Divine Mercy is a Welcoming Community that Inspires Disciples of Jesus to Share God's Love and Transform the World.

Today, traditionally called "Laetare Sunday," is a name derived from the first words of the proper entrance antiphon, "Rejoice, Jerusalem."

MORE ABOUT HOLY WEEK

Holy Saturday: The Waiting. This is the vigil of all vigils! This day is often forgotten—but it's one of the most sacred. Jesus lies in the tomb. The world is still. Heaven seems silent. It's the day of waiting, of mourning, of uncertainty. For the early disciples, this was a day of fear. For us, it's a call to hope in the waiting.

And then—the Vigil. When night falls, everything changes. We gather in the darkness, and the Paschal fire is kindled. A single candle—the Easter candle—pierces the night, and from it, the whole church is lit. It's a breathtaking image: the Light of Christ spreading among the people. We listen to readings that trace the history of salvation—from Genesis to the Resurrection. Cantors chant the Exsultet, an ancient hymn proclaiming the victory of Christ. We welcome new Catholics through Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion. And for the first time since Lent began—we sing Alleluia. The bells ring. The lights blaze. Heaven rejoices. It's not just the Resurrection of Christ—it's a reminder that we, too, are raised with Him. Easter Isn't Just a Day—It's a Feast of 8 Days And just when you think it's all over—surprise!

Easter Sunday kicks off an eight-day celebration called the Octave of Easter, where every day is celebrated liturgically as if it were Easter Day itself. That means every day is an opportunity to bask in the Resurrection, to let that joy really soak in. We're an Easter people—not just for a day, but for life. And the cherry on top? **Divine Mercy Sunday**, the final day of the octave. It's the exclamation point of grace after the Resurrection. The image of Christ with rays of mercy pouring from his heart reminds us that Easter wasn't just about conquering death—it was about drawing us into eternal love and forgiveness.

So... **Why Does Holy Week Matter?** Because it's not just history—it's our story. It's the story of a God who didn't just love us from afar, but entered into our mess. Who suffered with us. Who died for us. Who rose so that we could live forever. And every year, the Church gives us this week to slow down, remember, and relive it. It's not about liturgical perfection. **It's about participation.** Show up. Even if you're tired, distracted, overwhelmed—show up. Because Christ did. Holy Week is not a burden. It's a gift. So unwrap it. Breathe it in. And let it change you. God Bless.

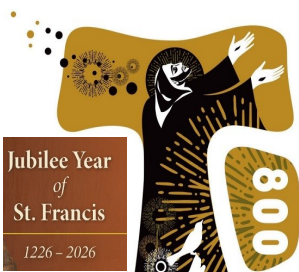


As a parish, we focus our Lenten almsgiving towards Catholic Relief Services' Rice Bowls – an important way to help our brothers and sisters around the world. Rice Bowls are available at both of our worship sites. If you haven't picked one up yet, take one home, and as a Lenten practice, give alms to those who hunger around the world. We'll collect the Rice Bowls beginning next weekend, March 22nd. This is our designated offering for Holy Thursday and you may bring your Rice Bowl to that Mass as well.

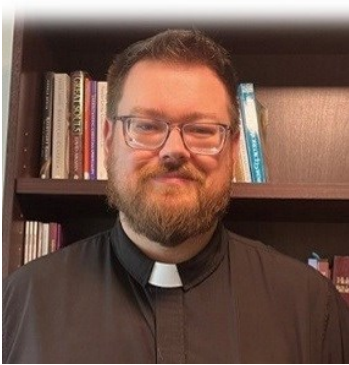
Today is also known as **"Golden Rose Sunday."** This tradition began at least in the 11th century. The rose represents Christ (the "flower" from the tree of Jesse) and yet crowned with thorns, and is blessed today on Laetare Sunday, which represents a pause in Lenten penitence for joy.

It is customary for popes to present a Golden Rose as a special honor to particular Marian shrines. It does not matter if the shrine has already received a Golden Rose, as it is seen as a personal gift, given by a specific pope.

Recent popes have been very generous with such awards; Francis is recorded as having given 16 Golden Roses out during his pontificate, while Pope Benedict XVI awarded 19 shrines with a Golden Rose. Pope Leo XIV asked for the original statue of Our Lady of Fatima to be transferred to the Vatican to allow him to present her another Golden Rose at the recent Marian Jubilee. She presided over the Rosary for Peace held at the Vatican on October 11, which Leo had urged the faithful to join. The shrine at Our Lady of Fatima has received a total of four Golden Roses.

PASTOR'S COLUMN

This weekend at our 4:30pm Mass, we celebrate not only the Eucharist, but also the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. We read about this sacrament in the fifth chapter of the Letter of St. James: "Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the priests of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint him with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven." The sacraments are always an outpouring of God's healing

grace. The United States Catholic Catechism for Adults reminds us that "through the ministry of the priest, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin – and sometimes even from physical ailment."

Many people only think of this sacrament as "Last Rites" and wait to ask for it until they or their loved one is at the very moment of death. However, the Church teaches us that the anointing of the sick can be administered to any member of the faithful who *begins* to be in danger of death by reason of illness or old age. The common cold or seasonal allergies probably wouldn't qualify, but a cancer diagnosis, serious surgery, diabetes, mental health issues, a difficult pregnancy – these would all be good reasons to seek out the sacrament of anointing. This sacrament can also be repeated if the person again becomes seriously ill or if the danger becomes more serious. It's not necessarily a "one time only" thing.

If you or a loved one are dealing with a serious illness, please don't delay in seeking out the sacrament. Again, sometimes people try to wait until the very last moments before calling a priest. This has several significant drawbacks. First, a priest might not be available to come in time. Once a person has died, we cannot celebrate the sacrament of anointing, because the sacraments are only for the living. A priest might be able to come and pray with the family members and loved ones, but this is not the same thing.

Second, the "last rites" are more than just the anointing of the sick – they would also ideally include the sacraments of confession and the Eucharist. For one who is getting ready to journey into the next life, to receive all of these sacraments is the greatest spiritual comfort that the Church can provide. But, once someone becomes unable to communicate or to swallow, they would be unable to experience the relief of confession and the comfort of receiving Holy Communion. It is always better to call too early for a priest than too late!

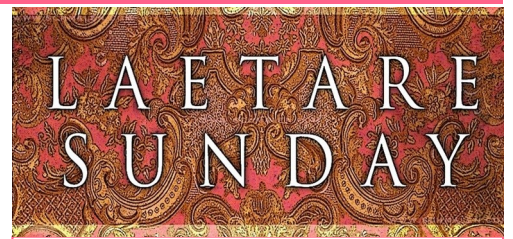
Finally, it is good for all of us to become familiar with the Divine Mercy Chaplet. Many graces are promised at the hour of death to those who say this prayer. And not just to who say it themselves, but even when we pray it for others. Jesus said to St. Faustina that "when [people] say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as a just Judge but as a merciful Savior."

LENTEN RECONCILIATION OPPORTUNITIES

DIVINE MERCY'S regular times for the Sacrament of Reconciliation are on Wednesdays from 3 - 4:30 p.m. at St. Philip the Apostle Church and on Saturdays from 9 - 9:30 a.m. at Sacred Heart Church.



The fourth Sunday of Lent is rather unique; like the third Sunday of Advent (*Gaudete Sunday*), the fourth Sunday of Lent is a break in an otherwise penitential season. The vestments for this day can be rose, as they are on *Gaudete Sunday*, and flowers may adorn the Altar. This day is called *Laetare Sunday* (also *Rose Sunday*), and takes its name from the opening words of the Mass, the Entrance Antiphon *, *Laetare, Jerusalem, Rejoice, Jerusalem* (see page one).

We are now past the halfway point of Lent. How are your Lenten practices going? Did you know it's not too late to start? Indeed, the message of today's liturgy is just that—*God so loved the world that he gave his only Son*. If God's love is so great, it's even enough for those of us who got a late start on Lent. It's never too late to turn to the Lord.

Even during Lent, we remain a joyful people, for we believe that God loves us despite our sinfulness, loves us so much that Jesus Christ sacrificed himself so that we may be redeemed and born into eternal life. Today on *Laetare Sunday*, we anticipate the joy we will feel on Easter. Let us give thanks to God for the grace and mercy we have regularly received and trust we will continue to receive throughout our lives.

* As per the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, antiphons are short scripture verses or psalm verses sung or recited before and after certain parts of the Mass, during the Entrance, Offertory, and Communion, to help understand the liturgical moment and readings. Typically the antiphons are easy to sing in the style of the Responsorial Psalm for the assembly's participation. The antiphons may be substituted with hymns and songs from the parish repertoire.

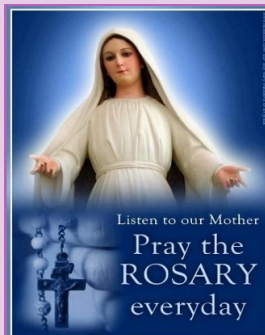

Next Sunday, the Fifth Sunday of Lent, marks the traditional start of *Passiontide*, a solemn two-week period focused intensely on the Passion of Jesus Christ that concludes on Holy Saturday.

To observe this time, you will notice our statues and crucifixes are veiled in purple—an ancient custom known as a "visual fast" intended to help us look inward and focus on the essentials of our redemption.

By temporarily losing these beautiful images, we are reminded of our longing for the Resurrection. They will remain covered until the light of Christ returns at the Easter Vigil, April 4.

Veiling of Images: It is the custom in many churches to cover crosses, statues, and icons in purple cloth until the Easter Vigil.

Shift in Focus: The liturgical readings shift from themes of repentance and fasting toward the specific events of Christ's suffering and the theological significance of the Cross.

The "Deepening" of Lent: While Lent is forty days, *Passiontide* comprises the final two weeks, serving as a "season within a season" to intensify spiritual focus.

A "Fast of the Eyes"

Just as we fast from certain foods or silence the *Alleluia*, the Church invites us to a "fast of the eyes". By removing the visual consolation of beautiful statues and even the crucifix, we are forced to focus more intently on the liturgical words and the internal reality of Christ's suffering.

Scriptural and Symbolic Roots

The Hidden Christ: This tradition is linked to the Gospel passage where Jesus "hid himself" from those who sought to stone him (John 8:59). The veils symbolize Christ's divinity being hidden beneath the humiliation of his Passion.

A Sign of Mourning: The purple color represents penance and mourning, signaling that the Church has entered its most solemn period of the year.

Our Earthly Exile: The veils also remind us that we live in a "veiled" world, separated from the full glory of God until the "veil is lifted" at the end of time or at our own death.
