

A time of sacred silence gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

TODAY'S READINGS

Acts 2:1-11

Pentecost was a Jewish feast that celebrated the beginning of the harvest. It took place 50 days after the feast of Passover. Jewish pilgrims came to Jerusalem from all over the ancient world for the celebration. Today we hear how Pentecost became a Christian feast.

Psalm 104:1, 24, 29–30, 31, 34 Invoking many images of the creation story in Genesis, Psalm 104 is a hymn of praise to God the Creator, whose "Spirit" sets all of creation in motion, whose "breath" animates all life.

1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13

Paul's first letter to the Corinthians responds to a letter they wrote to him. They had asked him how to deal with the diversity of gifts in the community, and the rivalries and jealousies that inevitably arose. In today's passage, he uses a comparison that we will recognize immediately.

John 20:19-23

Today, on the Solemnity of Pentecost, we focus on the sharing of the Holy Spirit. With this new indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the disciples are sharers in the life of Christ who has conquered death and darkness, and they are to bear this life to the world through their preaching, healing, and forgiving.

FIRST READING Acts 2:1-11

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem. At this sound, they gathered in a large crowd, but they were confused because each one heard them speaking in his own language. They were astounded, and in amazement they asked, "Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his native language? We are Parthians, Medes, and Elamites, inhabitants of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the districts of Libya near Cyrene, as well as travelers from Rome, both Jews and converts to Judaism, Cretans and Arabs, yet we hear them speaking in our own tongues of the mighty acts of God."

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13

Brothers and sisters: No one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit. There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit. As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

The Gospel of the Lord. R. Praise to you, Lord, Jesus Christ.

the Holy Spirit, we are treated to two separate origin stories. Both Luke (as the author of Acts) and John give us accounts of the moment in which the Holy Spirit came down upon the disciples. Funny thing is, the stories are completely nearly different. According to Luke, the Spirit came on Pentecost itself, after Jesus had already ascended to be with the Father in heaven. But John tells us that Jesus personally gave the apostles the Holy Spirit when he first appeared to them after his resurrection, obviously before his ascension. Luke reports that the Holy Spirit came on a fierce wind, but John says it was on Jesus' gentle breath. In Acts, the disciples begin to proclaim God's mighty acts loud enough to be heard by a crowd of people. In John, the disciples are silent, for they are in hiding. Perhaps we should think of the coming of the Holy Spirit as a process, or a series of episodes, rather than a single event. As the wind can buffet us as a strong gale or refresh us as a gentle breeze, the Holy Spirit, who first came to most of us when we were infants, comes to us again and again in different ways, with different gifts, and different workings, throughout our entire lives.

Come, Creator, Spirit, come from Your bright heavenly throne, come take possession of our souls and make them all Your own. You who are called the Paraclete, best gift of God above, the living spring, the vital fire, sweet christ'ning and true love. . . . THE MEANING OF "VIGIL MASS"

A "Vigil" Mass has its own special texts-Christmas and Easter are the most obvious examples, but there are such as Ascension others. Pentecost. The Vigil Mass fulfills the obligation to participate in Sunday Mass, as does an *Anticipated Mass*. An Anticipated Mass, usually at 5 p.m. on Saturdays, uses the same texts as Sunday whereas a Vigil Mass has its own assigned prayers. The terms are not precisely interchangeable. So a 5 p.m. Mass on weekends is typically called an Anticipated Mass using the same prayer texts as Sunday.

MYSTAGOGY

Just over a month ago, we heard the account of two disciples returning to their town of Emmaus, not knowing what to make of the reports they'd heard that Jesus' body was no longer in the tomb. They did not recognize the stranger whom they welcomed on the road. It was only after he was revealed in the breaking of the bread that they admitted, "Were not our hearts burning within us?" (Luke 24:32). It is no coincidence that not long after this event, the Holy Spirit appeared to the disciples in the upper room as tongues of fire. The mission we are called to accomplish—to witness to the love and mercy of God—is meant to burn within us, to light a fire under us, driving us to put that message into action each and every day.

The way in which we each witness to the workings of the Spirit within us differs, for, as Paul writes, "there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone" (1 Corinthians 12:6). Though we are blessed with different gifts and to different forms service, all are in the service of the same God. Like the Christian community of Paul's time, our communities may see divisiveness and disagreement. Let us realize that what we have in common exceeds our differences, for we each have within us the Holy Spirit, who blesses us with the gifts that we each express in our own way.

According to this passage from John's Gospel, Jesus gave two gifts to his disciples when he first appeared to them after he was raised from the dead. He gave them the Holy Spirit and he gave them peace. They must have been very unsettled as they locked themselves in the upper room: frightened that they themselves might be persecuted as Jesus was, devastated about his death on the cross, unsure about the testimony had heard from Magdalene, feeling guilty that they



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
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
