FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

WHAT ELSE, LORD?

As if the pandemic were not enough, we are confronted, once again, by video evidence gone viral of police brutality and injustice against a person of color. Large public demonstrations ensued in various cities around the country calling for justice to be done. Somehow looting and violence accompanied or dovetailed off of those demonstrations.

What do we make of all this?

To be honest, my first reaction to all of this was: Really, Lord? Don't we have enough to deal with?

On second thought, sometimes life is just that way. It becomes overwhelming.

I know for myself when life becomes overwhelming I take it to prayer, once I get past the initial emotional impact. Sometimes I can't shake the emotions, so I bring those to pray too (we ought to bring our whole selves to prayer, which includes thoughts, feelings, inclinations, confusions and questions).

When life becomes too much I also spend time with Scripture and with other sources of wisdom. In light of the swirling mess of the pandemic, actions and images of racial injustice, large crowds demonstrating, and instances of looting and destruction of property, the first Scripture that comes to mind is Jesus telling his disciples, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you" (John 20:21).

Jesus sends us forth with his peace to be peacemakers. What would happen in this country if every Christian took to heart Jesus' words? Would we reevaluate our role in standing up for those who have no standing in society? Would our streets radiate calmness and quiet at night? I don't know. But I do know the gospel and it does not condone violence in any form, whether that be racial injustice, bullying, brutality in actions and in words, putting down others, hypocrisy, treating others as if they were things and not people, destruction of property, thievery, stealing and looting. All those are forms of violence. Yes, different kinds of violence, but violence nonetheless. Christ calls us to peace, never violence.

SAINT POPE PAUL VI

In these difficult times I also recall a voice of wisdom, Saint Pope Paul VI who once famously preached, "If you want peace, work for justice."

AWORD FROM NOUWEN

Henri Nouwen, the celebrated Christian author, wrote this reflection that may help you with the times in which we are living—

In our ongoing search for meaning, we need to keep reading books and newspapers in a spiritual way. The question that should always be with us is: "Why are we living?" All the events of our short lives need to be interpreted. Books and newspapers are there to help us to read the signs of the times and so give meaning to our lives. Jesus says: "When you see a cloud looming up in the West you say at once that rain is coming, and so it does. And when the wind is from the South you say it's going to be hot, and it is. Hypocrites! You know how to interpret the face of the earth and the sky. How is it you do not know how to interpret these times?" (Luke 12:54-6).

Here lies the real challenge. Jesus does not look at the events of our lives as a series of incidents and accidents that have little to do with us. Jesus sees the political, economic, and social events of our life as signs that call for a spiritual interpretation. They need to be read spiritually! But how? Jesus shows us how. Once the people had told Jesus the news that the governor Pilate had executed some rebellious men from Galilee and



mingled their blood with that of Roman sacrifices. When he heard this he said: "Do you suppose that these Galileans were worse sinners than any others, that this should happen to them? They were not, I tell you. No, but unless you repent you will all perish as they did" (Luke 13:2-3). Jesus does not give a political interpretation of the event but a spiritual one. He says: "What happened invites you to conversion!" This is the deepest meaning of history: a constant invitation calling us to turn our hearts to God and so discover the full meaning of our lives." As Jesus comforted Martha and Mary after the death of their brother, Lazarus, a grief group is a place of comfort in our tradition. UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS PASTORAL LETTER ON RACISM

It seems to be the perfect time to read the Bishop's Pastoral Letter on Racism entitled "Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love, A Pastoral Letter on Racism." You can find it on their website by clicking <u>here</u>.

Fr. Matt O'Donnell, the pastor of one of our sharing parishes, St. Columbanus, wrote the following this past week.

Statement on the Death of Mr. George Floyd Rev. Matthew S. O'Donnell, Pastor St. Columbanus Church & Augustus Tolton Catholic Academy

Racism continues to have a devastating effect on life in the United States of America. Events of this past week has shown the anger, hurt, and frustrations of many across the country. We must remember the life of Mr. George Floyd. Sadly and unjustly, Mr. Floyd joins the litany of names of African American men and women who have lost their lives at the hands of those charged with serving and protecting.

The life of Mr. Floyd was reduced to a dispute about a counterfeit \$20 bill. In effect, the life of Mr. Floyd, a Black man, was worth less than an alleged counterfeit bill. As a white police officer forced his knee into the neck of Mr. Floyd for almost nine minutes, the world heard Mr. Floyd cry out "I Can't Breathe." Words we have heard before as others have experienced bodily violence at the hands of unethical police officers.

We understand the death of Mr. Floyd has led to a national outcry for change, accountability, and reform in policing. In Chicago, we witnessed peaceful protests where committed individuals joined together to be advocates for justice. We heard loudly and clearly that Black Lives Matter! Black lives do matter, and they matter to us at St. Columbanus Church and Augustus Tolton Catholic Academy. As a church and school we are committed to speaking truth to power, advocating for our neighbors in Park Manor, and fighting to ensure that Black lives and Black bodies are treated as sacred.

Our city is hurting, and the Black community is voicing a deep pain. This pain is being expressed not only from witnessing the murder of Mr. Floyd, but from generations of racial oppression. America's sinful legacy of enslavement, lynchings, Jim Crow segregation, violence, apathy, and financial inequities have brought us to this moment. Racism is this nation's original sin. It pains me to see fires being set, stores looted, and neighborhoods vandalized. What pains me more, though, is knowing that some value material objects over Black bodies and lives.

Jesus says, "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). We are committed to sharing the abundance of life with all those we minister to. We will continue to work tirelessly in the pursuit of justice and peace, never giving up until "justice and peace will kiss each other" (Psalm 85:10). We will never stop serving our neighbors, and we make the commitment today to be a faith community that fights, advocates, and works for a more just society.

Let us pray for the repose of the soul of Mr. George Floyd, and for the consolation of his family.

St. Columbanus, pray for us. Venerable Augustus Tolton, pray for us.


