FINE ARTS

This weekend at the 10:00 Sunday morning Mass, we focus on the fine arts. Any young person (grammar and high school) who participates in fine arts, *and our adults*, are especially welcomed to join us in celebrating the impact of the fine arts on our lives. All those who appreciate the fine arts are welcome. In that context, our guest main celebrant and homilist, Bishop Bartosic, will reflect on the intersection of the fine arts and faith.

You don't have very far to look to understand that the artistic has always been present in our lives of faith. Check out the interior of our churches. Both Sacred Heart and St. Philip the Apostle are filled with artistic depictions of the cross of Christ, and of the likenesses of Mary and Joseph. The stained glass windows which adorn the body of Sacred Heart Church and the stained glass window in the Baptistry of St. Philip the Apostle Church are stunning, beautiful representations that lift our minds and hearts to God.

The Catholic Church has long been a support to artists and artistry. Medieval mystery plays catechized the faithful in an age when most did not read. The Church was a patron of the arts that helped fuel the renaissance explosion of art and artistry.

In saying this, I am painting with the broadest of brush strokes, pardon the pun, which is entirely intended. As broad as it is, it is nonetheless true.

Whatever type of fine art you are involved in, thank you! You help make the world a more beautiful place. As you engage in your artistic pursuits, recall that St. Thomas Aquinas described as transcendent values grounded in God, as *the Good, the True, and the Beautiful*.

GREEN RIBBONS IN SUPPORT OF MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

You will notice green ribbons around many of the trees at Divine Mercy Parish during the month of May, showing our support for Mental Health Awareness Month!

This effort is in cooperation with Paws for Patrick and the Glencoe Clergy Association, raising mental health awareness in our community – particularly relating to youth. We also have two youth mental health resources to share with you.

Paws for Patrick

Paws for Patrick is a non-profit organization dedicated to connecting young people to emotional support animals to aid them as they live with mental illness. The organization helps families obtain and advocate for emotional support animals, provides trained therapy dogs, and helps break the stigma of mental health issues among young people.

Erika's LightHouse

Erika's LightHouse gives educators the tools to promote inclusive school cultures around mental health. The organization helps schools provide their students with the skills needed to talk to each other, to their parents, to their teachers and to counselors. Their resources raise awareness, reduce stigma, educate students, promote good mental health and encourage help-seeking.

10 WAYS TO RELIEVE STRESS DURING FINALS

In the next few weeks, middle schools, high schools, and colleges will have finals. We pray that the young people in our parish community will do well both academically and emotionally during this stressful time, and that they know how much we care for them.

The following tips are from Erika'sLighthouse.org, a local resource that provides information and resources about teen depression. Here are 10 ways to relieve stress during finals:

1. Form a Study Group! Studying is always more fun when you have a buddy or two.
2. Start early and make a plan! It'll be beneficial to start early so you're not cramming the night before finals.
3. Take Breaks! Whether it's going for a quick run, grabbing a snack, or watching an episode of your favorite show, study breaks are important for good mental health!
4. Practice mindfulness and meditation to regain focus

during a long stretch of studying.

5. Make a playlist full of music that helps you get into the zone! (Classical music has been shown to help students retain information while studying.)
6. Ask for help! Don't be afraid to reach out to your teachers if you're struggling. That's what they're there for.
7. Eat balanced meals! Not being hungry will help you focus on studying. Stick to water and herbal tea (no caffeine!) so you don't have trouble falling asleep when you're done studying.
8. Get a good night's sleep! It's very important that you are rested and energized while studying.
9. Know your limits and stick to them! Your mental and emotional health come first.
10. Plan something fun for after your last final: anything from going to see a movie to sitting on the couch eating ice cream! Having something to look forward to will be a great motivator.

If you have concerns about your child's mental health or mood, we encourage you to get help. A good first step is to contact your child's pediatrician, and to contact your child's teachers or school counseling staff. MAY IS THE MONTH OF MARY

Many of us grew up celebrating the month of May with a May Crowning of Mary. But why? Why May? Reasons abound, but according to *Marge Fenelon in a blog for the National Catholic Register in 2020* stated, "The idea of a month dedicated specifically to Mary can be traced back to baroque times. Although it wasn't always held during May, Mary Month included thirty daily spiritual exercises honoring Mary.

It was in this era (medieval times) that Mary's Month and May were combined, making May the Month of Mary with special devotions organized on each day throughout the month. This custom became especially widespread during the nineteenth century and remains in practice until today.

The ways Mary is honored in May is as varied as the people who honor her.

It's common for parishes have a daily recitation of the Rosary during May, and many erect a special May altar with a statue or picture of Mary as a reminder of Mary's month. Additionally, it's a long-standing tradition to crown the statue of Mary during May – a custom known as May Crowning. Often, the crown is made of beautiful blossoms representing Mary's beauty and virtue. It's also a reminder to the faithful to strive to imitate our Blessed Mother's virtue in our own lives. May Crowning, in some areas, is a huge celebration and is usually done outside of Mass, although Mass may be celebrated before or after the actual crowning.

But May altars and crownings aren't just "church" things. We can and should be doing the same in our homes. When we echo the customs and traditions of the Church in our homes – our domestic churches – we participate more fully in the life of the Church.

If you haven't already, I encourage you to erect a prayer corner in your home. No matter how fancy or simple it is. The

main point is that it's a place designated for God, and more specifically, for spending time with him. Just as you need proper atmosphere to sleep, you also need proper atmosphere to pray.

For May, give Mary a special spot in your prayer corner. It can be a statue or picture, but place there some representation of our Blessed Mother. Make it appealing and a real tribute to her beauty and virtue.

Then, crown Mary. You can give her an actual or spiritual crown and you can make it a subtle gesture or ornate ceremony of your own device. The meaning is far more important than the action. You can do it in the beginning, at the end of May or anywhere in between.

Just do it.

Why?

Not because it's a long-standing tradition in the Church, although it is. Not because there are any special graces connected to it, although there is.

No, do it because Mary is Mother – your mother, my mother, everyone's mother – and because she cares for all of us day-in-and-day-out without fail, interceding for us in even the tiniest matters.

For that, she deserves an entire month in her honor."

PRAYER AND WORSHIP

JOIN US FOR ADORATION

We gather on Wednesdays from 2-3:00 p.m. at Sacred Heart Church and on Fridays from 8:30-9:30 a.m. at St. Philip the Apostle Church. We hope you'll join us and spend some time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament! It's good for the soul!

We wanted to share an article with you from the St. Paul Center on **Why Catholics Need Eucharistic Adoration** by Lawrence Feingold, who is an Associate Professor of Theology and Philosophy at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary in St. Louis. He is the author of numerous scholarly books, including *The Eucharist: Mystery of Presence, Sacrifice, and Communion*, a comprehensive commentary on the mystery of the Eucharist drawing from Scripture, the Church Fathers, and magisterial teaching throughout the ages.

"Since Christ is truly present in the Eucharist in His sacred humanity hypostatically united with the divine nature, the Eucharist should receive the adoration of latria that is given exclusively to God. Adoration of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament is a natural

consequence of the Church's faith in the real substantial presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

Adoration corresponds most directly to the first of the three principal purposes for which Christ instituted the Eucharist, which is that Christ wished to perpetuate His adorable human presence among us after ascending definitively into heaven. The Eucharist is the solution to this problem. The divinity of Christ is omnipresent, but, after His Ascension, His humanity is substantially present only in heaven and in the Eucharist. Since the Son of God became man for us and has devised a marvelous way to remain with us in the Eucharist in the substantial presence of His humanity, it follows that adoration of and intimate encounter with Christ in the Blessed Sacrament is not an afterthought, but rather an essential aspect of the Eucharist. As Israel adored the special presence of God (the shekinah) in the Ark of the Covenant and in the Holy of Holies in the Temple, how could the Church not fittingly adore the substantial presence of Christ, who makes Himself present with much greater

generosity in every tabernacle?

Adoration is also intimately related to the other two ends of the Eucharist. Christ is adored in the Eucharist as the sacrificial Victim of Calvary whose body was given for us and whose blood was "poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matt 26:28). His presence cannot be separated from His sacrificial self-gift. Eucharistic adoration enables us to spend time intimately thanking Him for His sacrificial gift expressed in His Eucharistic words: "This is my body which is given for you" (Luke 22:19). In the Eucharist we encounter Him as the Victim of merciful love, and it is the nature of love that it calls for a return in kind.

At the same time, Christ is present in the tabernacle as the living Bread from heaven, the "medicine of immortality," the "desire of the everlasting hills," the perfect rest that fulfills every natural and supernatural desire. Eucharistic adoration helps us to nurture our desire so that we grow in hunger and thirst for the Bridegroom who feeds His Bride on His own Flesh and Blood so that she may share ever more in His divinity. "

A suggested Act of Contrition is: My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. (Rite of Penance, no. 45)
