FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

SOCIAL, WITH DISTANCE

People ask me in emails and over the phone how I'm doing. I respond to them that, like everybody else these days, I'm doing the best I can to cope with the constraints imposed upon us all by social distancing, and I am doing fine.

Like some of you, I work from home, more or less. The office building, the former Sacred Heart convent, is only a few steps away from the rectory. In essence, I've always worked from home.

The difference these days is that no one else is in the office. Staff members each work from their own homes, and Fathers Dean and Dan relocated to their respective homes away from the parish, so that aside from daily "pass-throughs" by our maintenance staff to check on our

systems, I am alone. The house is quiet in the evenings and throughout the night. The office is earily silent with no one coming to the door, and no sounds of others in their offices pursuing work.

Oddly, I've never been busier. (And I thought I was busy before this pandemic.)

I'm on the phone a lot, to check up on parishioners. The other priests are doing the same, from their remote locations. There's a group of parishioners currently giving of their time who are also on the phone a lot, checking in with you to make sure you're doing OK or if you need help.

I'm also involved in plenty of meetings via Zoom and Microsoft Teams. Zoom works fine as far as I'm concerned. It's easy and clear.



Teams doesn't get a high mark from me. The last deanery meeting I attended via Teams, I had no audio. I couldn't hear anyone. That didn't make for a very good meeting. I'm not a lip-reader. I'm sure the lack of audio was due to user error, but doggone-it if I can't figure it out!

In addition to a lot of Zoom meetings, I'm also conducting appointments via Zoom. That's been real good.

And then there are my daily walks. I'm getting more exercise in my day

than ever before. Interestingly, my walks in the various neighborhoods around the rectory have become more than just a physical roving. On every walk, I've met parishioners either out for their own walk, bike ride, or just puttering around in their yard. Most want to stop and chat for a bit.

Whereas before social distancing most of my chatting would take place before or after weekend Masses as I stood in the back of church, now I chat with folks on my daily walk. That's how one parishioner, who stopped to talk, found out about the death of another parishioner whom she knew was sick, but had not yet received the news of her passing. It was a good conversation, although sad. This news reminded her of her own loss of a family member. She promised to pray for them as they dealt with this terrible loss. Then, she continued on her way, as did I.

As I walked away from that encounter I thought it's amazing how we forge connections even with these Coronavirus constraints. We humans crave connection. We're made that way by God; to long for connection and community.

The walks are helping me to stay connected, such as it is, so these daily jaunts are part and parcel of ministry. What else have I been doing to minister to you?

PRAYER, A HIDDEN POWER

First and foremost, each day before I go to the office, I pray. I spend quite a bit of time in prayer using the format of Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours. You can go to our website to find prayer resources like the Liturgy of the Hours, the official daily prayer of the Church.

Along with Morning Prayer, which essentially is a series of psalms and readings from scripture, I also have a list of parishioners and others that I keep in my prayer book. Towards the end of Morning Prayer, I specifically lift up to God in prayer all those on my list. The list changes, people get added to it, or they get taken off the list if their need is met. It takes me a while to get through the list, as I prayerfully mention each name on it and think of why they are there and what they need.

My prayer in the morning is private. Obviously, the only public prayer I'm engaged in these days is when I preside at the Mass which is streamed. Well, it's not quite the *only* public prayer I'm involved in.

CREATIVE PRAYER

I've been to the cemetery once since social distancing, to lead an internment for a parishioner who died. The only family member present was the grandson, who did his grandmother proud by getting this organized, and Facetiming with his family from the cemetery. They were all still in Montana, where his grandmother had been living these past few years. I've never done an internment with a family tuning in via Facetime on the phone. It was, however, moving, and proof that we are resilient in dealing

with these constraints while continuing to minister to each other.

In the same vein, last week, a gathering in prayer was organized by a staff member who is also a parishioner. A group of ten of us gathered at the home of a family who had just experienced the loss of a loved one. We didn't go inside. We stayed out on the front lawn, appropriately spaced apart.

The family came out on the front porch. Everyone spoke for a few minutes about the person for whom we were grieving. Then we prayed right there. We sang *Amazing Grace* right there.

In 39 years of ministry, it's the first "yard prayer" I've led. I have to say, it was no less powerful, even though we weren't in church. The family wants to celebrate a memorial Mass as soon as we can open up the church.

Till then, Zoom prayer, phone calls, and yard prayers work. We all know that prayer can be done anywhere and under any circumstances. And it is powerful.

I wonder: are you praying these days more than ever? Those with little kids, can you find the time and space to pray? Are you engaging your family in group prayer? I'd love to know. Email me.

In my walks I check out the sidewalks and front windows where signs and messages are posted. Lots say "thank you" to health care workers. That too, is a form of prayer, a thanksgiving for others' service and ministry.

In all sorts of creative ways, let's continue to pray for one another. With a lot of prayer and good will, we'll get through this. Amen.

Team. They truly reveal the reality in which we are living. Some parishioners want to chat, some want to ask for prayers, others want to share stories of how they're connecting with others, some offer to make calls themselves or pick up groceries for those who are unable. Some share concerns about the health of a loved one, or their own anxieties related to the pandemic or struggling with the isolation of the "Stay-at-Home" Order, and are grateful to have an opportunity to chat with someone from the parish. Some share delightful stories of clandestine meet-ups that are totally appropriate (social distancing wise), while others tell us of emails prayer chains among parishioners to stay connected. Two women even shared how they start and end their day praying together while on the telephone.

Many of our younger parents are overwhelmed with managing both work and the homeschooling of children, not to mention the challenge of keeping preschoolers busy at home. Of course, there are those among us who have either lost their jobs or been furloughed from their employment, and worry about the future. They're grateful for our prayers and offer of support.

Finally, we must share the news of our 7th graders from Sacred Heart School, who wrote letters to some of our senior parishioners. Many of these seniors were quite delighted to receive these greetings, and reciprocated the effort. The school received quite a few responses, which will be forwarded onto the 7th grade authors! Bravo and thank you!


LOOK WHAT'S HAPPENING AT SACRED HEART SCHOOL!
