



Introduction to the Liturgy

Even as we come here to celebrate the Eucharist, the burdens of life may weigh heavy on our minds, our hearts, and our bodies. We may be tired from working six days a week. We may be anxious about the health of a family member. We may be mourning the loss of a loved one. We may be just plain weary, emotionally. physically or today's Gospel, Jesus encourages the crowds, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." He says the same words to us today. Let us turn to the Lord for comfort, for his yoke is easy and his burden light.

As the prophets had both challenged and comforted the people generations before, Jesus both challenges and comforts his audience. Last week we heard his challenge, telling his disciples that they must carry their crosses and follow him. But today we hear him comfort the crowds, assuring them that his burden is light and they will find rest in him. We experience the truth of this in our own lives. We all have crosses to carry. It may be the illness of a close relative and our ongoing care for that person. It may be job loss, failure in school, or the need to work two jobs to pay the bills. It may be addiction or mental illness that we feel powerless to overcome. But at the same time we know that God accompanies us in all our trials. We know that Jesus loves us so much that he sacrificed his life for us. We know that he is willing and able to carry our crosses for us now because he literally carried our cross then. Today, Jesus invites us to lighten our burdens by turning to him. What we hear Saint Paul tell the Romans today applies to us as well:





Today's **R**eadings Zechariah 9:9-10

In the last centuries before Christ, the Jewish people hoped for a triumphant Messiah king. The prophet Zechariah spoke instead of a Messiah who would come not in splendor and glory with horses and chariots, but rather in meekness and peace, riding a common work animal. All four evangelists will later apply this passage to the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem several days before his arrest.

A time of sacred silence, after the readings, gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.

Psalm 145:1–2, 8–9, 10–11, 13–14 This is an iconic psalm of praise, pouring out thanksgiving for all God has done and continues to do for us. Our response is one of gratitude and of speaking.

HOMILY

the Romans, a chapter which emphasizes the role of the Holy Spirit. Paul wants us to remember that the Spirit who will raise our bodies on the last day is the same Spirit who inspires us to holiness every day. Today Paul offers a sharp contrast between life in the flesh (meaning life prone to sin) and life in the Spirit.

Matthew 11:25-30

In the verses from Matthew's Gospel that come immediately before the passage we hear today, Jesus has reproached the cities that rejected him. But then out of this lamentation there erupts his hymn of praise and thanks to his Father for the "little ones," those who have no status but can recognize him.

As the prophets had both challenged and comforted the people generations before, Jesus both challenges and comforts his audience. Last week we heard his challenge, telling his disciples that they must carry their crosses and follow him. Saints We Celebrate This Week

St. Benedict, abbot and patriarch of Western monasticism. (480-547)

Feast Day, July 11

St. Benedict father of Western monasticism and patron saint of Europe, attracted people by his spiritual life. He wrote a practical rule of life. This guide for their life of prayer and work (ora et labora) and community and hospitality is still in use today. Treat each visitor like Christ. Our common rule of life is the Gospel. Benedictines have been a major, holy influence in the life of the Church. Present one of these influences in adult formation is the practice of lectio divina.

St. Henry, (973-1024)

Feast Day, July 13

As German king and Holy Roman Emperor, Henry was a practical man of affairs. He was energetic in consolidating his rule. He crushed rebellions and feuds. On all sides he had to deal with drawn-out disputes so as to protect his frontiers. This involved him in a number of battles, especially in the south in Italy; he also helped Pope Benedict VIII quell disturbances in Rome. Always his ultimate purpose was to establish a stable peace in Europe. According to eleventh-century custom, Henry took advantage of his position and appointed as bishops men loyal to him. In his case, however, he avoided the pitfalls of this practice and actually fostered the reform of ecclesiastical and monastic life. He was canonized in 1146.

St. Kateri Tekakwitha, (1657-1680)

Feast Day, July 14

St. Kateri Tekakwitha was the first Native American to be canonized. Hearing about Christ from Jesuit missionaries, she chose to be a Christian at seventeen. Since Christians also brought disease and destruction to some indigenous villages, her choice was opposed by her family. She gave birth to the Gospel by being faithful to prayer and caring for children and the sick. She promised to continue her care when she reached heaven. She died at age twenty-four. In you prayers, remember the diverse and varied cultures of Native Americans in today's intercessions. Those who wish to learn about the dynamics of Native American culture within the Catholic Church can explore the bishops' 2019 document, Two Rivers: A Report on Catholic Native American Culture and Ministry.

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven (bow) and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. (stand) For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.





St. Bonaventure, bishop (1221-1274)

Feast Day, July 15

St. Bonaventure played an important role in both the medieval Church and the history of the Franciscan Order. Bonaventure so united holiness and theological knowledge that he rose to the heights of mysticism while remaining a very active preacher and teacher, one beloved by all who met him. To know him was to love him; to read him is still for us today to meet a true Franciscan and a gentleman.

About the Readings

In our society, we tend to regard meekness as weakness. Those who are meek never assert themselves, never get their way, and seem to always end up in last place. But clearly this is not what Zechariah means when he writes that our king would be meek, yet would rule to the ends of the earth. Nor is it what Jesus means when he says, "I am meek and humble of heart" (Matthew 11:29). Webster's defines meek as enduring difficulties with patience and without resentment. This describes Jesus to a T and fulfills Zechariah's prophecy. Zechariah's words remind us of Jesus when he entered Jerusalem. There he would endure crucifixion and death—with patience and without resentment. May his example lead us to face our own trials with more patience and with less resentment.



After the Communion Song we spend some time in silent prayer and/or sing a psalm or song of praise.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Feast Day, July 16

Hermits lived on Mount Carmel near the Fountain of Elijah in northern Israel in the 12th century. They had a chapel dedicated to Our Lady. By the 13th century they became known as "Brothers of Our Lady of Mount Carmel." They soon celebrated a special Mass and Office in honor of Mary. In 1726, it became a celebration of the universal Church under the title of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. For centuries the Carmelites have seen themselves as specially related to Mary. Their great saints and theologians have promoted devotion to her and often championed the mystery of her Immaculate Conception. Saint Teresa of Avila called Carmel "the Order of the Virgin." Saint John of the Cross credited Mary with saving him from drowning as a child, leading him to Carmel, and helping him escape from prison. Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus believed that Mary cured her from illness. On her First Communion day, Thérèse dedicated her life to Mary. During the last days of her life she frequently spoke of Mary. There is a tradition—which may not be historical—that Mary appeared to Saint Simon Stock, a leader of the Carmelites, and gave him a scapular, telling him to promote devotion to it. The scapular is a modified version of Mary's own garment. It symbolizes her special protection and calls the wearers to consecrate themselves to her in a special way. The scapular reminds us of the gospel call to prayer and penance—a call that Mary models in a splendid way.

O most beautiful Flower of Mount Carmel, Fruitful Vine, Splendor of Heaven, Blessed Mother of the Son of God, Immaculate Virgin, assist me this my necessity. O Star of the Sea, help me and show me herein you are my Mother. O Holy Mary, Mother of God, Queen of Heaven and Earth, I humbly beseech you from the bottom of my heart, to succor me in this necessity (make request); there are none that can withstand your power. O, show me herein you are my Mother, O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee. (3 times)

Sweet Mother, I place this cause in your hands. (3 times)

The Month of July is dedicated to the to the Precious Blood.

The feast of the Precious Blood of our Lord was instituted in 1849 by Pius IX, but the devotion is as old as Christianity. The early Fathers say that the Church was born from the pierced side of Christ, and that the sacraments were brought forth through his Blood.



Collect for the Votive Mass of the Precious Blood

Cura Personalis: Over these summer months we allow ourselves and the members of our liturgical and music ministry teams to take time to rest and rejuvenate. I offer this reflection on the Ignatian-Jesuit characteristic of cura persona/is, which is Latin for "care for the whole person." When we are active in ministry, we tend to lose track of this. The body, mind, and soul are equally worthy of care and attention. Our Christian faith insists that we nourish ourselves fully, for glorifying God requires our healthy head, heart, and soul. Nourishment comes both through action and contemplation. Care for yourself with whichever option brings you most life. Restful prayer, meditation, spiritual exercises, and communal interaction with physical activity are all ways of recreating help to deepen our understanding and love of God and of our own work in ministry. Both allow us to connect to a greater community and to come alive in body, mind, and soul. Theologian Howard Thurman said it best: "Don't ask yourself what the world needs. Ask yourself what makes you come alive, and go do that, because what the world needs is people who have come alive" (Gil Bailie, Violence Unveiled). Cura persona/is invites us to reconnect with our deepest self and in the process reconnect in God and in the world.



Eucharistic Revival

NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

July 17 – 21, 2024 Indianapolis, Indiana

A National Eucharistic Congress is as the name says. Regardless of national or international, the purpose remains to show a powerful manifestation of the unity of the Church, where a large number of Catholics gather to worship Our Lord in the Eucharist through the communal celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. These gatherings reaffirm and re-emphasize the source and summit of our faith, putting Jesus where he belongs—at the center. The United States has not held a Eucharistic Congress at the national level since before WWII.

The first International Congress to be held in the United States was in Chicago as the 28th International Eucharistic Congress with Cardinal Mundelein as Archbishop of Chicago, June 20-24, 1926.

As a recent convert to Catholicism, my sponsors took me to the 41st International Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia, August 1-8, 1976. Attended by 1,500,000 people, including 44 Cardinals and 417 bishops. The theme was, *The Eucharist and the Hungers of the Human Family* (physical and spiritual hungers). Mother Teresa and Dorothy Day were panelists at a conference on Women and the Eucharist. Future Pope John Paul II gave the homily for Freedom and Justice.US President Ford spoke of freedom and the Church's work for peace. St. Paul VI gave the closing homily via satellite. The hymn *Gift of Finest Wheat*, was written for and sung during the closing Mass. It was truly an exciting affirmation of the strength, grace, and beauty of the Eucharist.

The 53rd International Eucharistic Congress is set to take place in Quito, Ecuador, September 8-15, 2024, in celebration of Ecuador's 150th Anniversary to the Heart of Iesus.
