#### TODAY'S **R**EADINGS Isaiah 55:10-11

Because the Israelites were exiled in the pagan land of Babylon, the assuring words that God had previously spoken to them now seemed empty. In today's passage, the prophet Isaiah will use an image from nature to describe how God's word always bears fruit and comes true no matter how unlikely it may seem.

A time of sacred silence, after the readings, gives us the opportunity to reflect on the words proclaimed in our presence. Our sacred silence is integral to full, conscious, active participation in the liturgy.



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#### Psalm 65:10, 11, 12–13, 14

This is a gorgeous, underused psalm. It praises God for the beauty of the earth and the wisdom with which God designed its seasons to feed and nourish us.

#### Romans 8:18-23

As we continue reading from the eighth chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans, he tells us that sin affected not only human beings but also all creation, and the coming of Christ had a healing effect on both. It is evident that Paul is not pessimistic about this world.

#### Matthew 13:1-23 or 13:1-9

The central meaning of the parable is that the kingdom of God takes root in imperfect communities of "wheat and weeds," and in both an imperfect church and world.

The first reading and psalm echo the farming imagery of the gospel. God's word is likened to the rain that comes forth from heaven to nourish the earth and to feed us. he second reading pairs our seed and fruit imagery with another of nature's great wonders-that of childbirth. Labor pains are another reflection of God's cyclical work, for great pain and groaning bring new life and abundant joy. The pain of labor, like the suffering of Christ, is lifegiving. It is not pain without purpose.

The sower in today's Gospel has a very wasteful method of scattering seed, with three -quarters of the seed landing where it will fail at one stage or another. Yet Jesus explains to his disciples that this is the way the word of God is sown here on earth. Why would the sower toss seed among thoms or rocks or traffic? Perhaps because there is always hope, even where it seems futile. After all, God sent the Spirit to remain with us always and the Spirit blows where it will. It may also help to think of the different locations not as different people, but as each and every one of us at different times and in different contexts. Sometimes when God's word comes to us, it goes in one ear and out the other. Sometimes we don't understand it or can't relate it to our lives. Sometimes we lack the courage



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#### SECOND READING

Brothers and sisters: I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not

only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

# **GOSPEL PROCLAMATION** The Lord be with you.

Matthew 13:1-23 or 13:1-9
R. And with your spirit.

A proclamation **№** from the holy Gospel according to Matthew **R**. **Glory to you, O Lord**.

In the shorter form of the Gospel, the passage in {brackets} is omitted.

On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat down, and the whole crowd stood along the shore. And he spoke to them at length in parables, saying: "A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky ground, where it had little soil. It sprang up at once because the soil was not deep, and when the sun rose it was scorched, and it withered for lack of roots. Some seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it. But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

[ The disciples approached him and said, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" He said to them in reply, "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted. To anyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. This is why I speak to them in parables, because they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or

to take it to heart and change our thinking or our behavior. It can be a challenge to be fertile ground for God's word. Bringing forth good fruit, to borrow Paul's words from the second reading, can be compared to a pregnant woman groaning in labor. But let us accept that challenge, not allowing God's word to go to waste, but accepting it and nurturing it and letting it bear fruit through us so it may achieve the end for which it was sown.

#### Saints We Celebrate This Week

#### St. Camillus de Lellis (1550-1614)

Feast Day, July 18

Humanly speaking, Camillus was not a likely candidate for sainthood. His mother died when he was a child, his father neglected him, and he grew up with an excessive love for gambling. At 17, he was afflicted with a disease of his leg that remained with him for life. In Rome he entered the San Giacomo Hospital for Incurables as both patient and servant, dismissed was quarrelsomeness after nine months. He served in the Venetian army for three years. With the advice of his friend Saint Philip Neri, he studied for the priesthood and was ordained at the age of 34. Camillus founded a congregation of his own. As superior, he devoted much of his own time to the care of the sick. Charity was his first concern, but the physical aspects of the hospital also received his diligent attention. Camillus insisted on cleanliness and the technical competence of those who served the sick. He is the patron of hospitals, healthcare workers, and the sick.

St. Apollinaris (c. 79) Feast Day, July 20 According to tradition, Saint Peter sent Apollinaris to Ravenna, Italy, as its first bishop. After preaching in the area surrounding Ravenna, he entered the city again. After being cruelly tortured, he was put on a ship heading to Greece. Pagans there caused him to be expelled to Italy, where he went to Ravenna for a fourth time. He died from wounds received during a savage beating at Classis, a suburb of Ravenna. A beautiful basilica honoring him was built there in the sixth century.

#### St. Lawrence of Brindisi (1559-1619)

Feast Day, July 21

At first glance, perhaps the most remarkable quality of Lawrence of Brindisi is his outstanding gift of languages. In addition to a thorough knowledge of his native Italian, he had complete reading and speaking ability in Latin, Hebrew, Greek, German, Bohemian, Spanish, and French. Lawrence was born on July 22, 1559, and died exactly 60 years later on his birthday in 1619. His parents William and Elizabeth Russo gave him the name of Julius Caesar, Caesare in Italian. After the early death of his parents, he was educated by his uncle at the College of St. Mark in Venice. When he was just 16, he entered the Capuchin Franciscan Order in Venice and received the name of Lawrence. He completed his studies of philosophy and theology at the University of Padua and was ordained a priest at 23. With his facility for languages Lawrence was able to study the Bible in its original texts. Lawrence's sensitivity to the needs of people—a character trait perhaps unexpected in such a talented scholar—began to surface. He was elected major superior of the Capuchin Franciscan province of Tuscany at the age of 31. Lawrence was appointed papal emissary and peacemaker, a job which took him to a number of foreign countries. An effort to achieve peace in his native kingdom of Naples took him on a journey to Lisbon to visit the king of Spain. Serious illness in Lisbon took his life in 1619. In 1956, the Capuchins completed a 15-volume edition of Lawrence's writings.

#### St. Mary Magdalene (d. c. 63)

Feast Day, July 22

Except for the mother of Jesus, few women are more honored in the Bible than Mary Magdalene. Yet she could well be the patron of the slandered, since there has been a persistent legend in the Church that she is the unnamed sinful woman who anointed the feet of Jesus in Luke 7:36-50. Most Scripture scholars today point out that there is no scriptural basis for confusing the two women. Mary Magdalene, that is, "of Magdala," was the one from whom Christ cast out "seven demons" (Luke 8:2)—an indication at the worst, of extreme demonic possession or possibly, severe illness. Writing in the New Catholic Commentary, Father Wilfrid J. Harrington, O.P., says that "seven demons" "does not mean that Mary had lived

understand. Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled in them, which says: You shall indeed hear but not understand, you shall indeed look but never see. Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I heal them.

"But blessed are your eyes, because they see, and your ears, because they hear. Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

"Hear then the parable of the sower. The seed sown on the path is the one who hears the word of the kingdom without understanding it, and the evil one comes and steals away what was sown in his heart. The seed sown on rocky ground is the one who hears the word and receives it at once with joy. But he has no root and lasts only for a time. When some tribulation or persecution comes because of the word, he immediately falls away. The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word, but then worldly anxiety and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit. But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold." ]

an immoral life—a conclusion reached only by means of a mistaken identification with the anonymous woman of Luke 7:36." In the Jerome Biblical Commentary, Father Edward Mally, S.J., agrees that she "is not... the same as the sinner of Luke 7:37, despite the later Western romantic tradition about her." Mary Magdalene was one of the many "who were assisting them [Jesus and the Twelve] out of their means." She was one of those who stood by the cross of Jesus with his mother. And, of all the "official" witnesses who might have been chosen for the first awareness of the Resurrection, she was the one to whom that privilege was given. She is known as the "Apostle to the Apostles."

#### TODAY'S REFLECTION

Inside a mountain on the remote island of Svalbard, hundreds of miles north of the Arctic Circle, sits the Svalbard Global Seed Vault. Its mission is to preserve seeds of every living species of plant, fruit, and vegetable. It now contains over one million different seeds, a priceless repository whose value will be realized when species become extinct. Though God's word is sown so that it may bear fruit, not kept dormant in a vault, it is still important that God's word be preserved so that it may flower again and again for generations. The Bible, for instance, is a storehouse of God's word that continues to educate and inspire. When we put God's word into action, we often build long-term institutions or practices that make our faith and the faith of subsequent generations bloom. But the greatest repository of God's word is God's own Son, who indeed is the Word made flesh. Insofar as he is with us always, we carry this treasury of God's word within ourselves. The seeds God has sown are in us now.

Will the seeds within us bloom and bear fruit? That depends on whether we nurture them well or not. Sometimes we let them dry out and die. Maybe we just don't pay attention to God's word and miss our opportunity. Or we fail to understand it. Or we decide it doesn't relate to our own lives. Or we don't allow it to penetrate deep into our hearts. Or we reject it because it's too challenging. Like the seed in today's parable, there are many obstacles to God's seed bearing fruit. Let us pray in the hope that God's word in us can eventually bear abundant fruit.

It may be just a coincidence that this passage from Saint Paul's Letter to the Romans is read today, but his line that "all creation is groaning in labor pains. . . we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan" (8:22–23) is definitely appropriate. Bringing forth good fruit is painful. It involves sacrifice. It can be exhausting. May the courage we receive from the Holy Spirit impel us to accept the challenge of bringing God's word to fruition.





Recently, members of the National Eucharistic Congress team had the privilege of an audience with Pope Francis in Rome. The Holy Father expressed his support for the rebirth of the Congress legacy in the United States and the Revival movement as a whole.

"Dear friends, the National Eucharistic Congress marks a significant moment in the life of the Church in the United States..."

"It is my hope, then, that the Eucharistic Congress will inspire Catholics throughout the country to discover anew the sense of wonder and awe at the Lord's great gift of himself..." Pope Francis affirmed the critical need for Eucharistic Revival, and shared his hope for the future of the Church in the United States. He says <a href="the Congress">the Congress</a> will be an occasion for the faithful to "commit themselves with ever greater zeal to being missionary disciples of the Lord Jesus in the world."

This connection between the Eucharist and mission cannot be ignored. The Holy Father reminded us that "the love we celebrate in this sacrament cannot be kept to ourselves but demands to be shared with all. This is the sense of a missionary spirit." The pope went on to say, "Two groups of people come to mind whom we must always seek out: the elderly, who are the wisdom of a people, and the sick, who are the image of the suffering Jesus."

He especially stressed the importance of fostering vocations to the priesthood, as "There can be no Eucharist without the priesthood" (*Pope John Paul II's Letter to Priests for Holy Thursday 2004*).

The exquisite, Mexican-made, 4-foot monstrance for the Congress was blessed by the pope during our visit. Its construction is an homage to Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the National Eucharistic Revival.

The monstrance will house Jesus in the Eucharist as the four routes of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage converge and Our Lord is carried into Lucas Oil Stadium at the beginning of the Congress. It was designed at this impressive size so that Jesus can be seen by thousands of Catholics from across the stadium.

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
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
