

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT DIVINE MERCY

COLLECT YOUR BREAD TAGS, HELP PEOPLE IN NEED & THE ENVIRONMENT!

The square, hard plastic tags at the end of bread bags, bagel bags, potato bags, bags of citrus, etc. are made from a very clean natural resource - 100% petroleum.

Unfortunately due to processing equipment, they are not recyclable in your curbside cart at home, and throwing them in the landfill is just contributing more to harmful greenhouse gases that cause climate change.

And now we have an alternative - collect them at home and return them to us! We will pass them onto Danielle Cares for Chairs, an organization that collects these bread tags and sells them to recyclers in bulk. The money received is then used to buy wheelchairs for people in need all over the world! Just this past year, Danielle Cares for Chairs collected 1.2 million bread tags - that's over 2000 lbs of bread tags that were saved from the landfill. At the start of 2022, Danielle Cares for Chairs had donated 11 wheelchairs to people in need. Considering it takes at least 260,000 bread tags to buy one wheel chair, that is very impressive!

Introduction to the Liturgy

The Holy Spirit draws us to this holy place each week to join together as a faith community to celebrate the Eucharist. Eucharistia literally means "thanksgiving" and we are forever thankful to God for sending the Son, who gives us his Body and Blood to nourish us, to redeem us, and to give us eternal life. May the Lord's acceptance of his cross give us the courage to carry our own crosses, to empathize with others carrying their own crosses, and inspire us to help those whose crosses are too heavy to carry themselves.

Jesus asks a lot of his disciples, but he offers an incredible reward. A reward beyond all expectations has always been given to those who accept the challenge of welcoming God, or God's emissary, into their lives. In the first reading, a woman takes the initiative to welcome the prophet Elisha into her home, going so far as to arrange a room for him. rewarded with extraordinary promise. (A year after this scene, that promise is fulfilled.) Paul impresses upon the Romans that if we are baptized in Christ, we are also baptized into his death. But this also means that "just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life" (Romans 6:4). Jesus tells his disciples that they must take up their crosses, but those who do so for his sake will be rewarded. As baptized Christians, we are now those disciples that Jesus speaks to. We are called to take up our crosses, to welcome those who come in God's nameeven if with merely a cup of water—and to sacrifice our own

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

TODAY'S **R**EADINGS **2** Kings 4:8-11, 14-16

Elisha, who lived about 800 years before Christ, succeeded the great prophet Elijah, and was noted for his miraculous deeds. Today we hear of one such deed performed in gratitude for the hospitality given to him and his servant Gehazi.

A time of sacred silence, after the readings, gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

Psalm 89:2-3, 16-17, 18-19

This is a lovely psalm to proclaim; we get to sing about singing and to pledge through our very song the church's intention to always offer praise for God's goodness.

Romans 6:3-4, 8-11

In a previous section of his letter to the Romans, Paul taught that we sinners are reconciled to God through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Now Paul notes that we experience this dying and rising when, in the immersion form of baptism, we are symbolically "buried" in the water and emerge to new life.

Matthew 10:37-42

This gospel calls us to hospitality; it is about receiving others and thereby receiving Christ. But this hospitality goes beyond what we usually mean by the word.



FIRST READING

2 Kings 4:8-11, 14-16

One day Elisha came to Shunem, where there was a woman of influence, who urged him to dine with her. Afterward, whenever he passed by, he used to stop there to dine. So she said to her husband, "I know that Elisha is a holy man of God. Since he visits us often, let us arrange a little room on the roof and furnish it for him with a bed, table, chair, and lamp, so that when he comes to us he can stay there." Sometime later Elisha arrived and stayed in the room overnight. Later Elisha asked, "Can something be done for her?" His servant Gehazi answered, "Yes! She has no son, and her husband is getting on in years." Elisha said, "Call her." When the woman had been called and stood at the door, Elisha promised, "This time next year you will be fondling a baby son."

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SECOND READING

Romans 6:3-4, 8-11

Brothers and sisters: Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him. As to his death, he died to sin once and for all; as

to his life, he lives for God. Consequently, you too must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus.

Matthew 10:37-42

Jesus said to his apostles: "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me. Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it.

"Whoever receives you receives me, and whoever receives me receives the one who sent me. Whoever receives a prophet because he is a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever receives a righteous man because he is a righteous man will receive a righteous man's reward. And whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple—amen, I say to you, he will surely not lose his reward."

What is eternal life in the kingdom of heaven if not a sign of God's hospitality to us? Because Jesus redeemed us on the cross, we are now welcomed into God's home to live forever. Like the woman of Shunem, who made a special place in her home for the prophet Elisha, God has made a special place in heaven for us. Let us follow Elisha's example and ask ourselves what we can do to express our gratitude for God's hospitality. When we celebrate the Eucharist, whether we are conscious of it or not, we are offering thanks to God for all the God-given blessings we have received, especially the gift of Jesus, through whom we have received redemption. Because the Greek word eucharistia "thanksgiving," in offering the Eucharist we are giving thanks. Indeed, before Jesus offered the bread as his body to the disciples, he gave thanks to God. He gave thanks once again before he offered the cup of wine as his blood. For all that God has done for us, we give thanks for the invitation to share Christ's Body and Blood. To return to Elisha's question, "Can something be done for her?" (2 Kings 4:14), let us look to Jesus in today's Gospel. He calls us to take up our crosses. In taking up our crosses and following Jesus' example, we are doing something for God. Specifically, we are surrendering ourselves to God's will, as Jesus did when he faced persecution. Additionally, Jesus promises a reward even to those who give "only a cup of cold water" (Matthew 10:42) to a disciple. This is akin to us helping someone else carry their cross, even if only for a short time, even if only expending a small effort. We are surrendering our own will to God's.



Saints We Celebrate This Week

St. Thomas (1st Century—Dec. 21, 72), Feast Day, July 3. Poor Thomas! He made one remark and has been branded as "Doubting Thomas" ever since. But if he doubted, he also believed. He made what is certainly the most explicit statement of faith in the New Testament: "My Lord and My God!" and, in so expressing his faith, gave Christians a prayer that will be said till the end of time. He also occasioned a compliment from Jesus to all later Christians: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29). Thomas should be equally well-known for his courage. Perhaps what he said was impetuous since he ran, like the rest, at the showdown but he can scarcely have been insincere when he expressed his willingness to die with Jesus. The occasion was when Jesus proposed to go to Bethany after Lazarus had died. Since Bethany was near Jerusalem, this meant walking into the very midst of his enemies and to almost certain death. Realizing this, Thomas said to the other apostles, "Let us also go to die with him" (John 11:16b). He is the Patron Saint of: Architects/Builders/Construction Surveyors, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Theologians.

St. Anthony Zaccaria, Feast Day, July 5. At the same time that Martin Luther was attacking abuses in the Church, reformation within the Church was already being attempted. Among the early movers of the Counter-Reformation was Anthony Zaccaria. His mother became a widow at 18, and devoted herself to the spiritual education of her son. He received a medical doctorate at 22, and while working among the poor of his native Cremona in Italy, was attracted to the religious apostolate. He renounced his rights to any future inheritance, worked as a catechist, and was ordained a priest at the age of 26. Called to Milan in a few years, he laid the foundations of three religious congregations, one for one for women, and association of married couples. Their aim was the reform of the decadent society of their day, beginning with the clergy, religious, and lay people. While on a mission of peace, Anthony became seriously ill and was brought home for a visit to his mother. He died at Cremona at the age of 36.

He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.



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
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INTRODUCTION TO THE **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER**

St. Maria Goretti, Feast Day, July 6. One of the largest crowds ever assembled for a canonization—250,000—symbolized reaction of millions touched by the simple story of Maria Goretti. She was the daughter of a poor Italian tenant farmer, had no chance to go to school, never learned to read or write. When Maria made her First Communion not long before her death, she was one of the larger and somewhat backward members of the class. On a hot afternoon in July, Maria was sitting at the top of the stairs of her house, mending a shirt. She was not quite 12 years old, but physically mature. A cart stopped outside, and a neighbor, 18-year-old Alessandro, ran up the stairs. He seized her and pulled her into a bedroom. She struggled and tried to call for help. "No, God does not wish it," she cried out. "It is a sin. You would go to hell for it." Alessandro began striking at her blindly with a long dagger. Maria was taken to a hospital. Her last hours were marked by the usual simple compassion of the good concern about where her mother would sleep, forgiveness of her murderer (she had been in fear of him, but did not say anything lest she cause trouble to his family), and her devout welcoming of Viaticum, her last Holy Communion. She died about 24 hours after the attack. Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. For a long time he was unrepentant and surly. One night he had a dream or vision of Maria gathering flowers and offering them to him. His life changed. When he was released after 27 years, his first act was to beg the forgiveness of Maria's mother. Devotion to the young martyr grew, miracles were worked, and in less than half a century she was canonized. At her beatification in 1947, her 82-year-old mother, two sisters, and her brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter's. Three years later, at Maria's canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people and cried tears of joy.



Among all the wonderful effects of holy communion, however, one stands out above them all. Holy communion sparks a renewal of charity in our hearts. Like nothing else, the sacrament animates, energizes, and vitalizes The Friends of God. In the words of Saint Basil, it produces "confidence and love toward Thee." Each time you and I receive holy communion, we should expect a new propulsion of love for God to break forth from the depths of our souls, and we should be on the lookout for it. A new surge of love is sure to come up from our hearts after holy communion. It might not happen immediately. It might be later in the day or when things quiet down. It might not be so noticeable as a great earthquake or a roaring fire, but perhaps be more like a gentle breeze (1 Kgs. 19:5-18). Yet, it will happen. New love will come. Guaranteed.

When we receive holy communion, the friends of God receive a renewal of love in our hearts. Since love unites people, the whole Church in heaven and on earth becomes more united. The union amongst us wrought by holy communion might not be so observable to our senses. The Church on earth appears rather divided in many ways. In the supernatural order of things, however, the situation is quite different than what meets the eye. Those who belong to Christ, those who belong to him not only in show but in reality by living in a state of sanctifying grace, are in fact being united more and more to Christ and to one another through every holy communion. Thanks to the mighty sacrament of the altar, the mystical body of Christ grows together. Together we grow in The Grace To Be Jesus.

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
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
