# FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

# **FLIP THE SWITCH!**

If you were worshipping this past weekend at our St. Philip the Apostle Church, you probably noticed that the ceiling fans were going like gangbusters, whipping up a little bit of a breeze inside the church. However, it was still a bit humid and uncomfortable. I can tell you why.

Earlier that morning one of our maintenance crew members flipped the switch in the sacristy to turn on the air conditioning, knowing that the day was going to be another hot and humid one. Fantastic. We are fortunate to have air conditioning in both our churches. We are made more comfortable by having this capability.

Even though the sacristy switch was flipped, calling for cooler air, nothing happened.

Nothing happened because we've got two new maintenance team members. One is the head of maintenance. The other, his assistant. Our new head maintenance guy, Bobby, went down into the St. Philip Church basement earlier in the week to turn off the air conditioning. Church was getting too cold.

The switch in the sacristy only works when the main switch in the basement is engaged. Our new guys are still figuring out how all our systems work. Like most parishes, we don't have up-to-date operating manuals. (The switch in the sacristy was installed only a few years ago, I'm told).

In the absence of current operating manuals, it will take a while for our maintenance team to work through

everything to understand what's what and how each system truly works. By the time you read this, they've been on the job for four weeks

In that time they've had to deal with flooding in multiple basements, gutters that needed blowing out (to help prevent future flooding), gas leaks in several buildings at both campuses, roof leaks, three failed sump pumps and a destroyed water heater, the end of school events, and minor interior renovations.

Meanwhile, they are also tending to the ordinary maintenance needs.

They're doing a fantastic job. So when you read the above stuff about not being aware that the basement switch at St. Philip cuts off the upstairs switch in the sacristy, I am definitely not criticizing. I mention it only to say, there's a lot involved in maintenance and our newest guys who are fantastic, are getting their hands around all the systems, literally!

On the same topic of "switches," if you were at St. Philip Church the weekend of June 20, and you only heard the last two-thirds of my homily, that was not because of a short in the sound system or some other mystery failing of the system. I simply forgot to turn on my personal mic.

Yep. It was me. I forgot. Till I remembered.

We have been having difficulties with the sound systems at both Churches, and we have a new consultant



coming in to determine what is causing some of our glitches. But the glitch on June 20 was all me. Silly me.

Now, if only we could call down the Holy Spirit in his fullness on our parish with the flip of a switch, I'd be ecstatic. However, the Spirit doesn't quite work that way. More prayer is needed. And more Alpha efforts, and the like, will be needed.

By the way, we'll be offering a new Alpha course this fall. Let's "flip **that** switch" and start talking up Alpha among your family and friends who have not yet attended!

# ARCHDIOCESE LIFTS COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS

If you don't receive our e-blast yet, (to sign-up, email Judy Pyke at jpyke@divinemercynorthshore.org or call the parish office) or have not seen the parish news on our website, the Archdiocese has issued guidelines in accordance with the State for Phase 5 of Restore Illinois, essentially lifting most of our restrictions. # SACRED VESSELS

All of the items used at Mass and in our Catholic Rituals have unique names and uses. Many of us see them used but few of us may know their names. Notwithstanding, after years of use, refurbishing them to their original look becomes essential. We have prioritized what items must be refinished rather than replacing, which keeps costs down dramatically. Here are a few examples:



These three containers (called ciboria, the plural of ciborium) are priced at \$1755 but to refinish all three of them would cost \$750. It is our obligation to have all vessels used to hold the Body of Christ in pristine condition.



We've all seen the Holy Water container and sprinkler. This is a vital part of our Wedding and Funeral Masses, Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday.

These are in need of cleaning and replating: \$225 each, to buy a new could be as much as \$1000.

There are other vessels which need our attention and as donations are made these items will be prioritized.

Your contribution allows you to commemorate a father, godfather, priest, grandfather or father-like figure in your life. A list of memorials or honorariums will be kept on file in the liturgy and music office.

# RENEW MY CHURCH NEWS FOR OUR SHARING PARISHES

We recently connected with our two sharing parishes, and wanted to share some news with you. First, St. Benedict the African Parish will remain intact as they had already undergone a parish consolidation when St. Benedict the African East merged with St. Benedict the African West in 2016. They actually have undergone several consolidations in the last 20-30 years. The following information regarding their history can be found on their website:

"Eight parishes formed into two worship communities along geographical lines: St. Justin Martyr, St. Raphael, and Sacred Heart came together at the St. Justin Martyr site. St. Brendan, Our Lady of Solace, St. Martin, St. Bernard, and St. Carthage came together in a new church built on the site of the 1968-razed St. Bernard church.

By 1995 the single parish with two worship sites split into two separate parishes (St. Benedict the African West and St. Benedict the African East), reflecting the independent growth and stable Eucharistic communities at each site.

2016 saw a further evolution of Catholic presence in Englewood, as both parishes formed a single new parish of St. Benedict the African (SBA), with no indicators of west or east. We are hopeful and strong with the newness of our faith community, and move forward with the confidence, courage, and joy of a people who share faith and faithfulness."

Do you know much about its namesake, St. Benedict the African? He lived from 1526 to 1589, and his feast day is celebrated on April 4th.

"Benedict's parents were brought from



Africa as slaves to Sicily. He was born a slave but was set free in his youth. His temperament was refined and cheerful, despite the racial slurs he suffered from his neighbors. He eventually gave all his possessions to the poor and became a hermit near Palermo, following the rule of Saint Francis.

When Benedict was forty years old, Pius IV decreed that all such hermits should become members of the Franciscan Order. Benedict entered a friary in Palermo as a lay brother. The friars there appointed him as their superior because of his outstanding virtue, even though he was not a priest. As superior he introduced a stricter observance of the Franciscan Rule and was venerated by all his brethren. He asked to be allowed to return to the kitchen when his term as superior ended. People began coming to see him from all over Sicily for spiritual direction. He became famous for his care for the sick and the hungry.

He died after a severe illness, at the hour he had foretold. Years after his death, when his body was exhumed it was found incorrupt. His veneration spread throughout Italy, to Spain and Portugal, and even to Latin America."

### St. Columbanus

The Archdiocesan Renew My Church effort has united the parishes of St. Columbanus, St. Dorothy and St. Clotilde as one new parish with St. Columbanus serving as the parish church. (St. Dorothy and St. Clotilde will move toward formal closure). There will be no changes to Augustus Tolton Academy (the school located at the St. Columbanus site).

The people of this new parish discerned a new name for the parish with the help of the Holy Spirit (just as we discerned the name of Divine Mercy): St. Moses the Black. According to the EWTN website, "St. Moses the Black, sometimes called the Ethiopian, was a slave of a government official in Egypt who dismissed him for theft and suspected murder. He became the leader of a gang of bandits who roamed the Nile Valley spreading terror and violence. He was a large, imposing

figure. On one occasion, a barking dog prevented Moses from carrying out a robbery, so he swore vengeance on the owner. Weapons in his mouth, Moses swam the river toward the owner's hut. The owner, again alerted, hid, and the frustrated Moses took some of his sheep to slaughter. Attempting to hide from local authorities, he took shelter with some monks in a colony in the desert of Scete, near Alexandria. The dedication of their lives, as well as their peace and contentment, influenced Moses deeply. He soon gave up his old way of life and joined the monastic community at Scete.

He had a rather difficult time adjusting to regular monastic discipline. His flair for adventure remained with him. Attacked by a group of robbers in his desert cell, Moses fought back, overpowered the intruders, and dragged them to the chapel where the other monks were at prayer. He told the brothers that he didn't think it Christian to hurt the robbers and asked what he should do with them. The overwhelmed robbers repented, were converted, and themselves joined the community.

Moses became the spiritual leader of a colony of hermits in the desert. At some time, he had been ordained priest. At about age 75, about the year 407, word came that a group of renegades planned to attack the colony. The brothers wanted to defend themselves, but Moses forbade it. He told them to retreat, rather than take up weapons. He and seven others remained behind and greeted the invaders with open arms, but all eight were martyred by the bandits. A modern interpretation honors St. Moses the Black as an apostle of non-violence."

Please keep the people of St. Benedict the African and St. Moses the Black parishes in your prayers, particularly as we all work to renew our churches.
