THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



Here we are. Second Sunday of Advent. We're getting closer to Christmas and the great celebration of the Nativity of the Lord and the Incarnation of divine mystery among us.

In that vein, here is an insight from Pope Francis found in his encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti* (On Fraternity and Social Friendships). He writes: "In the depths of the human heart, love creates bonds and expands existence, for it draws people out of themselves and towards others (n. 88)."

A phenomenon prevalent in the modern world is the isolating tendencies of culture and especially of the internet. Strangely enough, in spite of lots of communication through social media, those types of digital relationships cannot substitute for real and up-close bonds.

So many people suffer from isolation. The Incarnation challenges us to be "real" for one another. To be drawn out of ourselves, extending ourselves for and to others. This is the way we grow. This is the joy of Advent. Let us walk together in the ways of the Lord!

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY


"Make straight his paths," Isaiah cried out, prophesying that the LORD would come to rescue and comfort the people of God. Centuries later, Mark quotes this call at the very beginning of his Gospel, presenting John the Baptist as the prophet who took this to heart, preparing the way for the Lord. Now, two millennia later, during this season when we prepare for the Lord's coming into our lives and into our hearts, how can we "make straight his paths"?



FIRST READING

This passage from the book of Isaiah begins with God calling upon the prophet to encourage the Jewish people who are exiled in Babylon. The prophet is to tell them that they will be returning home soon, and the road of the return will pass through the desert. We will also hear God call the people to proclaim from a mountaintop the goodness of God.

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is indeed, she expiated; has received from the hand of the Lord double for all her sins. A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the Lord! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken. Go up onto a high mountain, Zion, herald of glad tidings; cry out at the top of your voice, Jerusalem, herald of good news! Fear not to cry out and say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God! Here comes with power the Lord God, who



rules by his strong arm; here is his reward with him, his recompense before him. Like a shepherd he feeds his flock; in his arms he gathers the lambs, carrying them in his bosom, and leading the ewes with care.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Today the Psalm is a promise of the kingdom of God in our lives and in our world.

SECOND READING

The second letter of Peter was written nearly 100 years after Jesus' death and resurrection. At an earlier time, Christians had expected the Lord to return in glory quickly. But by this time, they had lost confidence that the Lord would return at all. The author doesn't want people to abandon their hope and gives a positive interpretation to this delay.

2 Peter:3:8-14

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years and a thousand years like one day. The Lord does not delay his as promise, some regard "delay," but he is patient with you, not wishing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a mighty roar the elements will dissolved by fire, and the earth and everything done on it will be found out. Since everything is to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be, conducting yourselves in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved in flames and the elements melted by fire. But according to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells. Therefore, beloved, since you await these things, be eager to be found without spot or blemish before him, at peace.

For the next two Sundays, the gospels encourage us to encounter Christ through the ministry of John the Baptist. The great prophet, clothed in camel's hair and munching on locusts, prepares the way of the Lord with a singular focus.

I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

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
Members of the Parish Prayer Team are available after the 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. Masses to pray with you in the church.

The month of December is dedicated to the Immaculate Conception (celebrated Dec. 8) and the Divine Infancy.

The first 24 days of December fall during the liturgical season known as Advent and are represented by the liturgical color purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

The remaining days of December mark the beginning of *Christmas Time*. The liturgical color changes to white or gold — a symbol of joy, purity and innocence.

The word **Advent** is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word *parousia*. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1).




THE 4TH SUNDAY OF ADVENT





NEW PASTOR SELECTION PROCESS AND QUESTIONNAIRE

Our pastor, Fr. Steve Lanza, will be retiring in June of 2024. The Archdiocesan Priest Placement Board is beginning the search process for a new pastor of Divine Mercy Parish beginning July 2024. Representatives of the Priest Placement Board met with our Parish Staff, as well as members of the Senior Leadership Team, the Parish Council, the Finance Council and the Chairs of all of our Boards (including Sacred Heart School) on December 4th to gather input on what Divine Mercy needs in a pastor for our future.

The Priest Placement Board seeks input from our parishioners as well through a questionnaire they have created. You can find copies of that questionnaire in the Gathering Space at Sacred Heart and the vestibule of St. Philip. Once you complete the questionnaire, you can place them in the receptacle box located in the same location. All questionnaires will be forwarded to the Priest Placement Board. QUESTIONNAIRES ARE DUE AT THE PARISH BY DECEMBER 28th.

Next steps? The Priest Placemen Board will review all the information gathered from and about Divine Mercy (as well as other parishes in need of a pastor) over the next 2-3 months, while simultaneously speaking with priests who are considering new assignments. Please keep the Priest Placement Board in your prayers during this process as they discern the best pastor for Divine Mercy.

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


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
