitful in good works, through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who with you, in the unity of the same Spirit, lives and reigns, God, forever and ever. Amen.
