PASTOR'S "TO THE POINT"



This Fourth Sunday of Advent is gone in a flash! Due to the needs of the liturgical calendar, on this same day we enter the Christmas season, celebrating Christmas Eve, which means this year there is no fourth week of Advent. It's literally only hours long.

Still, that's time enough to consider another lesson from Pope Francis in this column, which we've been doing for all of Advent. In his encyclical, he writes: "Love also impels us toward universal communion. No one can mature or find fulfillment by withdrawing from others. By its very nature, love calls for growth in openness and the ability to accept others as part of a continuing adventure that makes every periphery converge in a greater sense of mutual belonging" (n. 95, Fratelli Tutti).

Christmas is upon us. The season of giftgiving, all in honor of the greatest gift given to us by God, his Son, Jesus Christ.

God gives us a person. God gives us his Son. Why? For many reasons, true. One of those reasons would be: that we might see and acknowledge each other as "gifts" from God.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 9:1-6

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone. You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing, as they rejoice before you as at the harvest, as people make merry when dividing spoils. For the yoke that burdened them, the pole on their shoulder, and the rod of their taskmaster you have smashed, as on the day of Midian. For every boot that tramped in battle, every cloak rolled in blood, will be burned as fuel for flames

For a child is born to us, a son is given us; upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name him Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace. NEW PASTOR SELECTION PROCESS AND SURVEY

Our pastor, Fr. Steve Lanza, will be retiring in June of 2024. The Archdiocesan Priest Placement Board is beginning the search process for a new pastor of Divine Mercy Parish beginning July 2024. Representatives of the Priest Placement Board met with our Parish Staff, as well as members of the Senior Leadership Team, the Parish Council, the Finance Council and the Chairs of all of our Boards (including Sacred Heart School) on December 4th to gather input on what Divine Mercy needs in a pastor for our future.

The Priest Placement Board seeks input from our parishioners as well through a questionnaire they have created. Once you complete the questionnaire, you can place them in the receptacle box located in the same location. All questionnaires will be forwarded to the Priest Placement Board. QUESTIONNAIRES ARE DUE AT THE PARISH BY DECEMBER 28th.

Next steps? The Priest Placemen Board will review all the information gathered from and about Divine Mercy (as well as other parishes in need of a pastor) over the next 2-3 months, while simultaneously speaking with priests who are considering new assignments. Please keep the Priest Placement Board in your prayers during this process as they discern the best pastor for Divine Mercy.
